Subject: Annual Report – 2016

The Broward Sheriff's Office Oakland Park District is proud to present the 2016 Annual Report. Within, you will find detailed analysis and explanations of all the Districts' efforts, accomplishments, and challenges through the year. For some time Oakland Park has led in the area of transparency and information sharing. This report will be widely distributed and serve as evidence of this effort. Please know that the best initiative we have in the City of Oakland Park is the partnership between our residents, businesses, elected officials, and the Oakland Park District itself. As can be seen in the attached UCR chart, Oakland Park continues to enjoy some of the lowest crime rates in recent history. This accomplishment is a direct testimony to the partnerships mentioned, as well as the constant support of the Sheriff and his regional anti-crime initiatives which benefit the City and its residents.

No organization should exist without clear direction of its purpose and goals. It is with great pleasure that I present our 2016 goals and a few of the attainment factors we were able to accomplish, not just as a department, but as a community.

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business and Robbery.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2016 saw a slight increase in residential burglaries due to an organized group of adults and juveniles who targeted homes within the city. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the District.

- Identify and implement the most effective ways to communicate real time crime trend analysis to all members of the District to assure a team approach.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole and further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have positive impact on recidivism and sentencing.
- Carry on the District's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

Attainment

1. The District achieved excellent attendance at each association in which an invitation was extended. This gave the District command and personnel an opportunity to speak directly to residents to both educate and enlist their support to address the challenges facing the City.
2. Weekly, monthly and quarterly analysis was conducted to assure proper allocation of resources. This information was shared with all staff to assure information was properly distributed. Additionally monthly and quarterly reports were posted online and on the City agenda to assure full transparency to our citizens and customers. Crimemapping.com gave residents unprecedented access to near real time crime activity to assure an informed resident was an alert resident.
3. Increased liaison with outside agencies to include Probation and Parole, The State Attorney's Juvenile Division, as well as Broward County Chiefs of Police, allowing for better communication to address both individuals as well as larger challenges impacting the City.
4. The District enjoyed some of the lowest occurrences of burglary to residence seen recorded. A slight increase in robbery as well as burglary to business was noted but they both remain well below historical numbers. The largest increase was seen to burglary conveyance. This was a regional trend fueled by crimes of opportunity with an unprecedented number of crimes occurring to unlocked vehicles. Juveniles also appeared to drive this trend with several arrests made for juveniles entering into as many 30 plus vehicles during a single night.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park Community Enhancement to address neglected properties, assure code compliance and improve the overall appearance of the city.

All it takes is one neglected property to impact an entire neighborhood. The District will work at all levels to support and assist the City Community Enhancement. By working closely with the city and combining resources in nontraditional roles, we can maintain and improve the high standards the residents expect, helping Oakland Park sustain the reputation of being a desirable and safe place to live, shop, visit, work, and play.

- District deputies will report abandoned properties, graffiti and vandalism to Community Enhancement and work together to address the problems.
- District deputies will attend Community Enhancement meetings to ensure input and participation in city projects.
- District deputies will attend Home Owners and Business Group meetings to ensure the community's concerns are shared and effectively addressed with the City's Community Enhancement.
- District Deputies will educate the community on how to report nuisance/abandoned properties utilizing the City's P.O.P. smartphone application.
- Coordinate with the residents and businesses to improve the environmental design of their property. This will be accomplished through the partnership with various City departments.

Attainment

1. District staff was specifically assigned to the City's new Community Enhancement team to assist and coordinate efforts to support the City in its "pretty city" initiatives.
2. Worked closely with City staff to facilitate the substantial video monitoring deployed throughout the City and its infrastructure.
3. Oakland Park District personnel brought into compliance 329 violations and aided in 371 Code Board or Special Magistrate cases in 2016. This augmented City resources and improved the appearance and safety of our City.
4. Attended and supported the Oakland Park Business group to ensure the needs of our businesses in the city were being met. Oakland Park District staff was honored with "Deputy of the Year" from the group as well as recognition from other regional business and outreach groups.
5. New initiatives were launched attempting to find novel ways to engage and involve our citizens. Dog Watch utilized the community's love of our smallest family members to keep an eye on crime while taking walks together or other activities. "Park and Talks" were also held, taking advantage of the City's beautiful parks to sit and chat on a summer day. These are examples of leveraging every opportunity to find venues in which meaningful dialogue can be had.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the city who encounters construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently dangerous situations result when the safety and flow of traffic is compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participation in traffic mitigation due to these projects.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all M.O.T.s (Maintenance of Traffic).
- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

Attainment

1. Last year it became apparent that we could do a better job of coordinating with the many departments that oversee and conduct the various projects within our City. Planning and coordination became one of our primary goals and a District Sergeant was assigned specifically to oversee this important issue.
2. Special Event Permits were routed through the District to assure police coordination was appropriate, ensuring safe events.
3. Traffic Maintenance of Traffic (M.O.T.) plans were also reviewed which led to a better real world perspective on the impact of rerouting traffic on our citizens and visitors. This venture alone led to many improvements on supplied plans as City staff and District personnel worked together to find better outcomes and avoid problems.
4. Crash analysis and information led to the deployment of resources, resulted in better use of our District staff and equipment. Several grants were obtained that allowed more attention on traffic issues within the District providing for safer roads.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The variety of innovative youth programs will be utilized to maximize positive outcomes from those youth who are ensnared within the criminal justice system.
- Habitual Offender Tracking (H.O.T.) focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their repeated criminal behavior and getting back on the right track, becoming positive and productive citizens. Those in the program will be given guidance and support to obtain employment, attend trade schools, college and the military.
- Operation Grounded are juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court mandated sanctions. The Oakland Park District will seek ways to assist and support the Department of Juvenile Probation so as to minimize the likelihood of reoffending. Emphasis will be placed to encourage public service and participation in community oriented activities.

- TOP Tier are juvenile and adults we have identified through intelligence who are likely committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution by working in tandem with the State Attorney's Office as well as Probation and Parole.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith-based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.

Attainment

1. One of the newest initiative launched this year included the District's unprecedented participation in the City's youth activities. Where in years past we would host a day to interact with the children in the program, this year saw us there over the course of four weeks with four of our deputies assigned. This allowed us direct interaction with several hundred children and the opportunity to present a variety of safety and educational programs, as well as engage participants in the many city activities.
2. The Neighborhood Response Team continues to participate and arrange a variety of activities for residents and their children. With more than 30 events a year, the unit is a valuable asset to the Oakland Park District.
3. The District's Explorer Post #301 continues to have a great deal of success and impact at Northeast High School and Rickard's Middle School. Ten cadets continue to participate in the program and all children are welcome.
4. Our H.O.T. program and Operation Grounded continue to directly impact our most at-risk youth. Weekly checks on troubled youth and close interaction with their parents or guardians assures both compliance with judicial guidelines, and quick access to resources to insure success.
5. Community Service hours are required for high school students to graduate, and are also Court mandated penalties as the result of a traffic infraction. The District, in conjunction with the Juvenile Diversion Program, the Explorer Post cadets and the mandated community service hours, has provided a program to gain those hours. The services rendered have been washing deputies' vehicles, washing message boards, and cleaning the exterior of the District Office.
6. Annual backpack distribution at City community events, schools/daycares and local churches. The District distributed more than 1070 backpacks complete with school supplies.
7. Bicycle Rodeo poses as an excellent partnership between our civic organizations such as Oakland Park Kiwanis, as well as businesses that, without their support would leave us wanting in both resources and – most importantly – human support.
8. The Oakland Park District is also very proud of its partnership with the regional Community Justice Program. This program offers voluntary counseling to those youth participating in diversion programs. The goals of the program are to reduce risk factors and maladaptive behaviors in our youth.

Our partnership includes the use of an office and counseling area which assures our Oakland Park residents have ease of access for their children to this valuable program. The on-site counselor is an invaluable resource for the District in addressing a variety of youth challenges.

9. The District has made extensive use of civil citations to avoid the stigma of a criminal record for our youth when minor discretions of the law may occur.

Moving forward the Oakland Park District and its partners in the community will address several challenges that present themselves to us. These include the growth of our community, as new businesses and residents, while a positive, do represent an ever-increasing drain on our resources. This requires that we ensure every day that we wisely use the tools in our reach. They also require that we seek assistance at every level in our efforts to increase safety and improve on a sense of community.

Youthful offenders also remain an ongoing challenge. We seek answers to the recidivism we too often see from those who live within our City and victimize their neighbors. The challenge of those who continue to break the law despite repeated arrests will require a larger solution and we will work diligently to seek those answers with the assistance of the community as a whole.

Perhaps the biggest challenge of all is the need to remain steadfast and energized in our ongoing struggle to improve daily. Too often the temptation of our current victories may dissuade us from continuing the fight. I invite everyone to recognize that we are all in this together, and that the fight will not have an end but the reward will be in the success of our community and what we pass on to others. I am thankful to our Sheriff, Scott Israel, the elected officials of our City, the City staff and my many talented coworkers, for allowing me the opportunity to work with you all towards the great vision that has been created here in Oakland Park. Subject: Annual 2016 Crime Analysis

Attached is the 2016 Crime Statistical Report for the Oakland Park District. Comparing 2016 to 2015. The crime category with an increase was Burglary Conveyance, Larceny – All Other and Larceny – Shoplifting. Burglary Residence has again decreased by -26% overall. The district is showing an increase in Part 1 crimes for 2016 of 14% (287 additional crimes). Part 2 crimes for 2016 decreased by -15% (163 fewer crimes).

Auto Theft

- During this year, there were 192 vehicles stolen with 127 of them recovered and returned to the owner. February, July, September, October and November the district experienced an increase in auto thefts in these months. Of the 127 recoveries, 107 were recovered in Broward and 20 in Dade County. Of the 54 recoveries in Broward, 54 of those were recovered in Oakland Park. The most common stolen make was Chevrolet (13), Ford (18), Honda (15), Toyota (16) and Nissan (5). 45 of the stolen vehicles were either cleared by arrest, unfounded or exceptions (victim refused to press charges).

Burglary Conveyance

- During this year, there was an increase in burglary conveyances compared to 2015 (32%). The two highest months during 2016 were, January and November. This increase in burglary conveyances occurred in the east section of the city in three zones. Ten action plans were initiated and adjusted as the trends and patterns developed and changed. 55 of the burglary conveyances were either cleared by arrest, unfounded or exceptions (victim refused to press charges).

Burglary Residence

- During 2016, January 2016 reported the highest number of residential burglaries of 54. With the continued emphasis by district staff, intelligence gathering, deployment of resources and education, the district maintained a continued reduction on this area. Five action plans were initiated and adjusted as the trends and patterns developed and changed.

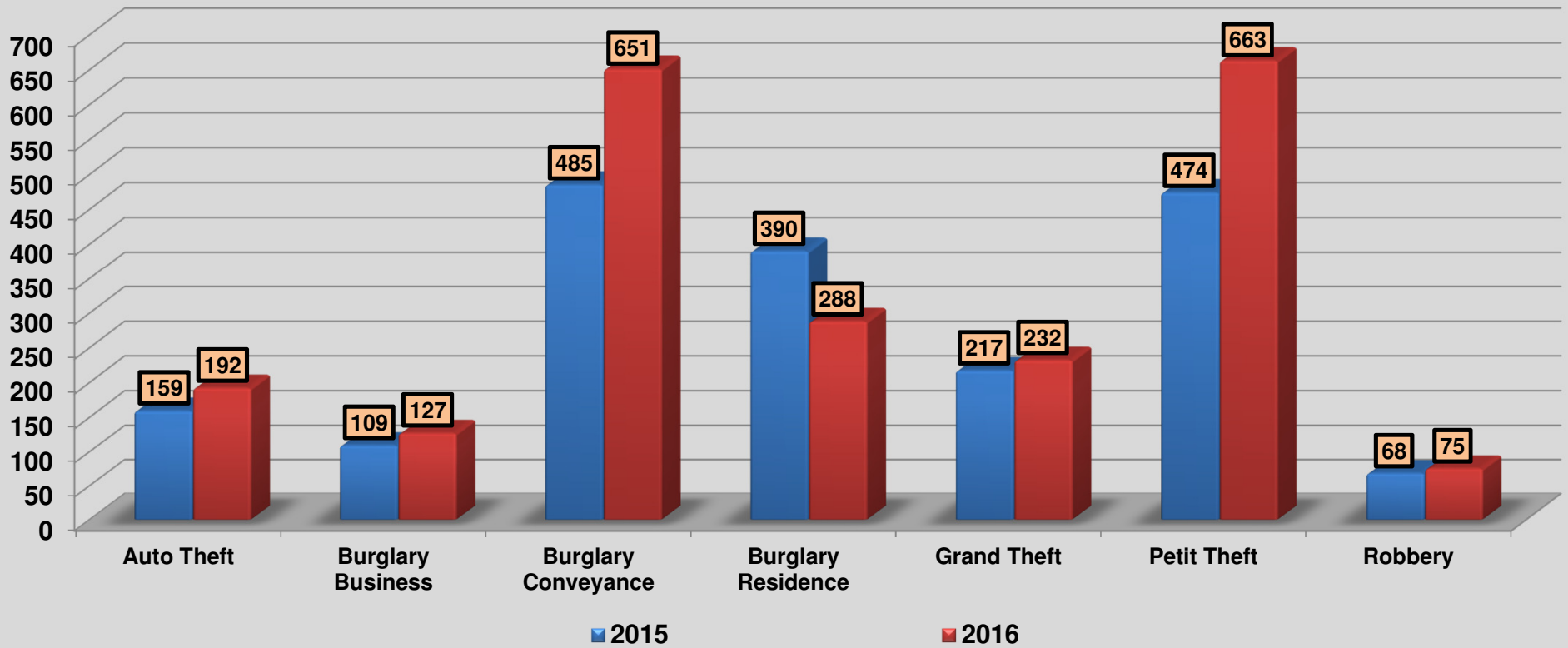

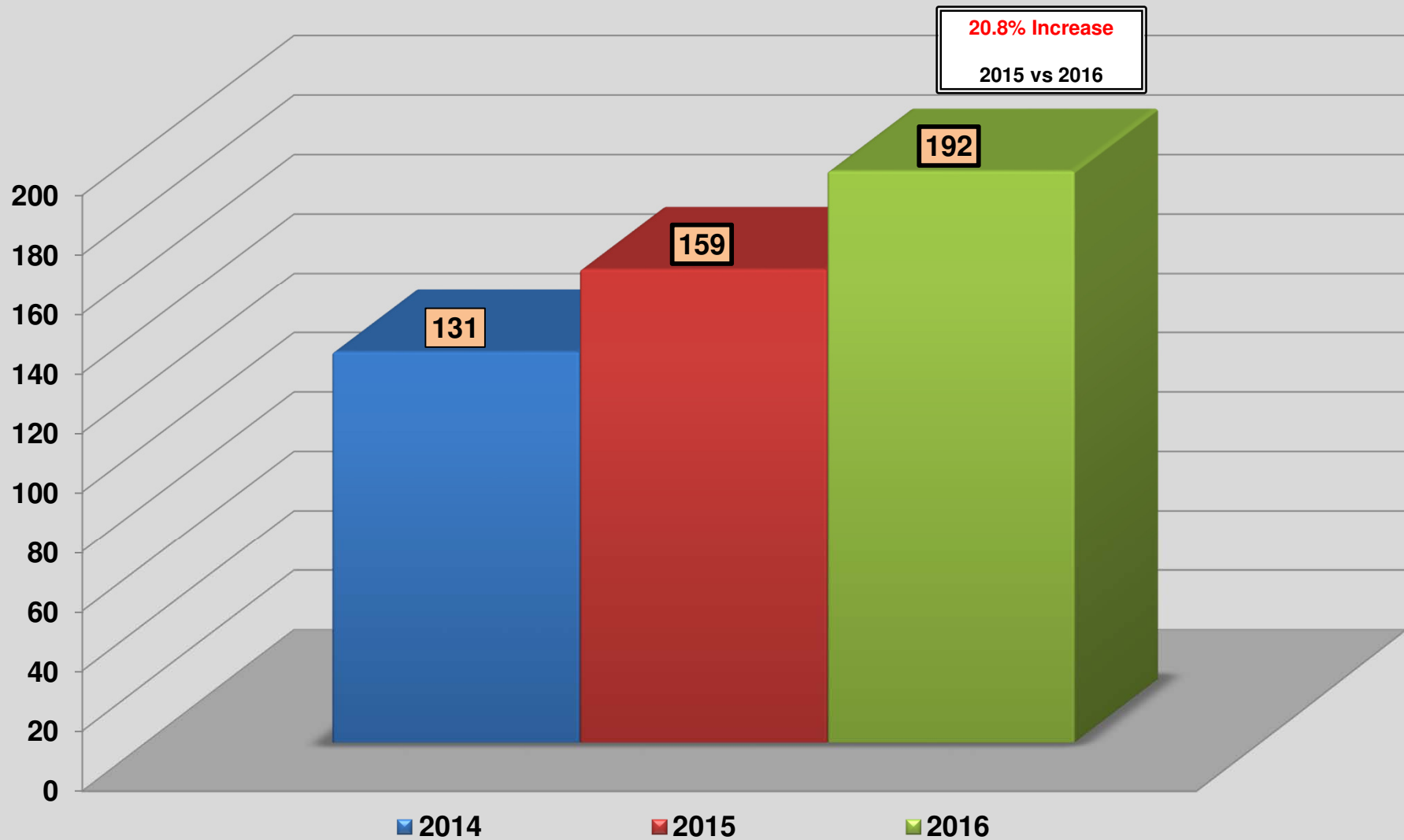
City of Oakland Park Year to Date Comparison 2015 vs 2016

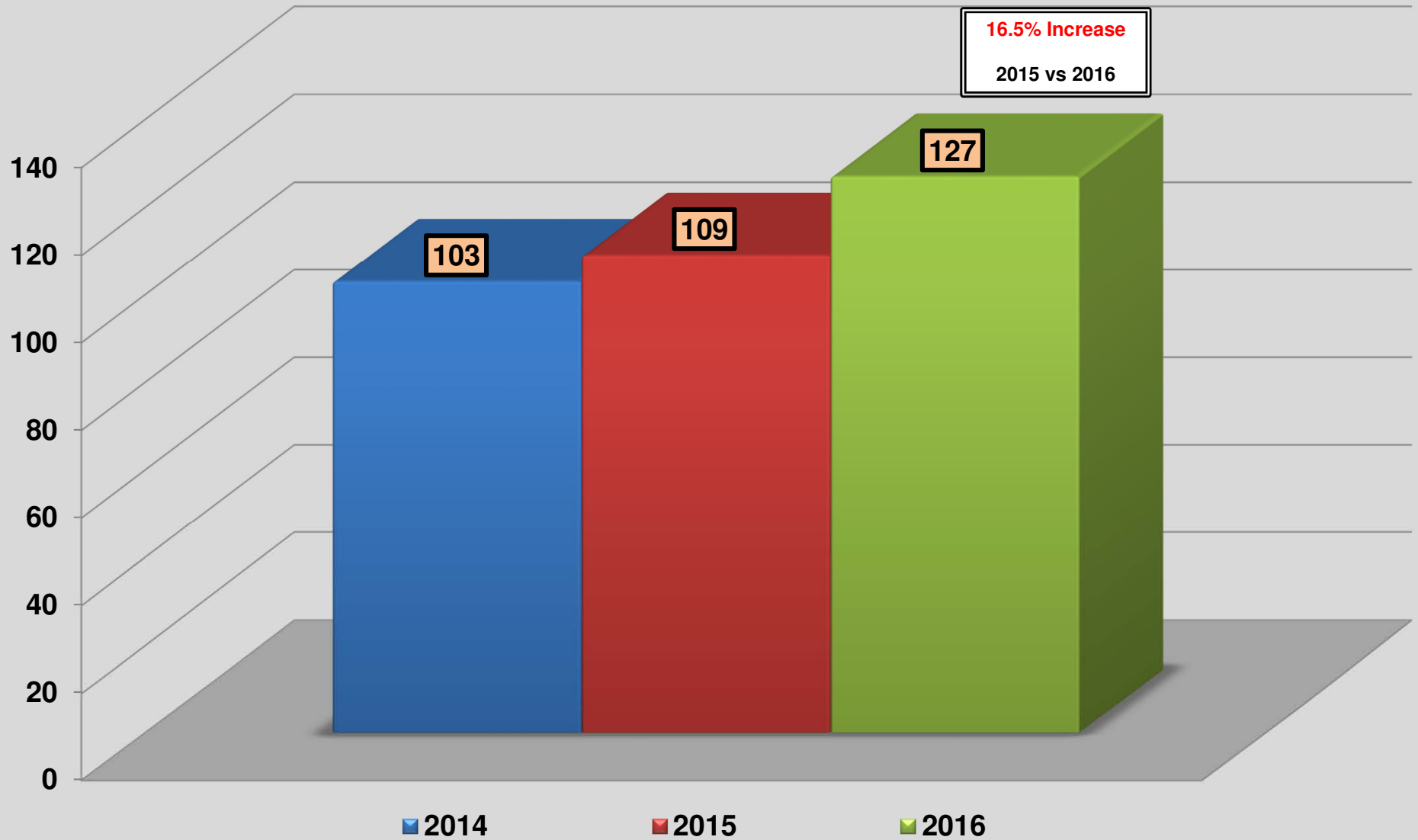
City of Oakland Park - YTD Comparison *Auto Theft*



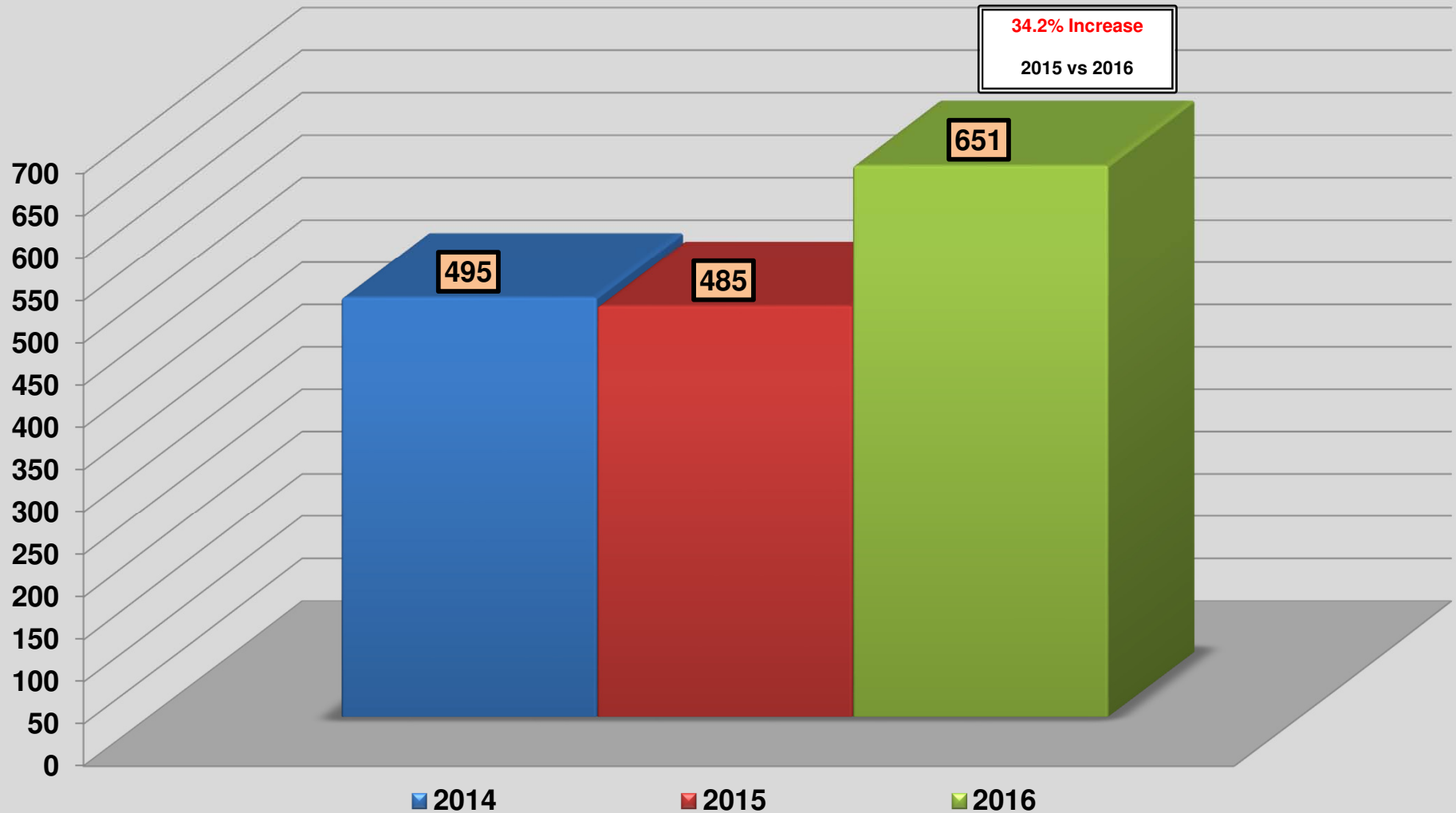

City of Oakland Park - YTD Comparison *Burglary Business*



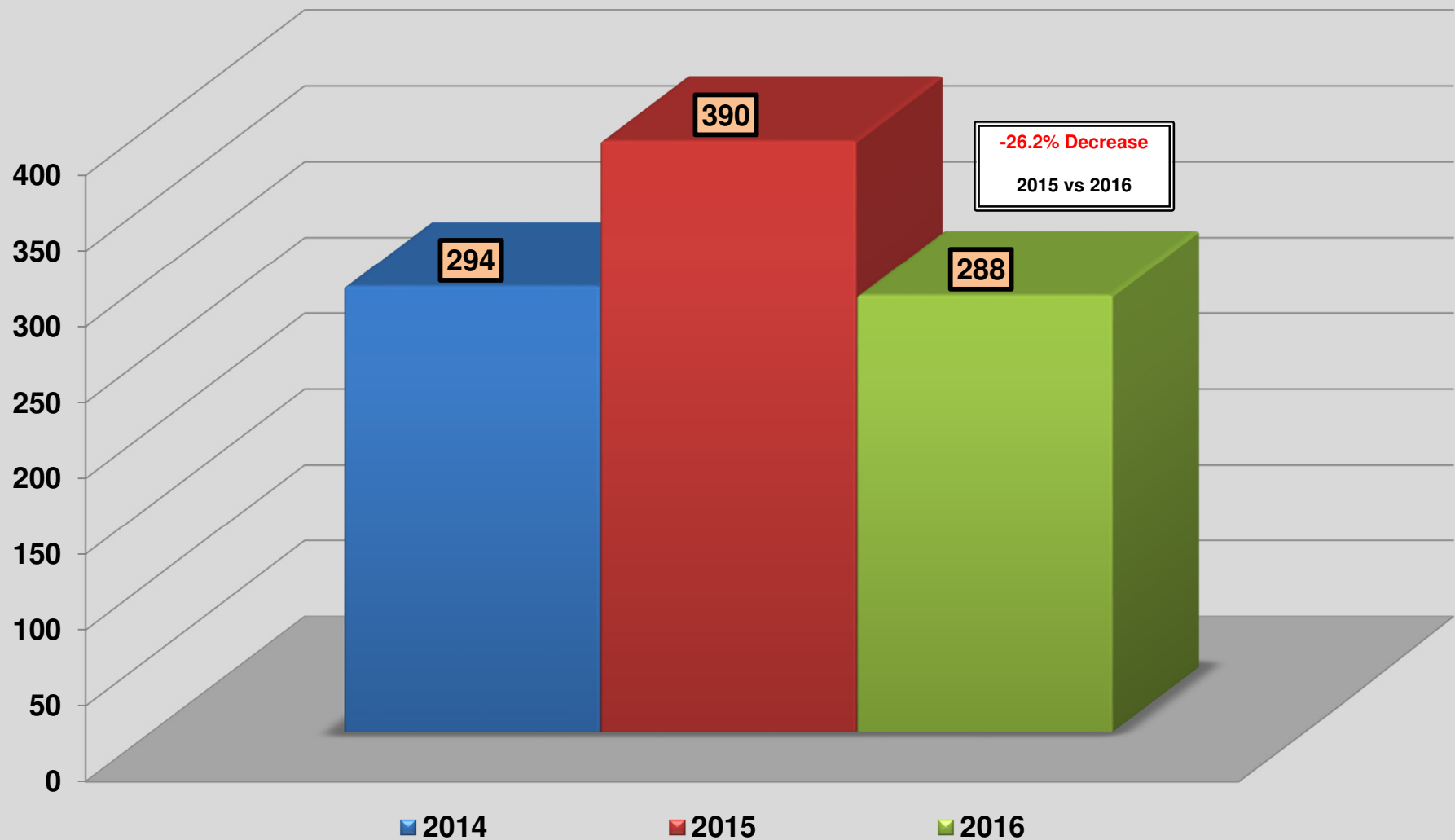
City of Oakland Park - YTD Comparison *Burglary Conveyance*

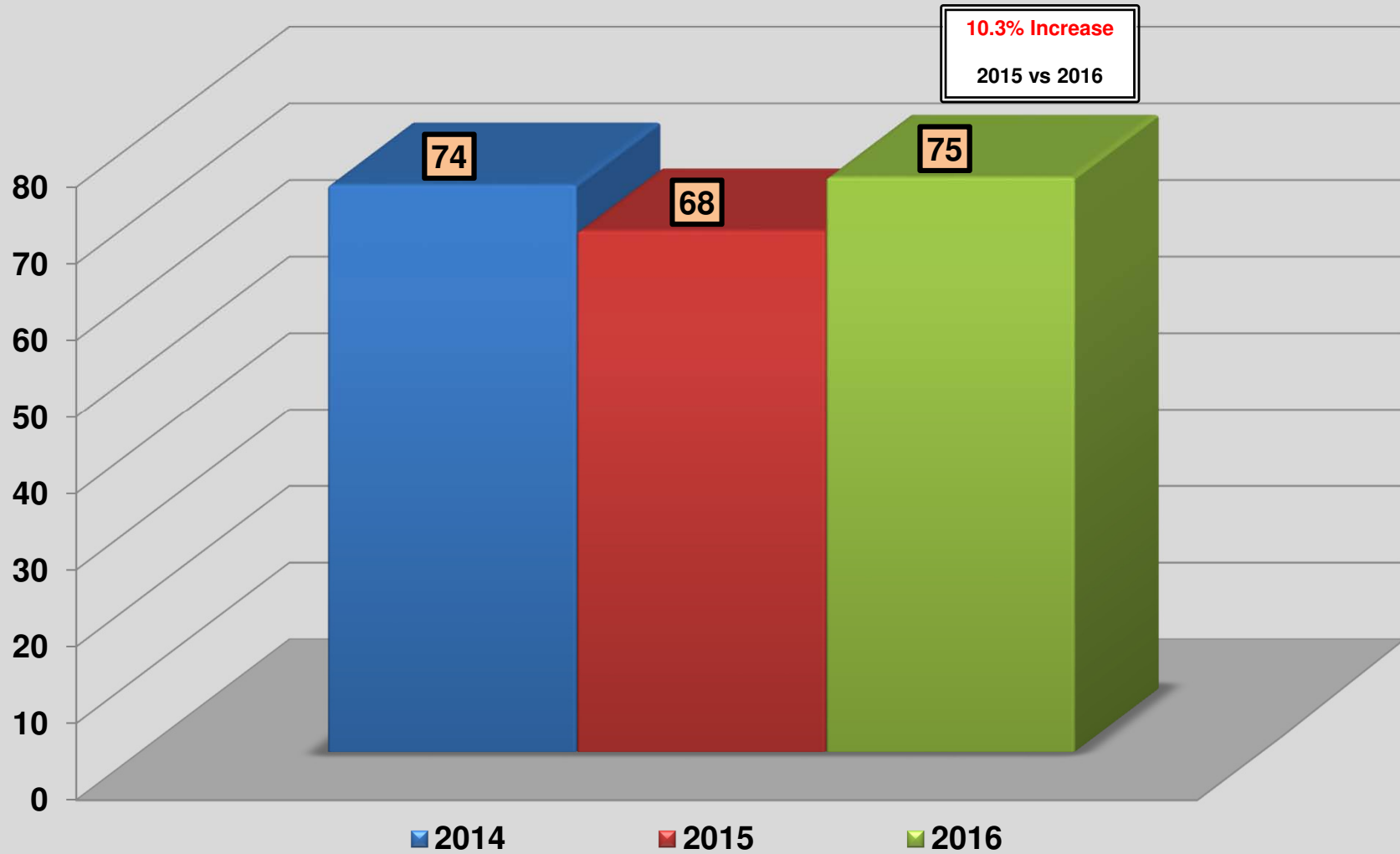
City of Oakland Park - YTD Comparison *Burglary Residence*

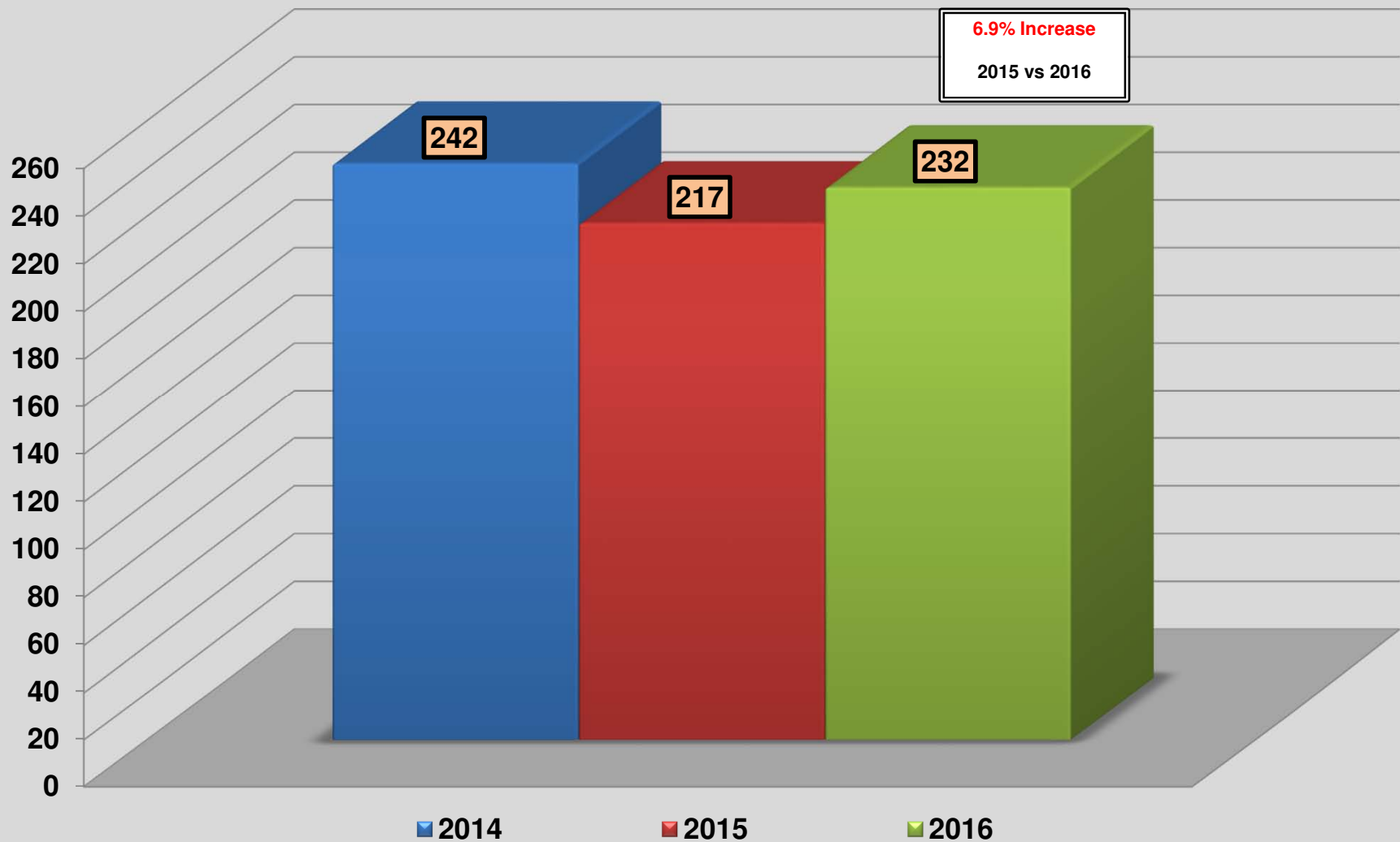
City of Oakland Park - YTD Comparison *Robbery*

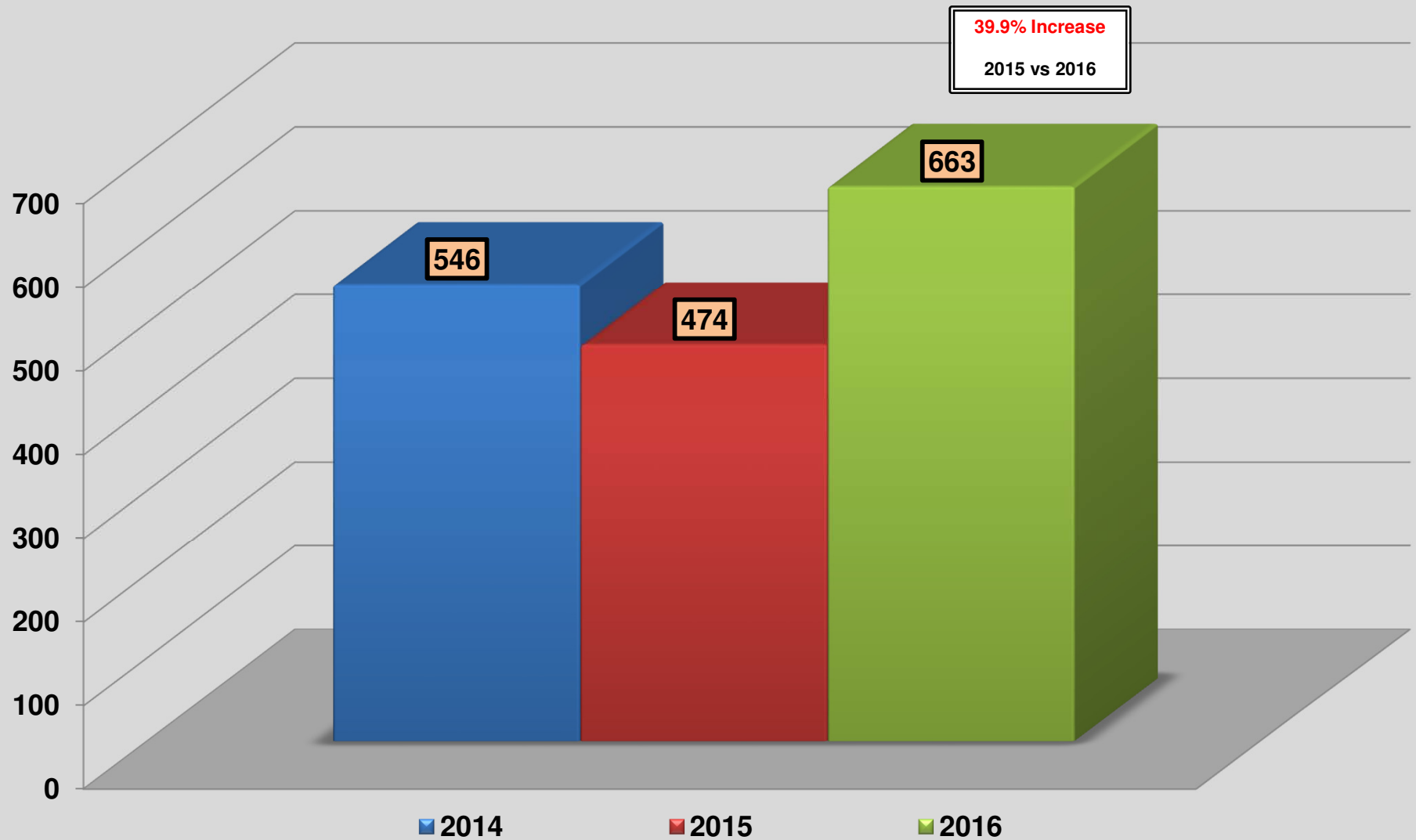
City of Oakland Park - YTD Comparison *Grand Theft*

City of Oakland Park - YTD Comparison *Petit Theft*

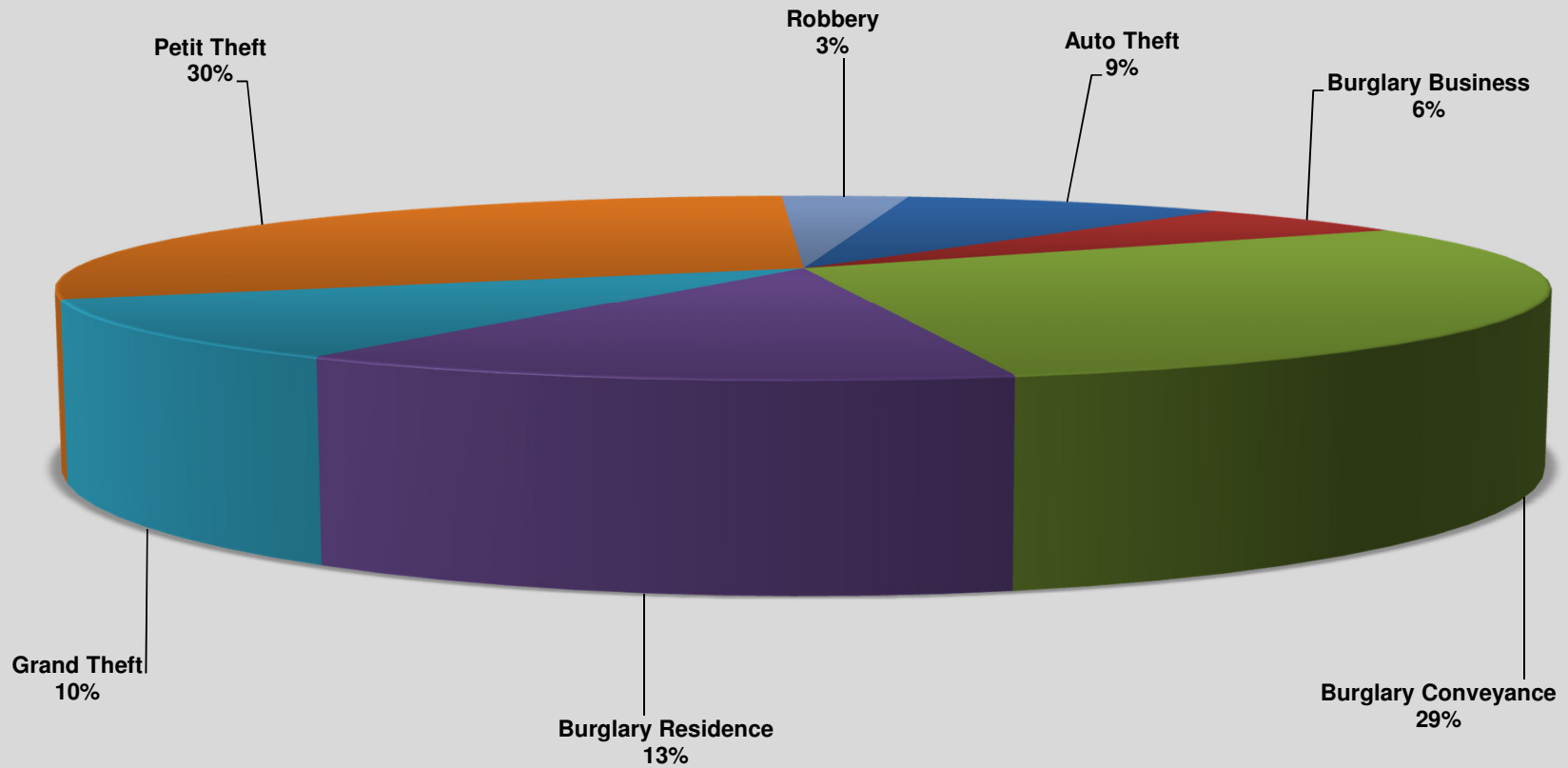

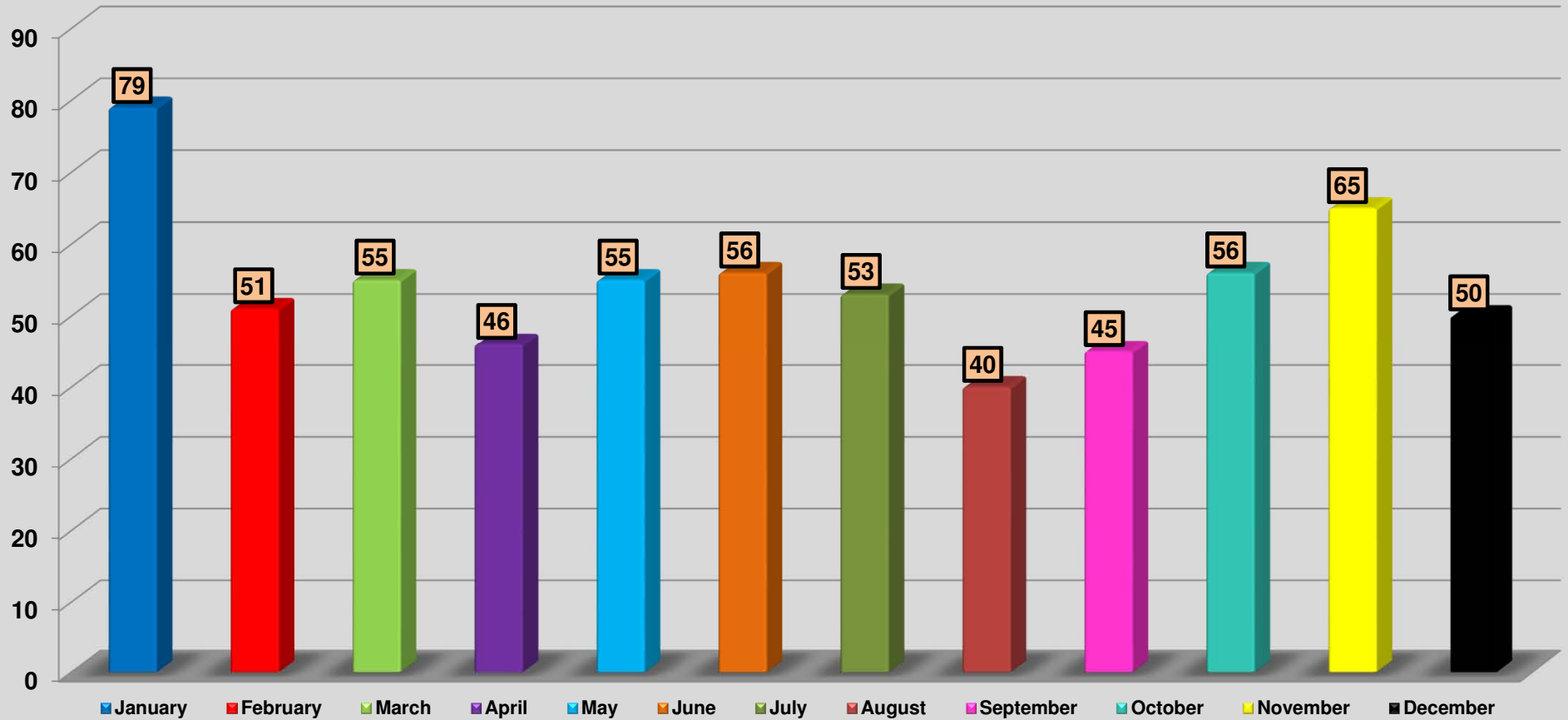
Florida State Statute Crimes - YTD 2016

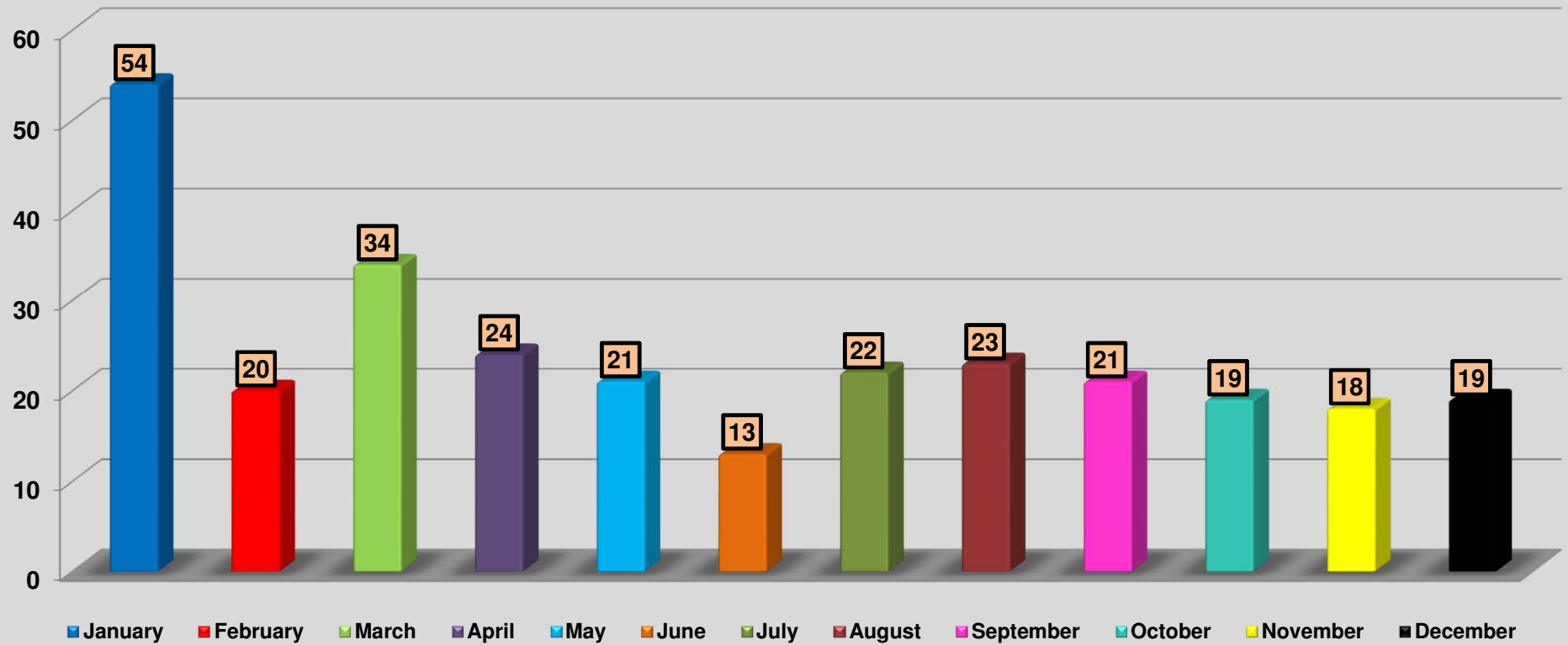
City of Oakland Park - 2016 Burglary Conveyance

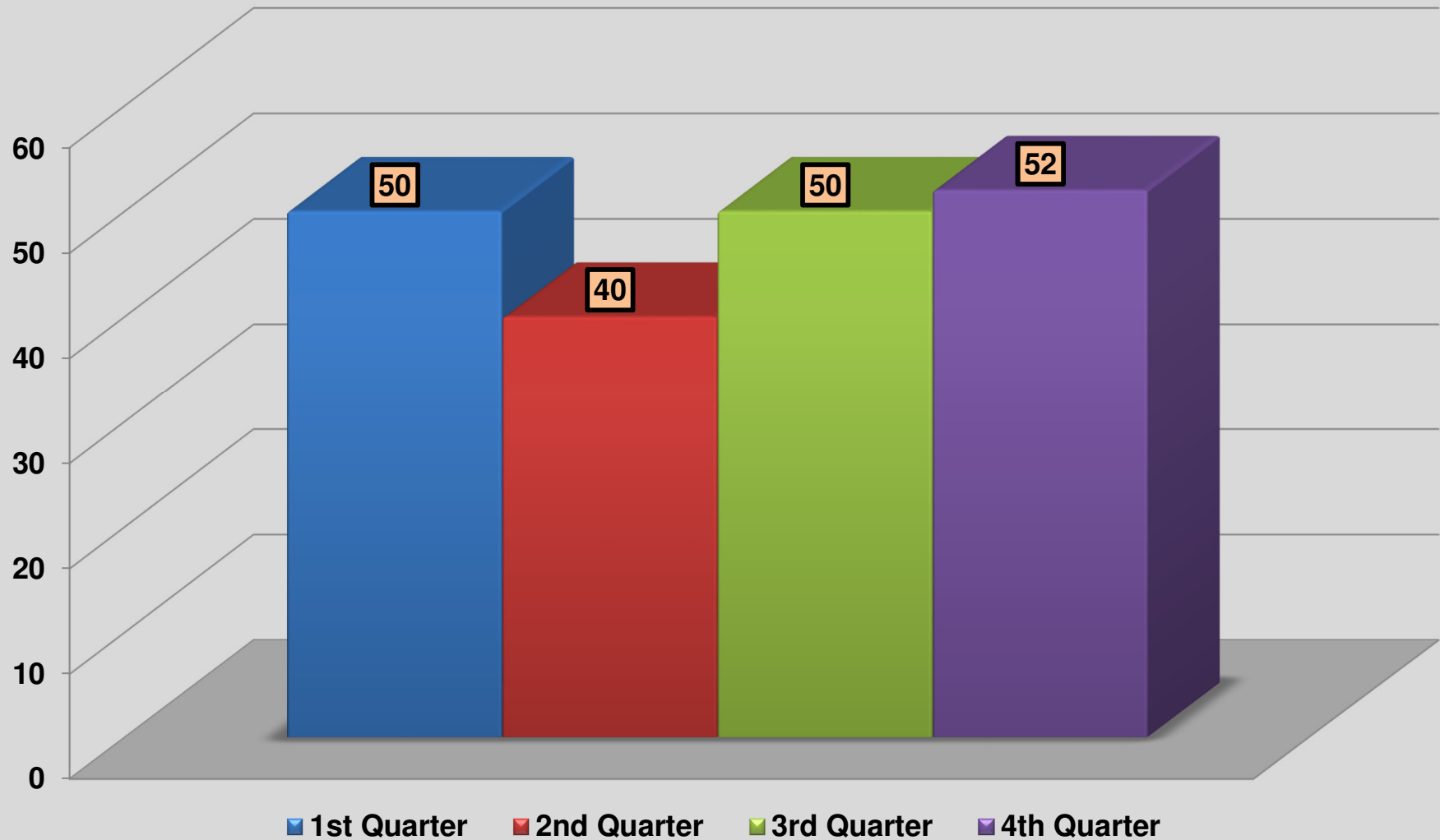
City of Oakland Park - 2016 Burglary Residence



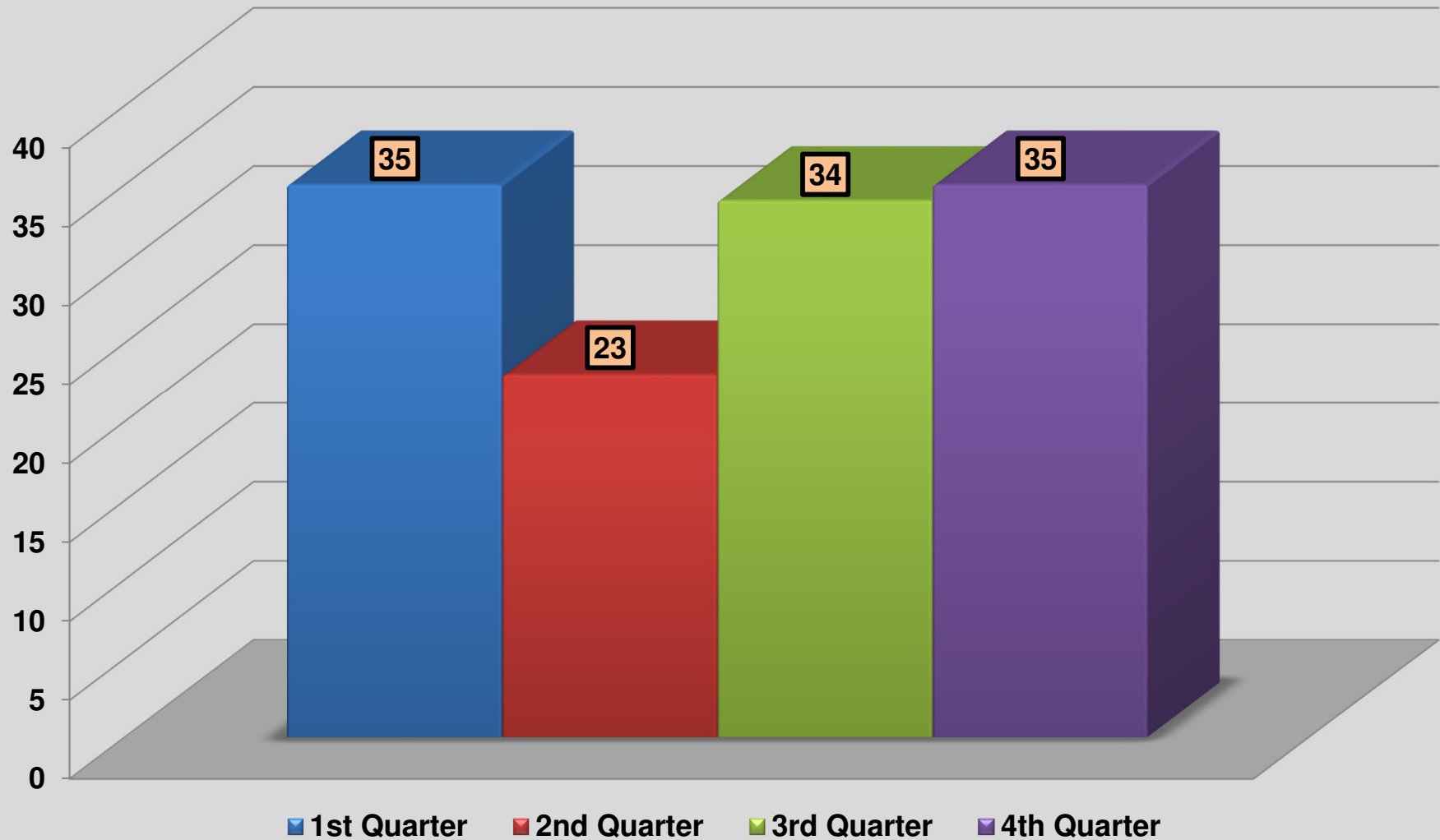

City of Oakland Park - 2016 Quarter Comparison *Auto Theft*



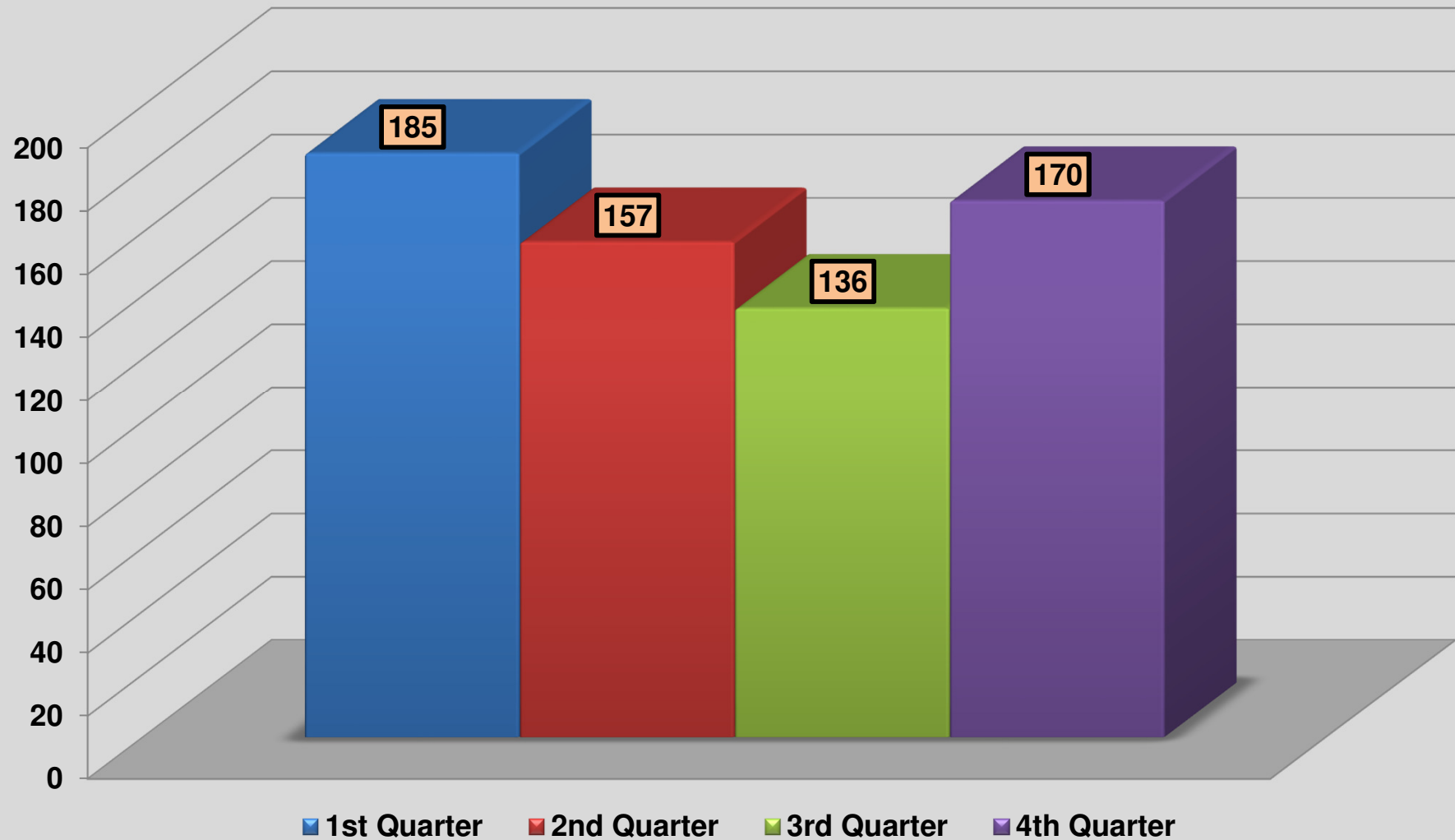
City of Oakland Park - 2016 Quarter Comparison *Burglary Business*

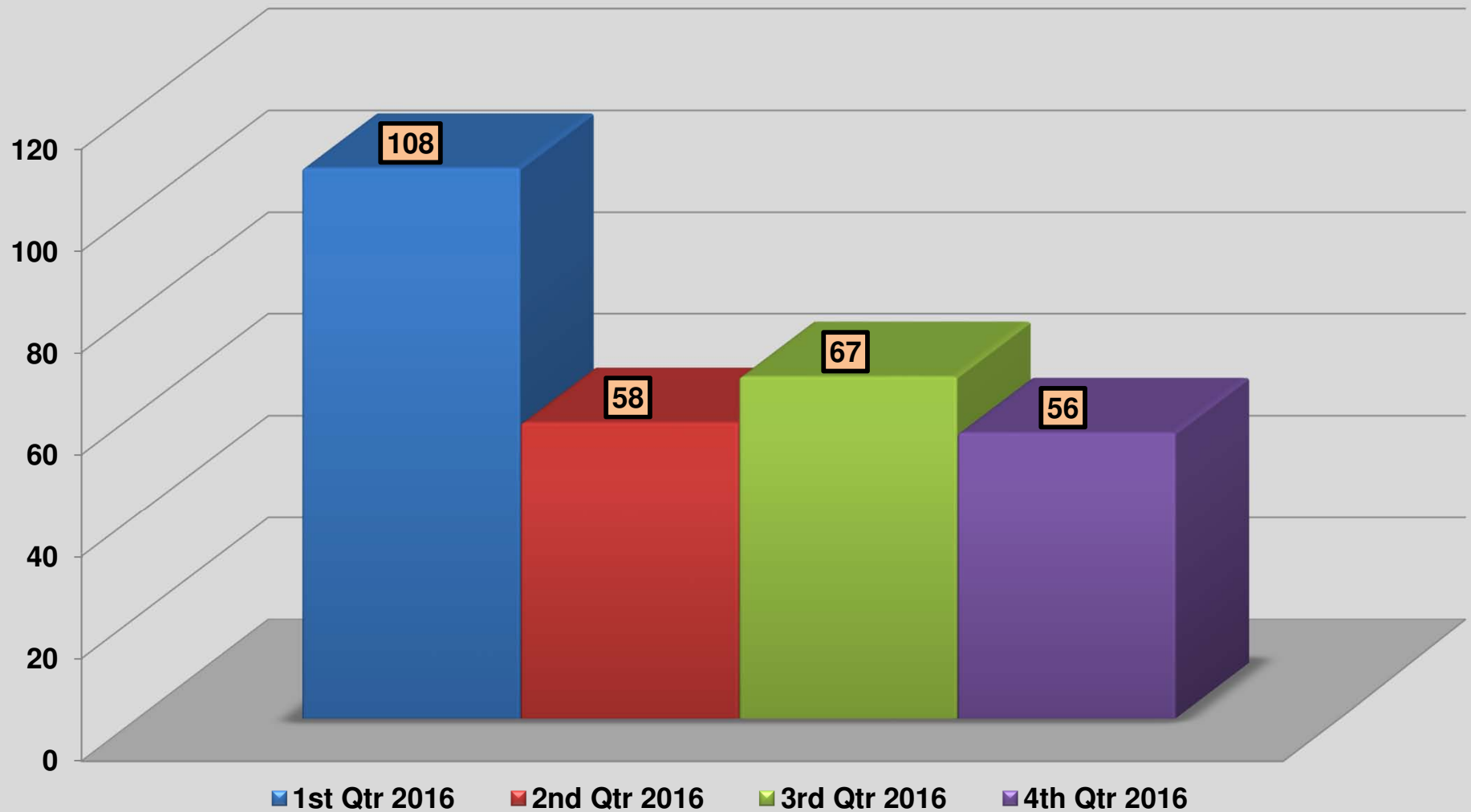
City of Oakland Park - 2016 Quarter Comparison *Burglary Conveyance*

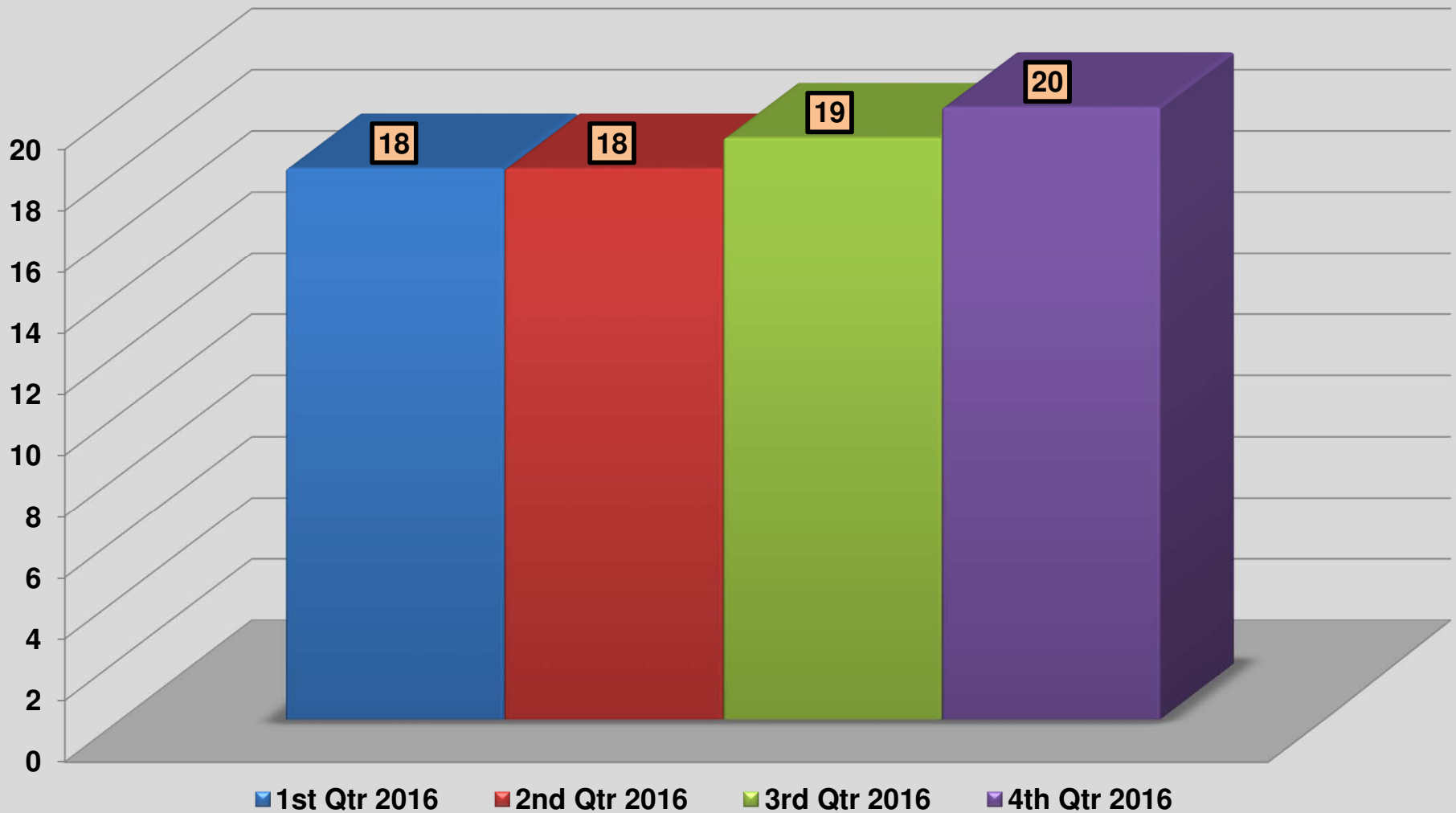

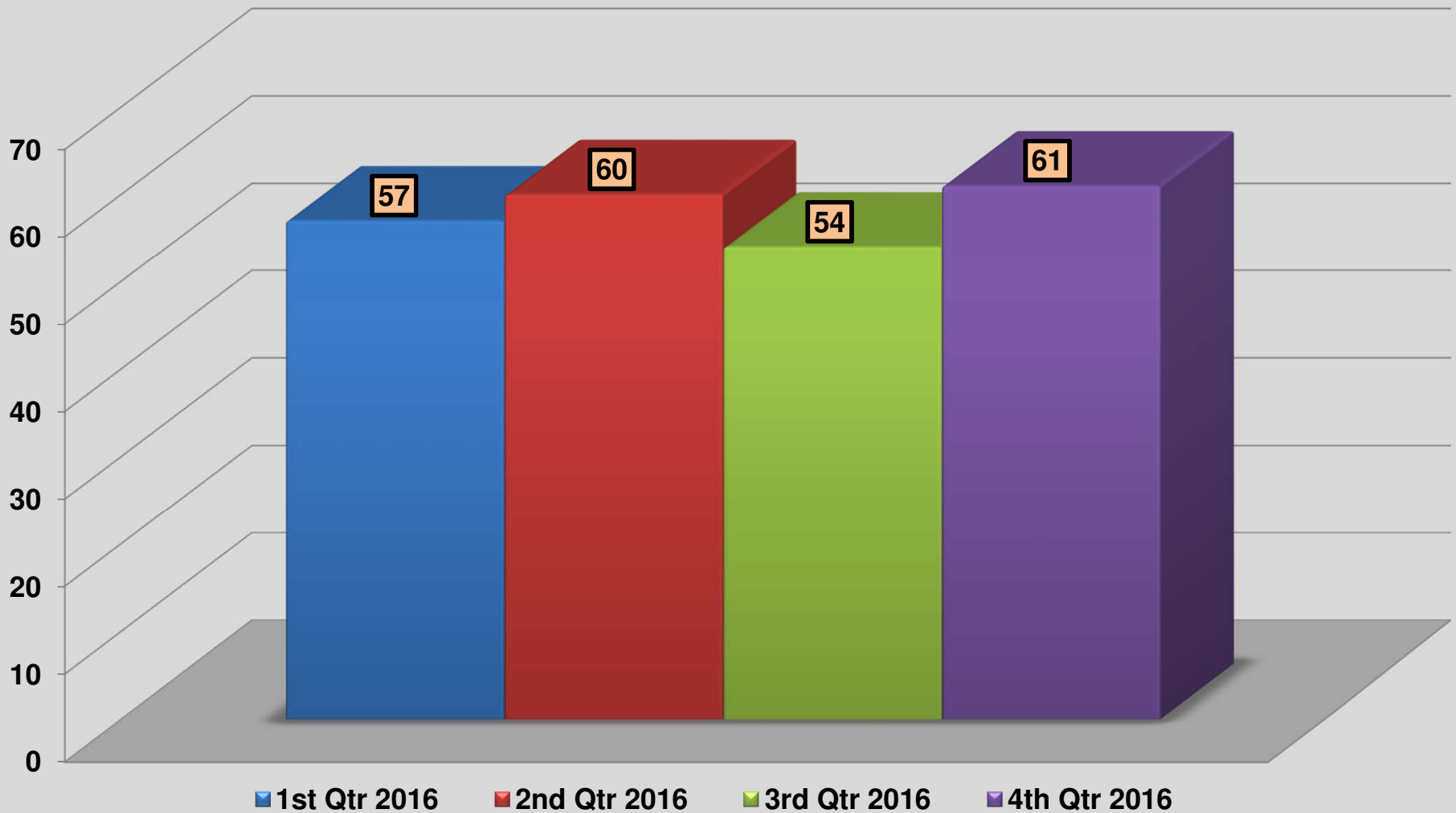

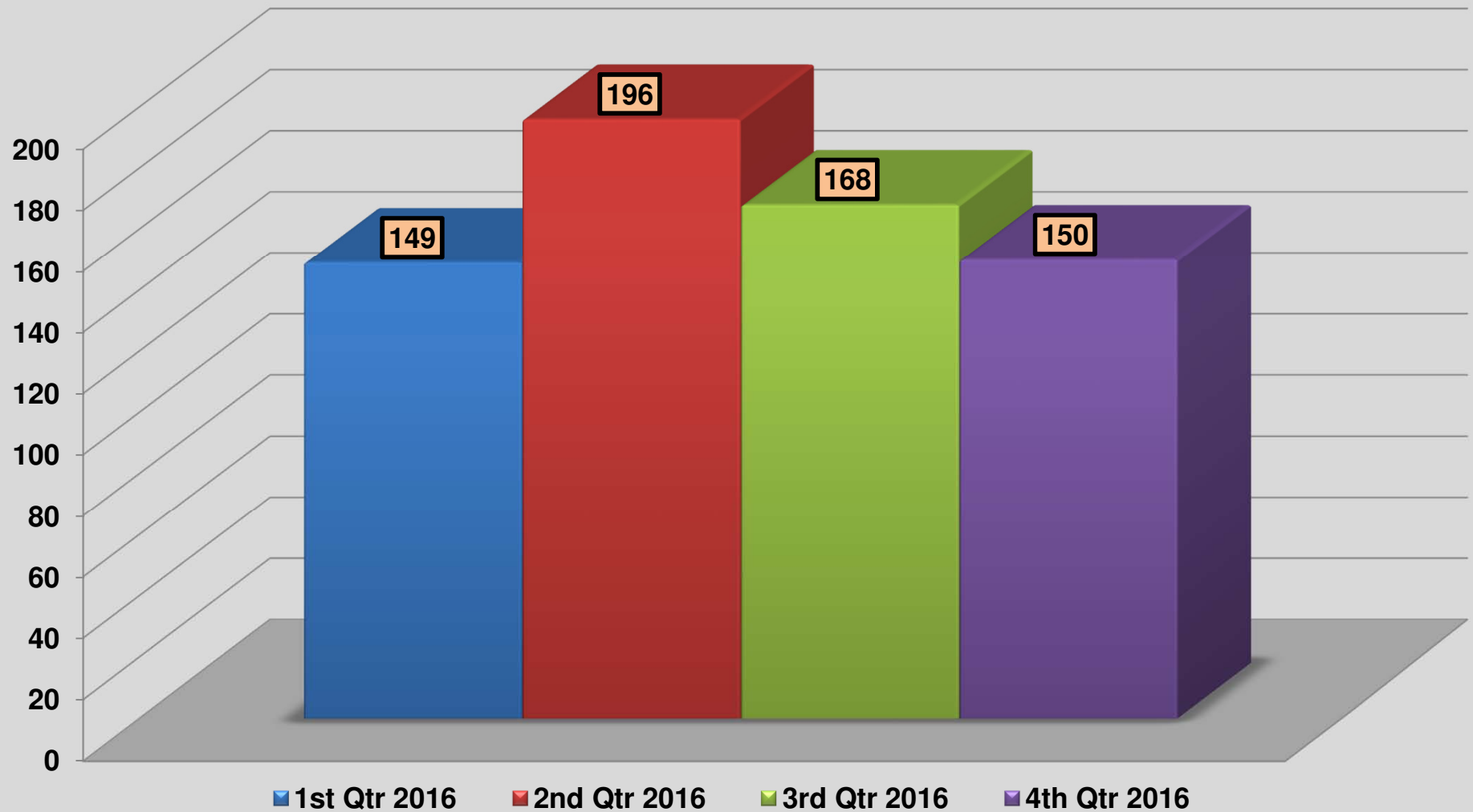
City of Oakland Park - 2016 Quarter Comparison *Grand Theft*

Subject: 4th Quarterly Report - 2016

The fourth quarter of 2016 saw several challenges for the Oakland Park District. The district's primary goal of burglary residence reduction saw exceptional success with over a forty percent decrease over activity in the fourth quarter last year. The partnership between alert residents, our BSO deputies and the City Officials continues to harden our City and our homes against victimization. This decrease in crime category can often lead to increases in others as our criminal elements adapt to anti-crime efforts. This appears to be the case during this quarter as robbery and other lesser crimes such as auto theft saw some increases which were quickly recognized during the weekly analysis meetings and addressed. Several arrests of note were made this quarter. (See attached). All data will be gathering including this fourth quarter report for the annual report which will look at the year in whole and our successes and challenges moving forward to 2017.

Our community outreach remains a strong focus of the Oakland Park District. We were honored this year to have one of our exceptional deputies Lauren Apollo recognized both locally and throughout the county during the quarter. This included "deputy of the year" from the Oakland Park Business Group, the TRIAD Council, as well as Impact Broward. To win such recognition from three independent organizations is proof positive of the exceptional work she does every day as part of our community outreach team here in Oakland Park.

Crime Developments – 4th Quarter

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address the emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify the suspects, curb future crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes.

- CrimeMapping.com is designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI) is GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView/Desktop is a new software technology that allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program. The cornerstone of this foundation is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. These tactics are implemented effectively by constant training and evaluating our efforts. The patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe, and get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implantation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.

The District developed a program in the district that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens and visitors of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output: (JuMP) – Juvenile Monitoring Portal.

1. The School Resource Officers are tasked with this portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SOA, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamentals to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
2. The Crime Suppression Team is assigned to monitor those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the juveniles and their parents to discuss the juvenile's curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with the Juvenile SOA and Juvenile Probation are all fundamentals to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
3. The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible those individuals – both juvenile and adults that have identified through intelligence who are committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.

In order to continually maintain crime reductions it will be necessary to retool, reinvigorate and refocus our efforts. These efforts must be coordinated with all units in this district and driven by leveraging all available technology to pinpoint, or as close as possible, predict where crime is going to occur. In order to accomplish this task, the three units within the District are brought together to share intelligence, crime analysis, current trends and apprehensions. The units that are responsible for this programs are:

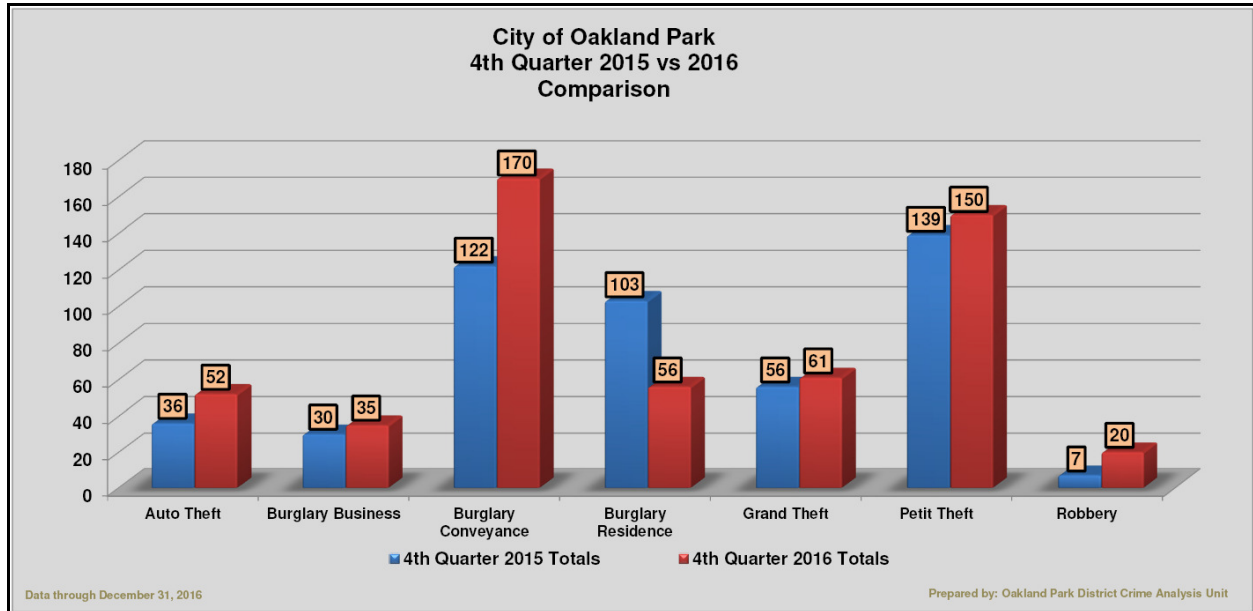

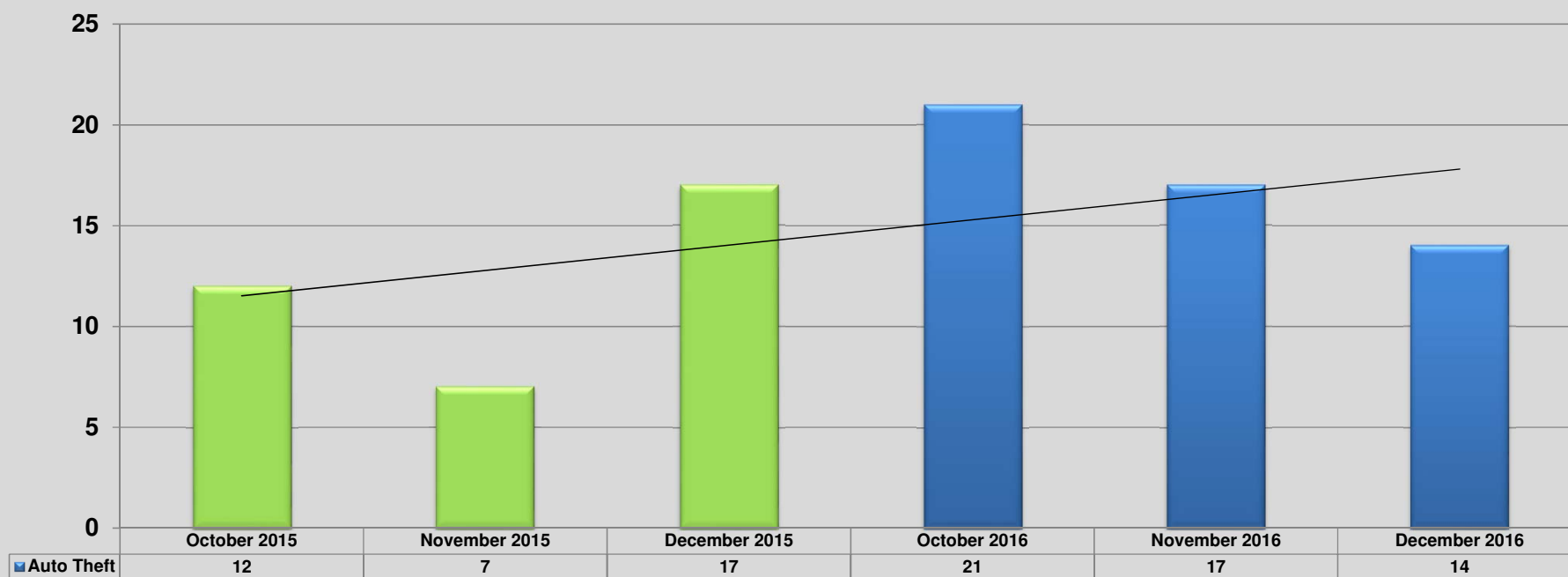

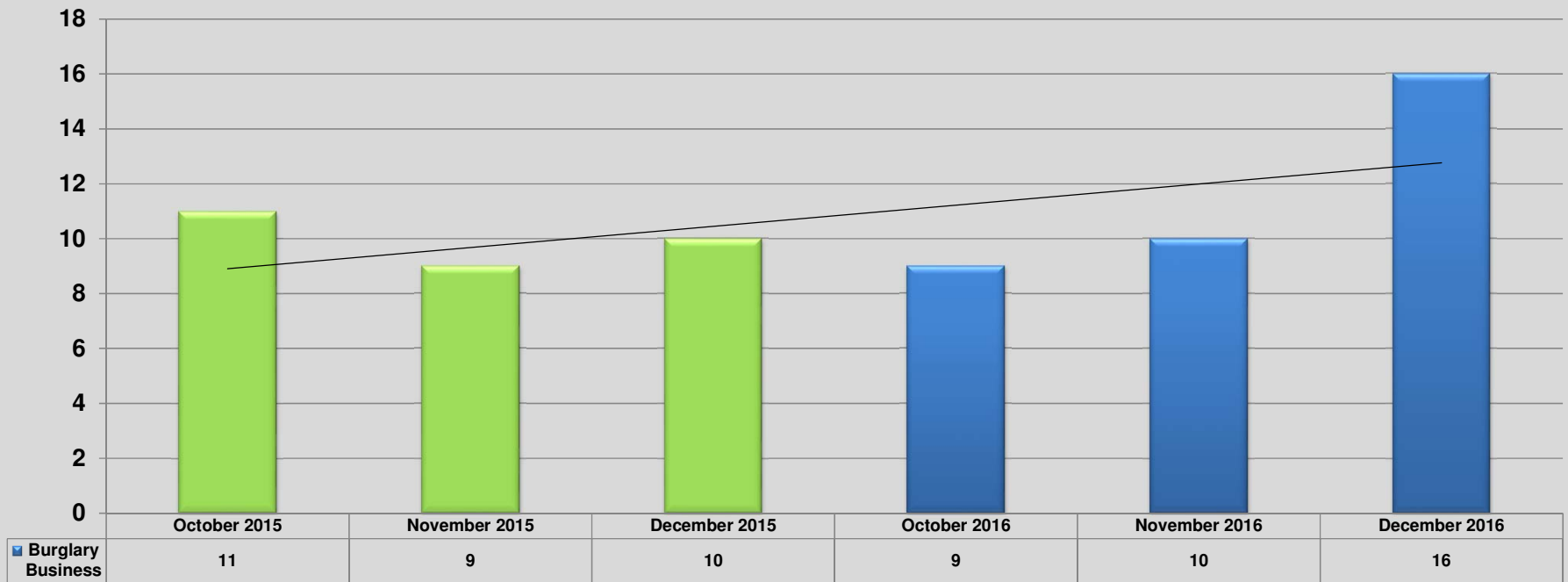
City of Oakland Park - Comparison 4th Quarter 2015 vs 2016 *Auto Theft*

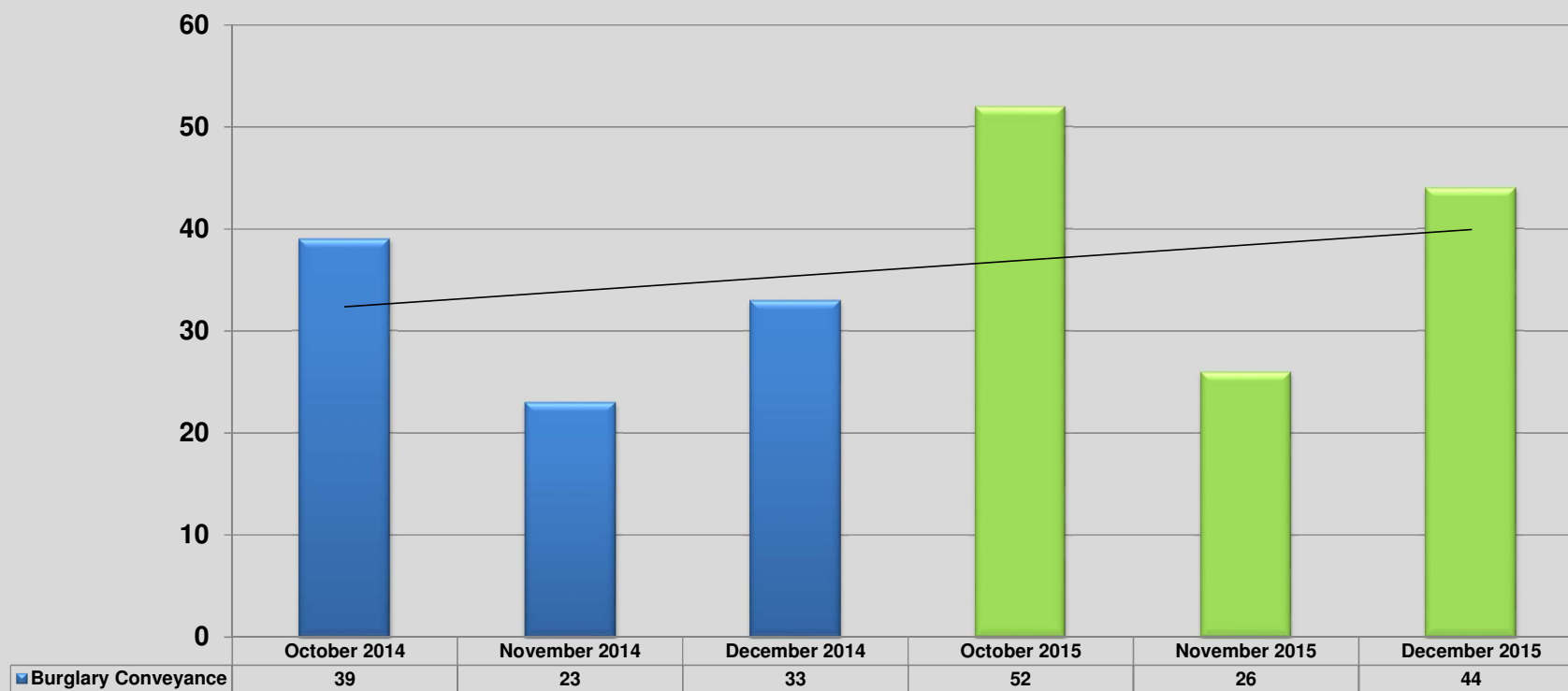
**City of Oakland Park - Comparison

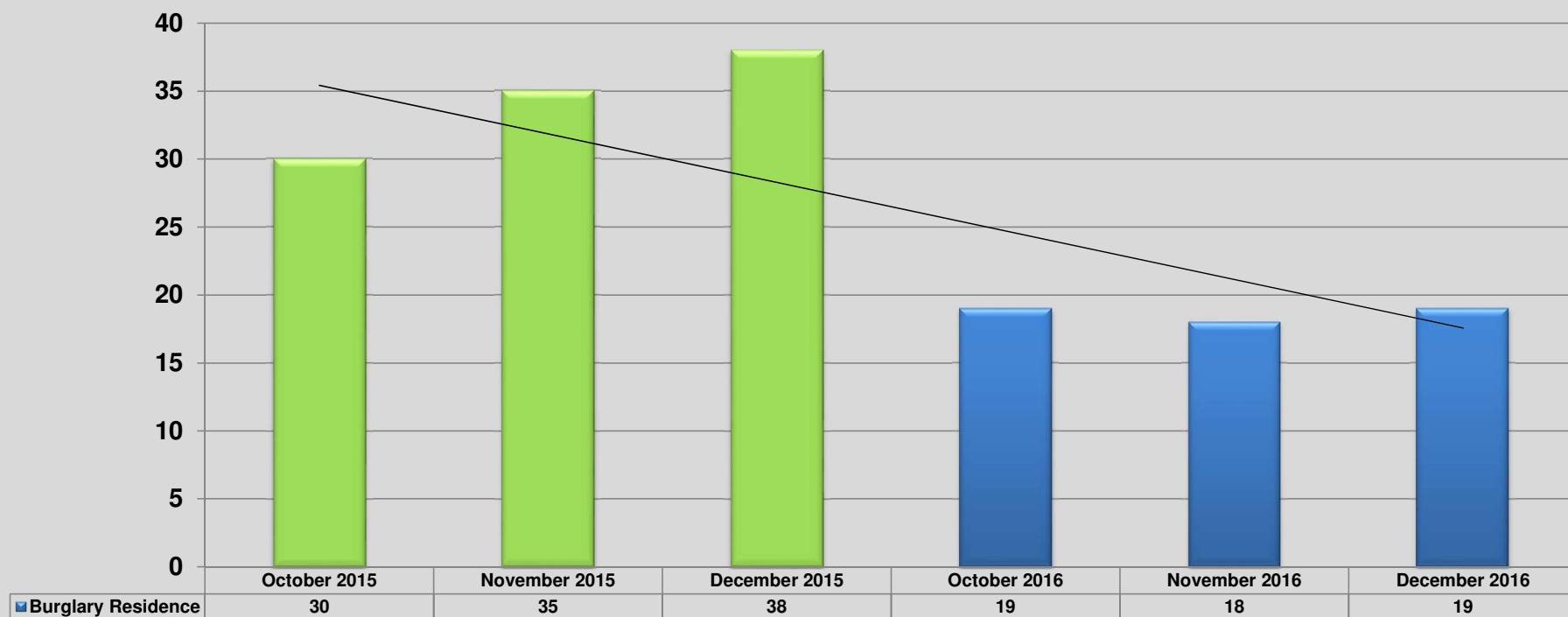

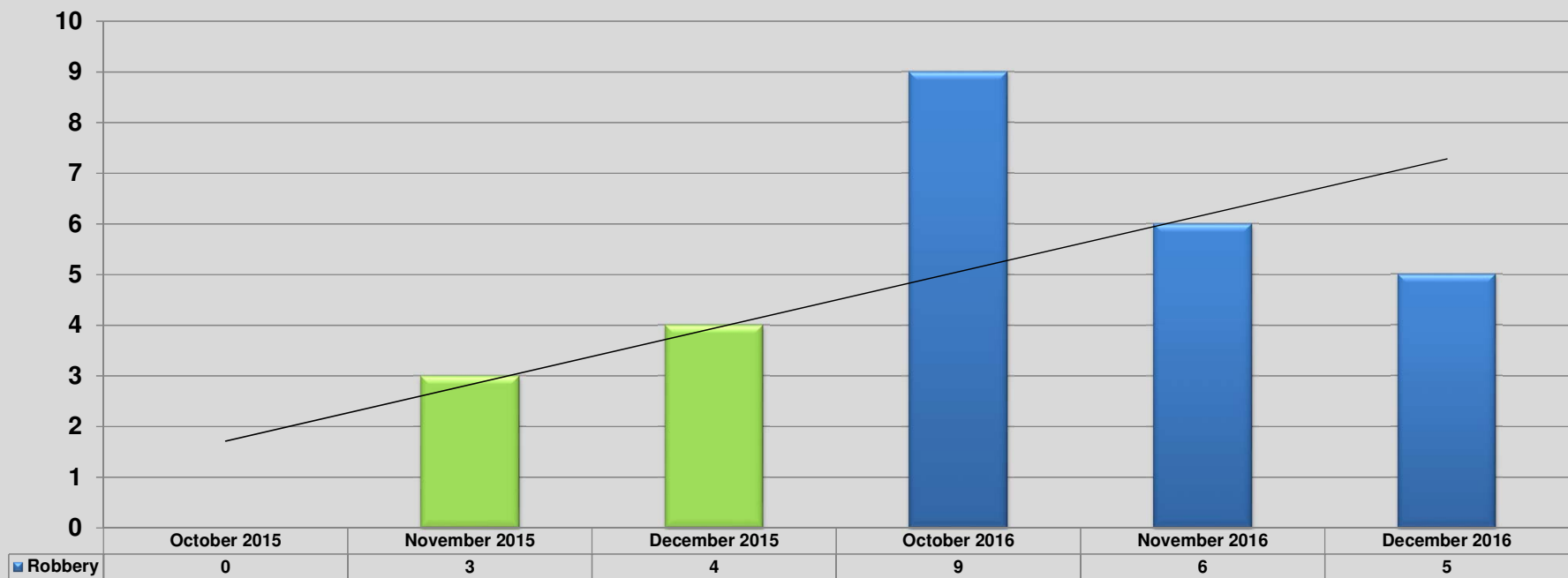
City of Oakland Park - Comparison 4th Quarter 2015 vs 2016 *Burglary Residence*

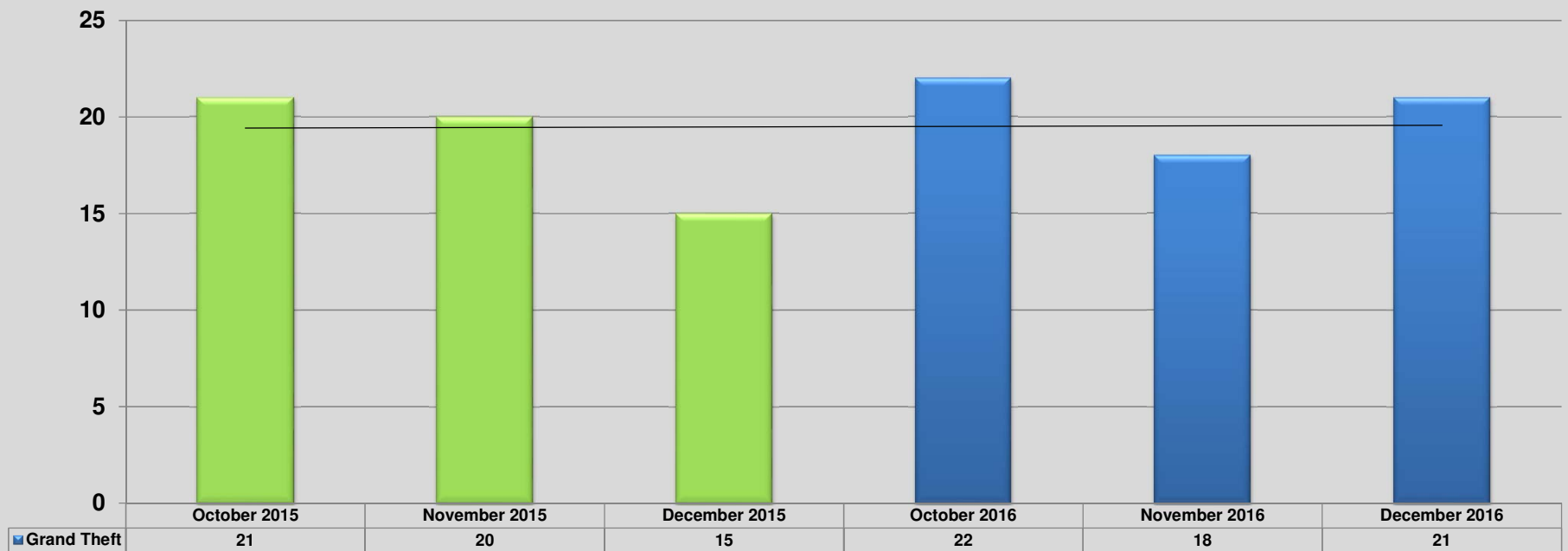
City of Oakland Park - Comparison 4th Quarter 2015 vs 2016 *Robbery*

Occupied Burglary Residence Arrest

On 10/2/16, victim reported that 2 juvenile black males were attempting to steal things from his residence, and that they did not know he was home. Deputies detained 2 subjects matching the victim's descriptions. A show-up was conducted in which victim positively identified the detained subjects, who are known burglars. Post-Miranda, the subjects admitted to the burglary. Both were charged accordingly and transported to JAC.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 10/18/16, victim observed 3 juvenile black males inside his vehicle, which was parked outside his residence. When confronted, the subjects fled toward Boyd Anderson. Two of them were eventually apprehended. Post-Miranda, the 2 juveniles denied any involvement in the burglary, claiming they were in the complex with a third juvenile subject to visit some girls. When the two subjects were placed together, they began discussing their stories and eventually implicated themselves in the burglary. They were charged and transported to JAC.

Burglary School/Structure Arrest

On 10/22/16, deputies responded to Rickards Middle School in reference to an audible alarm, possible burglary in progress. A perimeter was established, search conducted and 2 suspects were taken into custody. A review of the school video surveillance revealed 4 subjects had entered the school with a crowbar and attempted to gain entry into the vending machines, damaging all four in the process.

Deputies later observed a suspicious vehicle parked in the area and contact was made with 3 subjects. One of the subjects was found to have been involved in the burglary at Rickards Middle School. Two of the suspects requested legal counsel. The third suspect provided a full confession, implicating his co-defendants. All were charged accordingly.

Armed Burglary Residence/Aggravated Battery Arrest

On 10/26/16, suspect broke into victim's residence armed with a pair of scissors while victim was outside with her boyfriend (victim #2). When victim opened the door, suspect lunged from behind the door and stabbed victim #2 with the scissors. Victim #2 struck suspect in the head with a flashlight in self-defense. Both suspect and victim #2 were transported to North Broward for treatment. Suspect was charged with Armed Burglary and Aggravated Battery.

Grand Theft Arrest

On 10/28/16, deputies responded to an Oakland Park Boulevard business in regards to a theft. The business owner advised she conducted an internal investigation of her bookkeeping after noticing several discrepancies. Her investigation revealed that one of her employees had been masking cash payments made by customers as credit card transactions and pocketing the cash. The transactions dated back to March 2016, and totaled almost \$9,000. Post-Miranda, subject confessed her involvement and was charged accordingly.

Shooting Arrest

On 11/1/16, at 0408 hours, deputies were dispatched to a disturbance-noise call located at 301 NW 51st Court. At approximately 0413 hours, there was a second call in reference to an assault that just occurred at 210 NW 51st Ct. A third call was dispatched at 0416 hours, advising a shooting just occurred.

Upon arrival, deputies met with the suspect, who advised that he was assaulted by several people who were outside of 220 NW 51st Ct when he confronted them about playing loud music from their vehicles. Suspect advised that a young female shoved him and 4 males started punching him. Suspect returned to his residence and had his wife call 9-1-1.

While deputies were on-scene, 2 subjects (1 male and 1 female) advised deputies that they were occupants at 220 NW 51st Ct, and while they were inside sleeping, they heard glass shattering in the living room and items hitting the wall of the residence. The male subject advised it appeared that projectiles were coming through the walls and windows.

A neighbor who lives directly across from the suspect witnessed suspect shooting a firearm in the direction of 220 NW 51st Ct. A total of 17 spent shell casings were located in front of suspect's residence. Suspect was arrested and charged accordingly.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 11/25/16, victim and witnesses observed suspect in their Dodge Grand Caravan and then watched as he attempted to enter their Nissan Altima. Victim and witnesses attempted to detain subject while calling 9-1-1, but subject fled on foot to his father's residence. Subject located hiding in the back seat of family member's vehicle that was leaving father's residence after a party. Post-Miranda, subject confessed to 3 vehicle burglaries and 5 other unreported burglaries, but was unable to describe the other vehicles or locations due to intoxication.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 11/26/16, victim discovered that his van had been broken into and observed a black male in the parking lot walking back and forth between parked vehicles. When victim confronted him, subject fled and jumped the privacy fence. A perimeter was established, subject was located, identified and arrested, and a second victim vehicle was located. Juvenile subject had property stolen from both vehicles in his possession, but Post-Miranda refused to give a statement, claiming he didn't break into any cars and was in the fenced neighborhood looking for a friend. Subject was also in possession of an iPhone that was identified as being stolen during a previous conveyance burglary. Subject was charged and transported to JAC. Juvenile is the subject of on-going investigation into other conveyance burglaries with similar MO.

Occupied Burglary Residence Arrest

On 11/26/16, deputies responded to the area of Powerline and Prospect to assist Margate PD with a perimeter in reference to a stolen vehicle that fled from their city. Suspects bailed out of the vehicle and entered the laundry room of a nearby residence. Suspects were taken into custody by BSO K-9. Suspects were released to Margate PD pending additional charges for the Oakland Park Residential Burglary.

Auto Theft / Stolen Tag / Burglary Residence

On 11/29/16, deputies attempted to make contact with a known juvenile burglar who had an active P/C for a 2015 burglary. The juvenile subject was observed driving what turned out to be a stolen vehicle with a stolen attached license plate. Within the vehicle were 2 additional known juvenile burglars. When they spotted detectives, the juvenile subjects exited the vehicle and fled on foot. All 3 subjects were eventually arrested. Post-Miranda, subject with P/C admitted to the 2015 burglary. Other juveniles admitted to being inside the stolen vehicle and fleeing from detectives. All were charged accordingly and transported to JAC for processing.

Drug Trafficking Arrest

On 11/30/16, CST detectives conducted a traffic stop on a subject who had just purchased methamphetamine from a nearby residence. A follow-up investigation resulted in a controlled buy from the residence. A warrant was obtained and detectives conducted surveillance on the residence on 12/6 and 12/7/16. Contact was made with one of the residents as they exited to walk their dog. The resident granted access to the residence where the search warrant was served.

The search resulted in the seizure of: 24 grams of methamphetamine, 15 grams of marijuana, 6 grams of morphine and \$650 cash. Subject was charged with Trafficking in Methamphetamine and Morphine and Possession of Marijuana and Paraphernalia. Additional charges are pending.

Grand Theft Auto/Burglary Business Arrest

On 12/3/16, Tamarac District deputies responded to a burglary in progress involving a Chevrolet with a stolen tag attached. The Chevrolet had been stolen a few days prior from Kaler Auto Sales, during which time the business' electricity was disabled and an edging stone thrown through the office window. Keys to the stolen Chevrolet were taken from the office and the vehicle from the car lot. The juvenile driver of the stolen vehicle denied any involvement in the Oakland Park burglary, but did admit to the Tamarac burglary and being inside the stolen vehicle. He offered the name of another individual who lives in Oakland Park as the actual burglar and auto thief. Subject was charged accordingly and transported to JAC. Investigating into the Business Burglary is on-going.

Burglary Business Arrest

On 12/9/2016, deputies were dispatched to a call of a suspicious person knocking on doors of businesses in the area and walking away. Deputies arrived and observed the suspect holding what appeared to be a crowbar, and using it to pry the door of a business. When suspect noticed the marked BSO patrol car, he dropped the crowbar and began walking away. Suspect was arrested and Post-Miranda admitted to the crime.

Burglary Residence Arrest

On 12/10/16, victim advised that her residence had been burglarized and ransacked the previous day. Deputies made contact with juvenile suspect, who had been detained in the area the day of the burglary. Post-Miranda, suspect confessed, stating he made entry through an unlocked rear door. Suspect stole a silver iPod from the residence, but dropped it while running from deputies. Suspect charged with Burglary Residence and transported to JAC.

Violent Repeat Offender Arrest

On 12/19/16, Deputy Howard and Sgt. Paparella conducted a traffic stop at 220 NW 51st Ct on a known female driver who has a suspended driver's license and a no-contact order against the suspect, a violent repeat offender, who resides at 220 NW 51st Ct.

During the routine stop, suspect exited the residence and confronted deputies on his front lawn. Sgt. Paparella, knowing that suspect has two separate pretrial supervision orders and an ankle monitor, attempted to arrest the suspect for violating his pretrial supervision order. Suspect fled into his house and out the back door. As Sgt. Paparella followed suspect through the residence, suspect slammed the door on Sgt. Paparella, who sustained an approximately 3-inch vertical laceration over his right eye. Sgt. Paparella was transported to BGH and received more than a dozen internal and external stitches before being released.

Later that day, BSO Viper Unit located suspect at 241 E Prospect Rd, while he was attempting to leave the area as passenger in a vehicle. Suspect resisted arrest, which caused him to sustain an injury on his forehead. Suspect was transported to BGH for medical clearance, then to the Main Jail for processing. Investigation is on-going.

Strong Armed Robbery Arrest

On 12/25/16, as victim was riding his bicycle, he was surrounded by 3 subjects. One subject stepped in front of him, blocking victim's path. Suspect #1 then straddled the front wheel of the bicycle, grabbed the handle bars and demanded "give me your bike." When victim refused, suspect #1 violently yanked on the bicycle in an attempt to take it. When victim

resisted, suspect #2 grabbed victim from behind and pulled him off the bicycle seat. Suspect #1 jumped on the bicycle and rode away, with suspect #2 and witness running behind suspect #1. All subjects apprehended and a show-up was conducted, in which the victim positively identified suspects #1 and #2 as the individuals who took his bicycle. Subjects were charged with Strong Armed Robbery.

Community Action Plans

District Staff meets each week to discuss crime trends, arrests and Juvenile Probationary Offenders to deploy deputies into the affected areas. The Crime Suppression Team is also deployed into the affected crime areas to combat emerging crimes.

Crime mapping and reporting is performed twice each week. The first mapping and reporting depicts the crimes that occurred during the previous week. The second mapping depicts the previous 3-weeks.

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and traffic citations that are issued. Utilizing this technology allows the district to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the district to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.

The District also addressed several traffic related initiatives during this quarter:

- Weekly analysis of traffic crash hot spots
- Crash Reduction
 - 900 to 3100 West Oakland Park Blvd
 - 100 to 1100 E Commercial Blvd
- Deployed Message Boards with educational messages
- Daily traffic enforcement in the school zones
- Neighborhood traffic enforcement (citizen complaint based)
- Commercial Vehicle Traffic Enforcement
- City staff M.O.T. review and inspection

The City of Oakland Park has two major roadways that experience heavy congestion. The Oakland Park corridor is currently under construction which magnifies the situation and increases the rear-end type crash. Additionally, a major beach re-habilitation project is underway. This has increased the number of commercial vehicles utilizing these roadways.

The Oakland Park Traffic unit has deployed Information signs to provide traffic warnings to commuters. Increased traffic enforcement has been conducted at key intersections in an attempt to educate the public and reduce the crashes in these areas. The regional Traffic Unit has assisted the district with selective traffic enforcement. This unit targeted the major roadways where there is an abundance of traffic crashes. This unit also deployed to the areas where citizens have complained about speeding.

During this quarter, a pattern of traffic crashes developed on two major roadways.

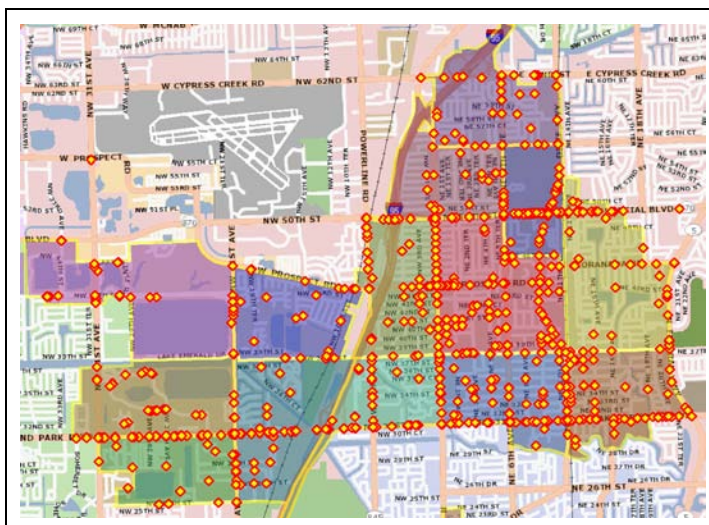

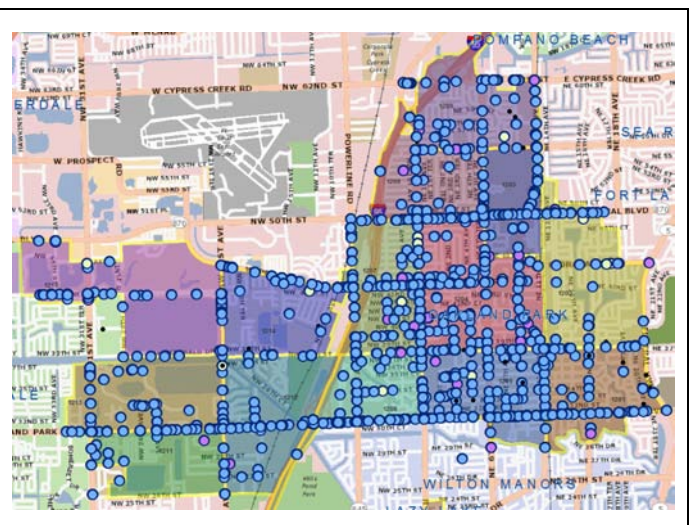

Employee of the Month

October 2016 Deputy Paul Schultz	<p>On October 1st 2016, deputies were dispatched to an occupied residential burglary. The victim advised he was in his bedroom sleeping and woke to find two male subjects attempting to steal items from inside his residence. When victim confronted the subjects, they fled the residence through victim's bedroom window. The victim provided a clothing description of the subjects.</p> <p>Upon arrival on the scene, Deputy Schultz located two male suspects walking westbound from the victim's residence who matched the victim's description. The suspects were detained and a show up was conducted in which the victim positively identified the two suspects.</p> <p>The suspects were transported to the Oakland Park District Office where they were interviewed by an Oakland Park Criminal Investigations detective. One suspect admitted to being the lookout, and the second suspect admitted to removing the window screen and entering the residence. The suspect advised he intended to take a PlayStation from inside the residence before he fled.</p> <p>Due to his quick response and attention, which resulted in the apprehension of two known burglary suspects and no loss of property to the victim, Deputy Paul Shultz is the Oakland Park District Employee of the Month for October 2016.</p>
November 2016 Deputy Sean Bonilla	<p>On November 25th, 2016, deputies were dispatched to a burglary conveyance that had just occurred. The victim and several witnesses observed a subject inside their Dodge Grand Caravan and then observed him attempting to enter their Nissan Altima. Victim and witnesses confronted the subject and attempted to detain him while calling the police. The subject fled on foot leaving behind a bicycle, his shoes and a backpack containing property.</p> <p>Deputies Bonilla and Arce responded to the scene. Deputy Arce gathered pertinent information regarding a description and direction of travel for the subject while Deputy Bonilla set-up a perimeter. While inspecting vehicles attempting to leave the area, Deputy Bonilla observed a male matching the description of the subject attempting to conceal himself in the rear seat of a vehicle. The subject was detained and a show-up was conducted in which victim and witnesses positively identified the subject.</p> <p>Deputies canvased the area and located an additional burglary victim, who was able to identify her property from the items the suspect had left on scene.</p> <p>The suspect was transported to the Oakland Park District Office and during interview with a district detective, admitted to three burglary conveyances as well as five additional unreported burglaries. Additional property is still waiting identification.</p> <p>Due to Deputy Bonilla's persistence and attention to detail the suspect was apprehended and victim's property returned. For his outstanding work in the arrest of a vehicle burglary suspect, Deputy Bonilla is the Oakland Park District Employee of the Month for November 2016.</p>
December 2016 Sergeant Michael Paparella	<p>During this month, Sergeant Michael Paparella has taken great initiative to investigate and manage a neighborhood nuisance situation that had the propensity to escalate into a dangerous issue.</p> <p>One of the person(s) identified as part of the ongoing complaints in the area was a known subject with a violent nature, who had been creating a nuisance</p>

	<p>in the neighborhood. The neighborhood in and around subject's residence had experienced hate-crime-based vandalism, burglaries and shootings into occupied residences within recent weeks. Sgt. Paparella put together a team of deputies and dedicated himself to alleviating the ongoing issues that seemed to all involve the subject.</p> <p>On December 19, 2016, while attempting to take the subject into custody for violation of an injunction, Sergeant Paparella gave chase and the suspect purposefully slammed a door into Sergeant Paparella causing a serious laceration to his forehead, resulting in the Sergeant's hospitalization and treatment. Fortunately, deputies were able to successfully take the subject into custody, after a few hours' manhunt involving approximately 30 Broward Sheriff's Office resources.</p> <p>Based on his dedication and direct actions leading to the arrest of one of Oakland Park's most prolific criminals, Sergeant Michael Paparella is the Oakland Park District Employee of the Month for December 2016.</p>
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Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business and Robbery.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2015 saw a slight increase in residential burglaries due to an organized group of adults and juveniles that targeted homes within the city. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the district.
- Identify and implement the most effective ways to communicate real time crime trend analysis to all members of the district to assure a team approach.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole and further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have positive impact on recidivism and sentencing.
- Carry on the district's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park Community Enhancement to address neglected properties, assure code compliance and improve the overall appearance of the city.

All it takes is one neglected property to impact an entire neighborhood. The District will work at all levels to support and assist the City Community Enhancement. By working closely with the city and combining resources in nontraditional roles, we can maintain and improve the high standards the residents expect, helping Oakland Park sustain the reputation of being a desirable and safe place to live, shop, visit, work, and play.

- District deputies will report abandoned properties, graffiti and vandalism to Community Enhancement and work together to address the problems.
- District deputies will attend Community Enhancement meetings to ensure input and participation in city projects.
- District deputies will attend Home Owners and Business Group meetings to ensure the community's concerns are shared and effectively addressed with the City's Community Enhancement.
- District Deputies will educate the community of how to report nuisance/abandoned properties utilizing the City's P.O.P. smartphone application.
- Coordinate with the residents and businesses to improve the environmental design of their property. This will be accomplished through the partnership with various City departments.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the city who encounter construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently situations are created when the safety and the flow of traffic is compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all M.O.T.'s (Maintenance of Traffic).

- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The variety of innovative youth programs will be utilized to maximize positive outcomes from those youth who are ensnared within the criminal justice system.
 - Habitual Offender Tracking, (HOT) focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their repeated criminal behavior and getting back on the right track becoming positive and productive citizens. Those in the program will be given guidance and support to obtain employment, attend trade schools, college and the military.
 - Operation Grounded are juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court mandated sanctions. The Oakland Park District will seek ways to assist and support the Department of Juvenile Probation so as to minimize the likely hood of reoffending. Emphasis will be placed to encourage public service and participation in community oriented activities.
 - TOP Tier are juvenile and adults who we have identified through intelligence who are likely committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution by working in tandem with the State Attorney's Office as well as Probation and Parole.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.

The Oakland Park District remained steadfast in its focus on Part 1 crimes, to include Robberies, Business Burglaries, Residential Burglaries and Vehicle Burglaries. Investigations have revealed that these crimes are mostly the result of juveniles with numerous arrests during the time period. The District has focused extensive efforts to address this youth crime trend with the implementation of a deputy for truancy, as well as coordination with state and local juvenile organizations, including schools. Analysis has revealed the Burglary Conveyance (Vehicle) trend in 2016 that affected Oakland Park, and Broward County as a whole, are crimes of opportunity involving valuables left in plain sight and unlocked car doors resulting in entry into multiple vehicles during a single spree. Public education and aggressive investigative tactics, utilizing the assistance of BSO regional and support units, were a priority. On a daily basis we continue to seek new and innovative ways to reach our residents, not only to prevent these crimes but also in assist in solving them. Our efforts this quarter yielded positive results, noted in the Burglary Conveyance incidents were down by -20 (-12%) from last quarter. Also of note were the several significant case solved during quarter of prolific offenders:

- Investigation into an unsystematic pattern of Residential Burglaries in 1202 Zone resulted in examination of the pawning activities of a known subject who lives in the area. The suspect was surveilled by C.I. detectives committing a residential burglary and also on-viewed pawning recently stolen property and he was taken into custody, resulting in 5 Residential Burglaries cleared this quarter.
- The Crime Lab completed DNA analysis on a 2014 burglary at Anything on Wheels car lot during which several Dodge Charger SRT 8s were stolen, resulting in the identification of a suspect. The suspect was apprehended with the assistance of the BSO VIPER Unit and taken to jail.

- In addition to the above arrest, two other burglaries at Anything on Wheels this quarter were cleared by the arrest of five juveniles, one of whom had 16 outstanding pickup orders. (pickup orders for Robbery, Burglary Conveyance, Arson, Auto Theft, Fleeing, Burglary, Possession of Burglary Tools, Theft and other misdemeanor charges)
- Two suspects who had committed a string of grand thefts at Lowe's throughout the county were arrested, resulting in the clearing of two Oakland Park cases.

These efforts and others will continue in addressing any further increase in crime, keeping Oakland Park safe and experiencing historically low UCR crime index rates. Analysis of surrounding areas outside the City has shown similar increases and trends, but the focus remains on the relentless reduction of crime within the City of Oakland Park.

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address the emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify the suspects, curb future crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes.

- CrimeMapping.com is designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI) is GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView/Desktop is a new software technology that allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

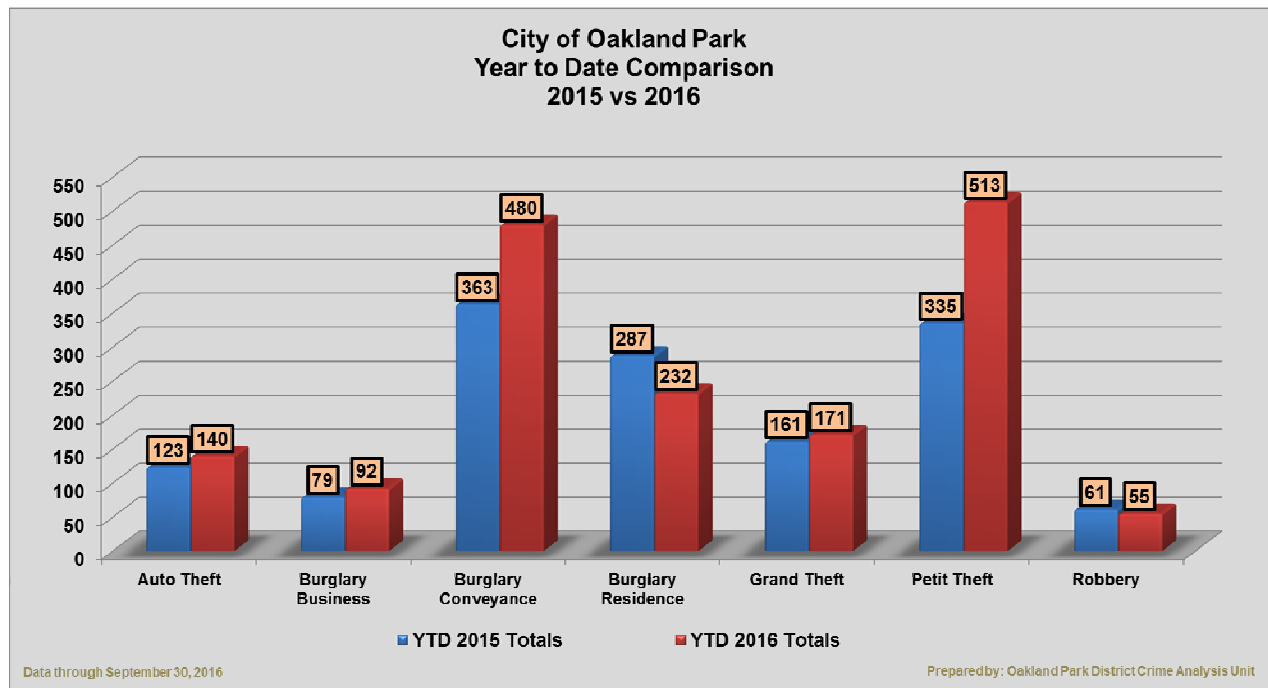
Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program. The cornerstone of this foundation is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. These tactics are implemented effectively by constant training and evaluating our efforts. The patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe, and get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implantation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.

S.T.O.P. is an inclusive program in the district that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output:

1. **HOT** focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens.
2. **Operation Grounded** are those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend.
3. **TOP Tier** are those individuals – both juvenile and adults – we have identified through intelligence who are committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.

In order to continually maintain crime reductions it will be necessary to retool, reinvigorate and refocus our efforts. These efforts must be coordinated with all units in this district and driven by leveraging all available technology to pinpoint, or as close as possible, predict where crime is going to occur. In order to accomplish this task, Crimes Response Unit is the platform for success. Below is a breakdown of how this section will operate:

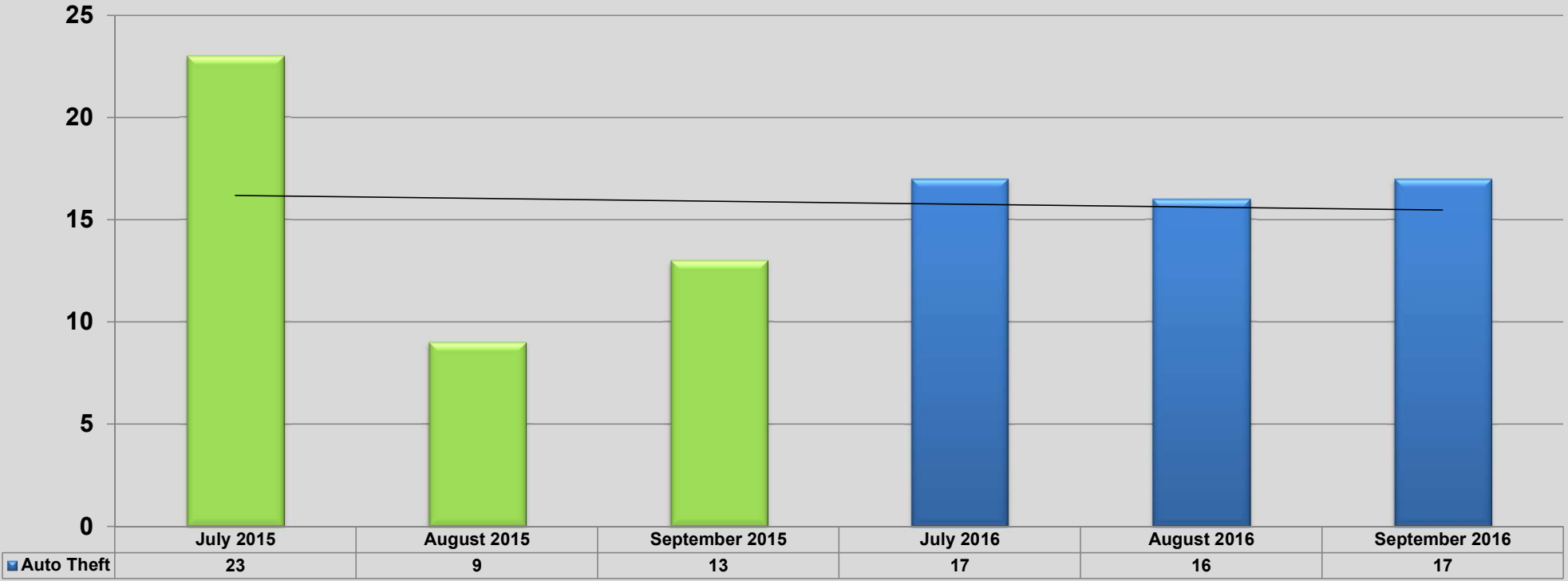

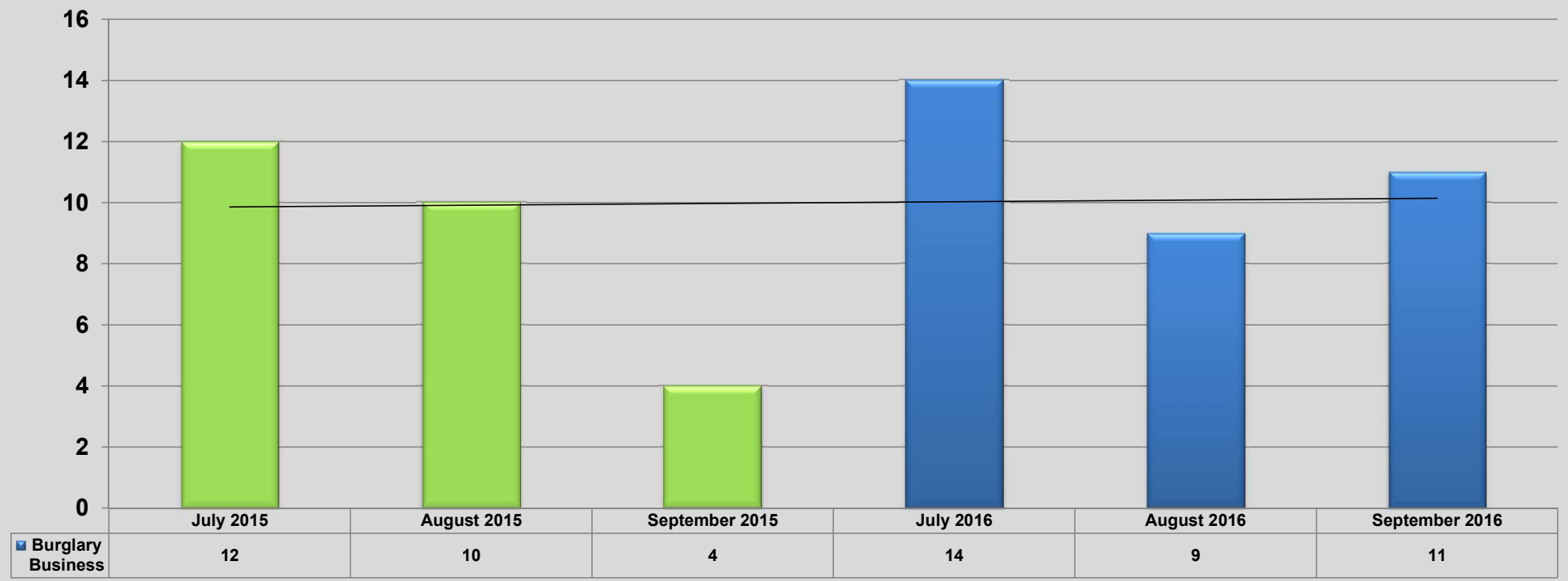

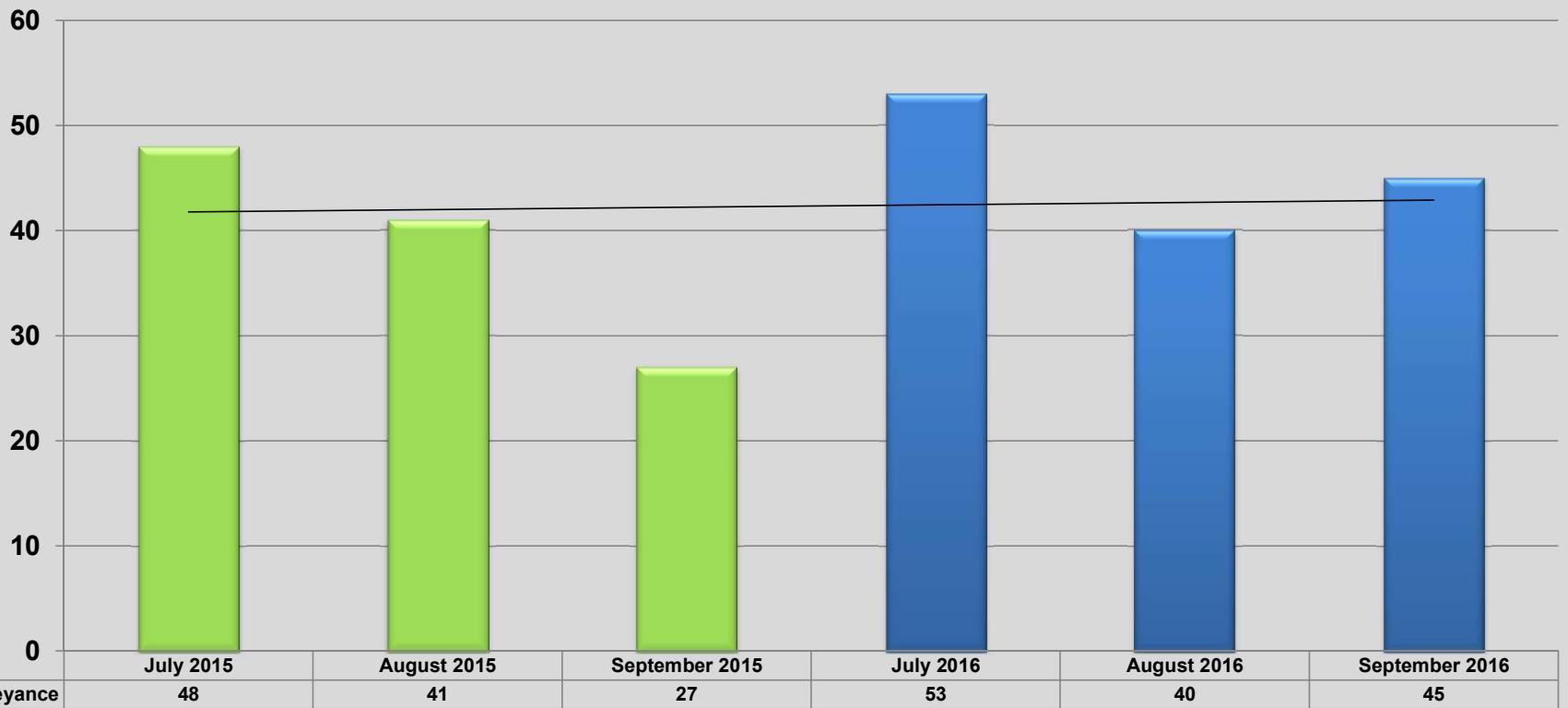
City of Oakland Park - Comparison

Auto Theft



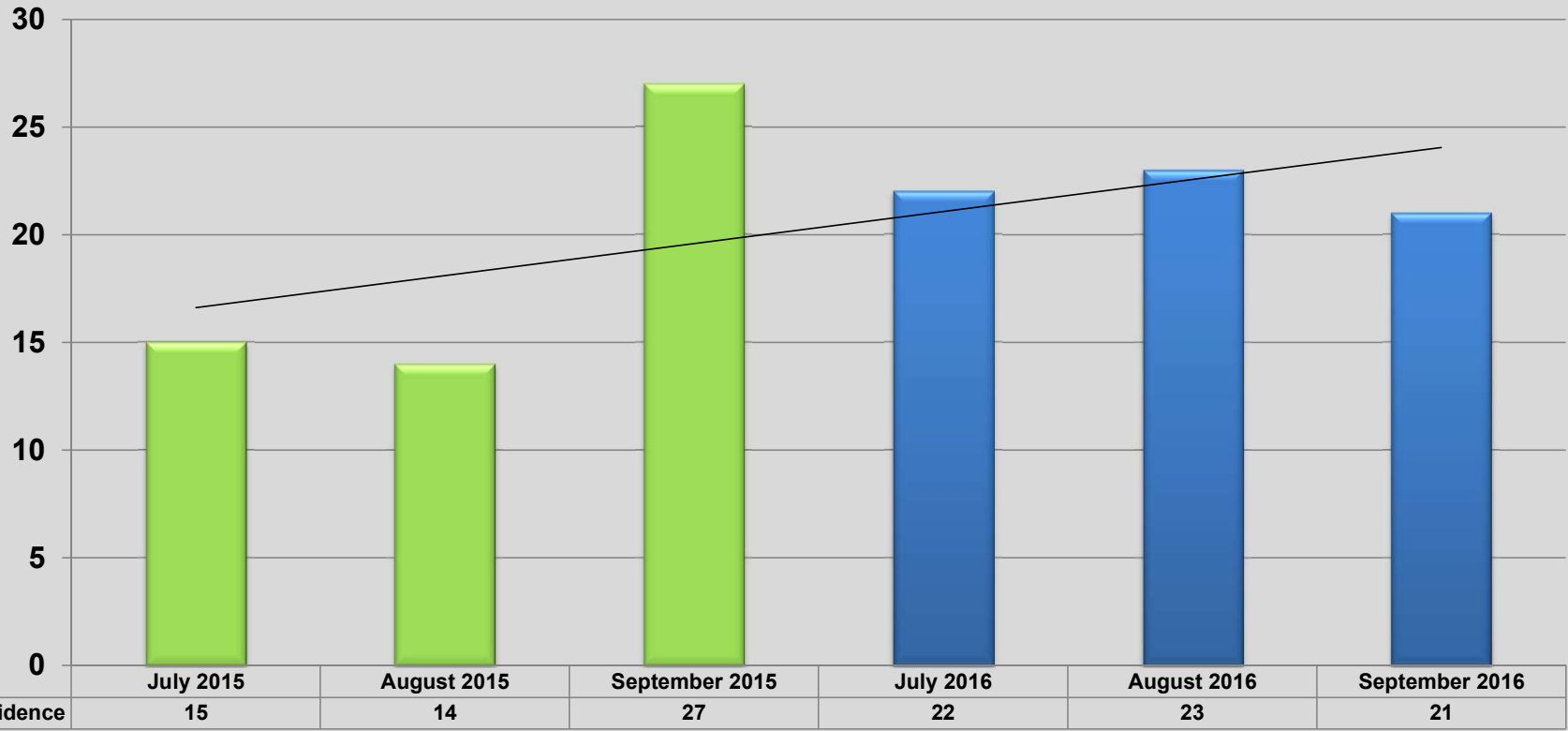
City of Oakland Park - Comparison

*Burglary Conveyance***

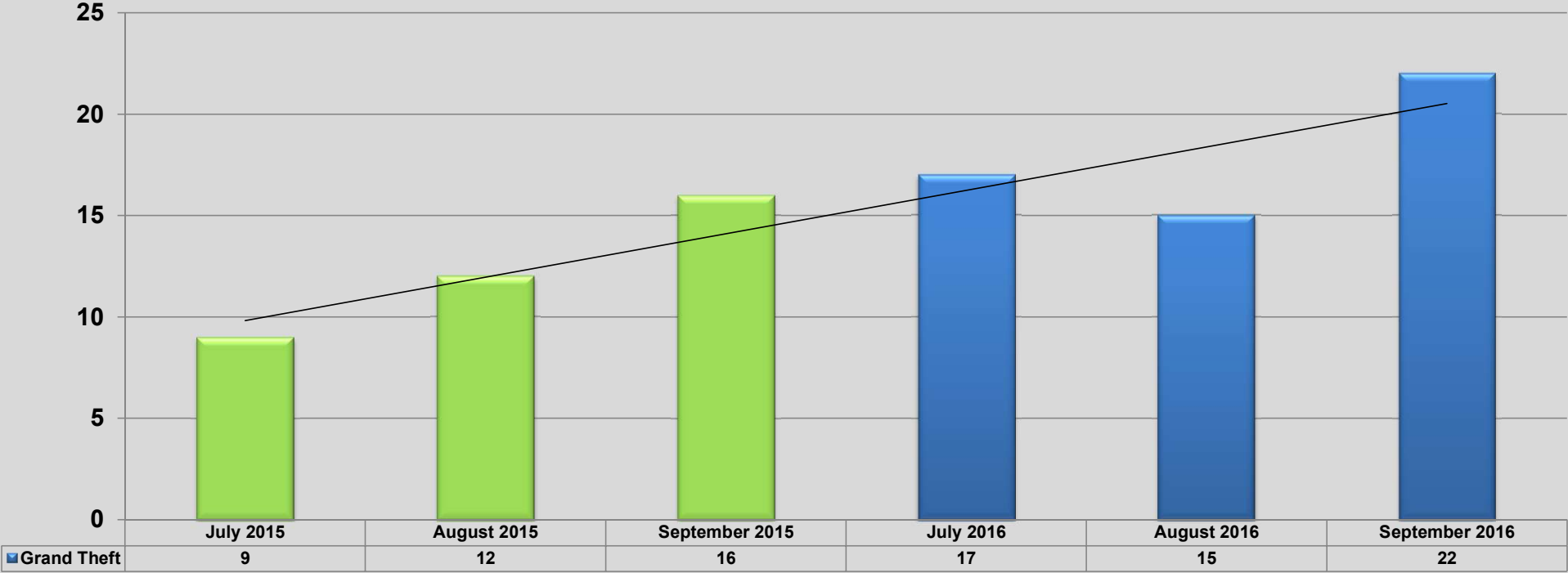


City of Oakland Park - Comparison 3rd Quarter 2015 vs 2016 *Burglary Residence*

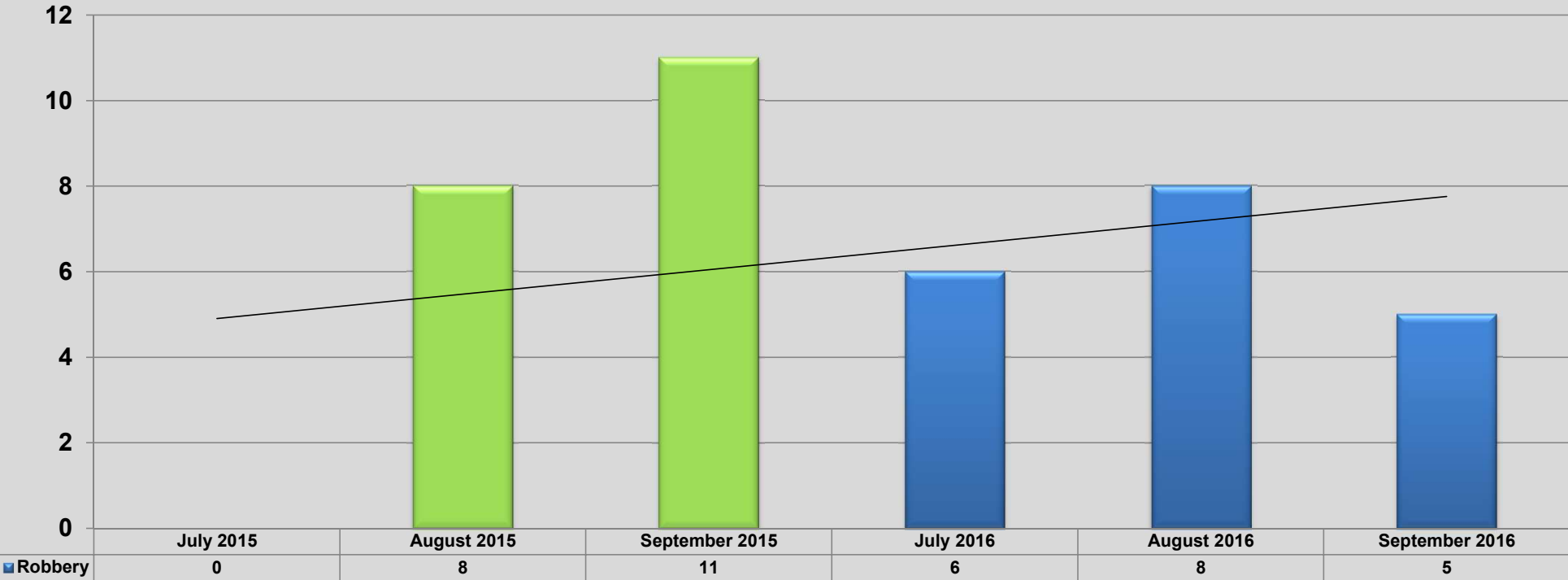

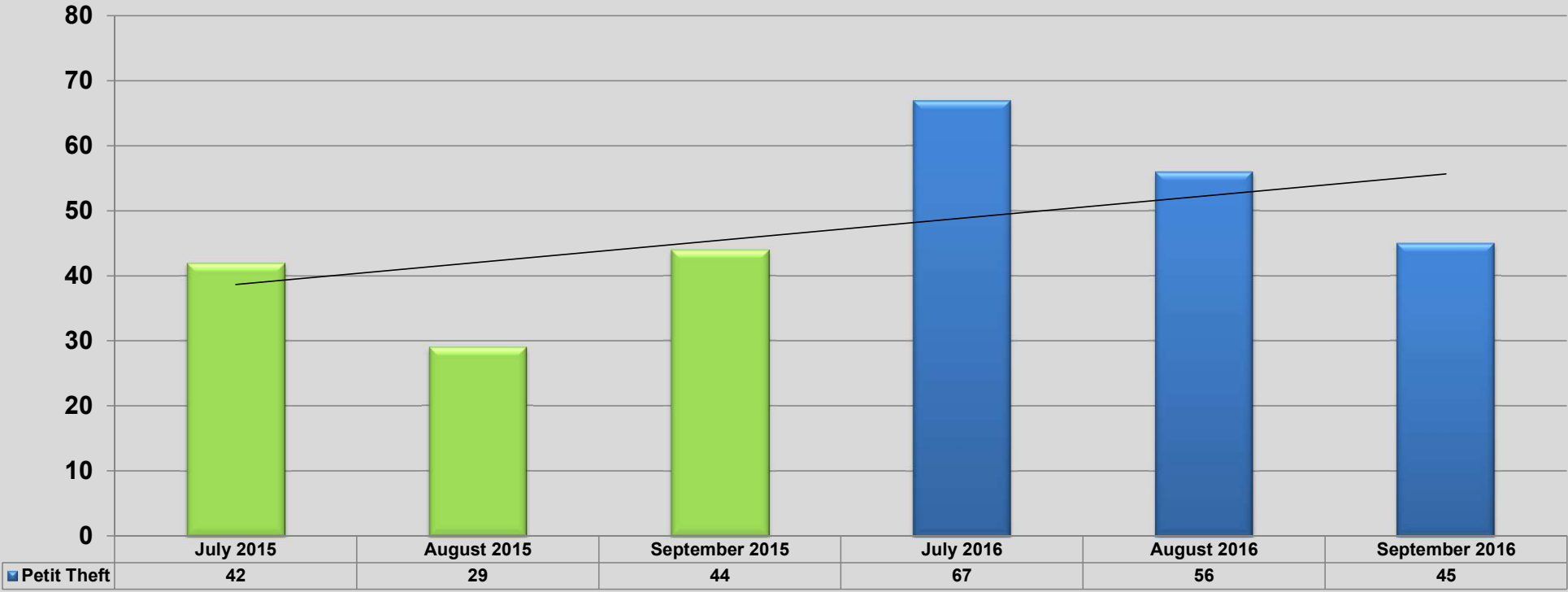

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and traffic citations that are issued. Utilizing this technology allows the district to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the district to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.

The District also addressed several traffic related initiatives during this quarter:

- Weekly analysis of traffic crash hot spots
- Crash Reduction
 - 1200 to 3100 West Oakland Park Blvd
 - 100 to 1000 E Commercial Blvd
- Deployed Message Boards with educational messages
- Daily traffic enforcement in the school zones
- Neighborhood traffic enforcement (citizen complaint based)
- Commercial Vehicle Traffic Enforcement
- M.O.T. review and inspection
- Hurricane preparation (Intersection and Traffic plans)

The City of Oakland Park has two major roadways that experience heavy congestion. The Oakland Park corridor is currently under construction which magnifies the situation and increases the rear-end type crash. Additionally, a major beach re-habilitation project is underway. This has increased the number of commercial vehicles utilizing these roadways.

The Oakland Park Traffic unit has deployed Information signs to provide traffic warnings to commuters. Increased traffic enforcement has been conducted at key intersections in an attempt to educate the public and reduce the crashes in these areas. The regional Traffic Unit has assisted the district with selective traffic enforcement. This unit targeted the major roadways where there is an abundance of traffic crashes. This unit also deployed to the areas where citizens have complained about speeding.

Grand Theft Auto Arrest

On 7/14/16, victim reported her vehicle stolen from Wimberley Fields (4000 NE 3rd Av). Victim's keys and other personal items had been left inside the vehicle. On 7/15/16, Wilton Manors PD received a call of a burglary attempt in progress. Four juveniles were taken into custody and victim's vehicle was recovered.

Grand Theft Arrest

Home Depot Loss Prevention discovered that between 6/22/16 and 6/29/16, building materials were taken from the rear of the business without being paid for. On four separate occasions, suspect #1 was observed placing property on the back of suspect #2's truck, which then drove off the property. Home Depot did not authorize the transactions, and none of the property was paid for.

On 7/3/16, suspect #1 was taken into custody at the Home Depot without incident. Post-Miranda, he denied knowledge of the theft, invoked his right to remain silent, and requested to speak to his attorney. Suspect # 1 was charged with Grand Theft and transported to the BSO Main Jail without incident.

Grand Theft Arrest

Suspects were caught on video surveillance committing grand thefts from numerous Lowe's Home Improvement locations, including two (2) incidents at the Oakland Park location. In August, suspects entered a Lowe's located in Oakland Park. While suspect #1 acted as lookout, suspect #2 entered the store and then exited without paying for a gas-powered leaf blower valued at \$300. Suspect #2 was detained upon exiting the store. Suspect #1 attempted to evade deputies, who detained him. Both suspects were arrested and charged with Grand Theft.

Grand Theft – Auto/Business Burglary Arrest

On 6/28/16, auto lot Anything on Wheels was burglarized, during which numerous vehicles and vehicle keys were stolen. Fort Lauderdale PD recovered two of the stolen vehicles later that day. In conjunction with FLPD, Oakland Park detectives obtained a confession from one of the juvenile suspects and recovered additional vehicle keys taken in the burglary.

Grand Theft – Auto/Business Burglary Arrest

On 7/22/2016, 4 juvenile B/Ms were observed entering the car lot Anything on Wheels where they burglarized a SUV. Deputies responded, detained and separated the 4 subjects. Deputies located a center punch tool on the ground next to the subjects and the Nissan SUV on the east side of the business. The suspects had driven the Nissan SUV through the business' fence in an attempt to get out of the enclosed business. The SUV was stuck over the fence and the rear tires were partially buried in the grass. There were no signs of forced entry into the vehicle and the ignition was fully intact.

Suspect #1 initially provided a false name but his true identity was discovered via fingerprint scan, which also revealed that he had 16 outstanding pickup orders. Post-Miranda, 3 of the subjects gave conflicting statements and stated they had no involvement. Suspect #2 stated that suspect #3 had the key for the Nissan SUV, was the driver who stole the vehicle and got it stuck. Suspect #4 then took the key from

suspect #3 and attempted to get the vehicle unstuck, which was when deputies arrived. Suspect #4 dropped the key, which was later recovered and swabbed for DNA. Suspect #2 further stated that suspect #3 was the one who broke into Anything on Wheels in a previous burglary (on 6/28/16), at which time he retrieved the Nissan SUV's key. All four subjects are on Probation ranging from Grand Theft Auto to Burglary and were charged accordingly.

On 7/26/2016, a 5th juvenile subject was taken into custody for the Anything on Wheels burglary and violation of probation.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 7/2/2016, witnesses observed a juvenile B/M on a bicycle attempting to burglarize a vehicle. Subject was detained and positively identified with 100% certainty by both witnesses in a show up. Subject was placed under arrest and transported to the Oakland Park District Office. Post-Miranda, subject described the vehicle and incident but stated he didn't touch the vehicle he only stopped nearby to fix his bicycle. Video surveillance of the incident from three different angles was obtained, showing subject riding past the vehicle then turning around and riding up next to the vehicle. He stops for a few seconds then rides forward and bends down as if he is fixing the bicycle then rides off westbound. Subject was transported to JAC without incident.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 08/08/16 at approximately 1010 hours, the victim reported that his vehicle was burglarized on two separate dates and captured on video surveillance while parked at the Bolender Warehouses:

On 07/31/16 at approximately 1742 hours, a juvenile B/M subject known to Oakland Park deputies was observed via video surveillance entering the victim's unlocked silver Audi. Victim advised stated approximately \$30 in loose change was stolen from his vehicle.

On 08/04/16 at approximately 1804 hours, the same juvenile subject (suspect #1), returned with another juvenile B/M subject (suspect #2), also known to Oakland Park deputies. Suspect #2 is observed entering the victim's Audi and rummaging through it while suspect #1 stood by as the look out. The victim stated a pack of cigarettes and a lighter was stolen during that incident.

Suspects were arrested and Post-Miranda, provided full confessions. Suspect #1 was charged with two counts burglary conveyance and petit theft and suspect #2 was charged with one count burglary conveyance and petit theft.

Armed Burglary Business Arrest

On 7/4/2016, Lucky Pawn, located at 4861 N Dixie Hwy, was burglarized when a rock was thrown through the front door, breaking the front door window. Three (3) black males entered, and stole three (3) BB guns, valued at \$825, and described as two (2) replica AR-15s and one replica Uzi. All three look and feel identical to a real firearm. Subjects also stole two laptops, valued at \$250. The cash register was opened but no cash was inside.

An alert flyer was prepared and sent out, which led to the positive identification of suspect #1. Contact was made with suspect #1 at the Department of Juvenile Justice where he was in custody on unrelated charges. Suspect #1 provided a full confession.

Several surveillance photos were shown to suspect #1 and he positively identified himself and another subject (suspect #2) as the burglars, stating the main reason they burglarized Lucky Pawn was because he (suspect #1) believed the BB guns were real firearms. Suspect #1 stated he sold the BB guns as fast as possible (for \$50 each) because they looked real and didn't want to get caught with them. Suspect #1 was charged accordingly.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 8/20/16, the juvenile suspects were observed entering a 2009 Nissan Altima located at 241 NW 40th St, during which suspect #1 acted as lookout while suspect #2 entered the victim's vehicle. Suspects then fled the scene. Suspect #1 was seen outside his residence and positively identified by the witness as being the lookout. Post-Miranda, suspect #1 advised that he and suspect #2 were in the area, but denied having knowledge of the burglary.

Suspect #2 was later apprehended at his residence. Search incident to arrest revealed a Wells Fargo Temporary Debit card that the victim identified as being in the vehicle prior to the burglary. Post-Miranda, suspect #2 also admitted to being in the area but denied any knowledge of the vehicle burglary. Both suspects were charged with Burglary-Conveyance and Petit Theft.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 9/18/2016, deputies were dispatched to a burglary conveyance in progress. Upon arriving at the scene deputies took juvenile suspect #1, who was being held by witnesses, into custody. Two of the victim's credit cards and change stolen from inside of the victim's vehicle were found in suspect #1's possession. A second suspect escaped the scene before deputies arrived. Post-Miranda, suspect #1 fully confessed to burglarizing the victim's vehicle and named juvenile suspect #2 (who had fled the scene) as his co-defendant. Via photo arrays, both witnesses identified suspect #2 with 100% certainty. Deputies responded to suspect #2's residence and took him into custody. Post-Miranda, suspect #2 initially denied being involved in the burglary of the victim's vehicle but later recanted and confessed that he did participate in the burglary by acting as a look-out for suspect #1 while he committed the burglary, maintaining that he himself did not enter the victim's vehicle. Both defendants were charged with burglary conveyance and transported to JAC.

Occupied Burglary / Domestic Violence Arrest

Victim and suspect were in a 9-year domestic relationship, which victim ended, moving to a new address 3-4 weeks prior to incident. Suspect arrived and after being denied entry, broke out a window with his fist and climbed into the apartment. Once inside, suspect broke 70" and 60" new plasma TVs. Suspect grabbed victim by the arm, pulling victim around the room, yelling. Victim called 9-1-1 and operator heard suspect, who fled, bleeding from cut received by breaking out window. Suspect charged with Domestic occupied burglary battery and criminal mischief.

Occupied Burglary Residence Arrest

Victims returned home to discover suspect in their house. Suspect fled carrying victims' belongings. Both victims followed. Suspect picked up a metal pipe, swinging it

at them. One victim called 9-1-1 while the other continued to follow until suspect was stopped by patrol deputies. Suspect charged with occupied burglary, grand theft and aggravated assault in Oakland Park. Suspect charged with burglary conveyance by Tamarac district.

Burglary Residence Arrest

Detectives began investigating suspect due to his extensive pawn history, his burglary methods, his probation status and the recent spike of residential burglaries not far from suspect's residence. After numerous pieces of stolen pawned property were confirmed by victims of these residential burglaries, detectives requested and obtained a vehicle tracking order. The tracker was placed on suspect's vehicle overnight on 9/14/2016, and on 9/15/2016, detectives surveilled the suspect, observing him pawning additional stolen merchandise and "casing" residences in 1201 and 1202 zones.

At approximately 1520 hours on 9/15/16, detectives observed suspect committing at residential burglary. Immediately following the burglary suspect picked up a known associate and pawned the property he had just stolen. Suspect and his associate were taken into custody without incident at the pawn shop. Post-Miranda, suspect admitted to numerous burglaries within Oakland Park due to an ongoing narcotic problem but refused to provide locations and property. The investigation is ongoing and further probable cause has been established for numerous additional residential burglaries here in Oakland Park.

Burglary School/Structure Arrest

Deputies responded to North Andrews Gardens Elementary School due to a silent alarm. A perimeter was immediately established. K-9 searched school grounds and observed the two (2) suspects who fled from the buildings. Suspect were detained and arrested by deputies on the perimeter and charged with burglary.

Burglary School/Structure/Conveyance Arrest

Suspect observed in the fenced gated condominium community River Shores. Witness watched as suspect attempted to open 5 vehicles, placing his hand in the pocket of his sweat shirt as he grabbed the door handles. Perimeter established and suspect located on the grounds of St Mark's Episcopal School. Suspect charged with burglary to the school, 5 counts of burglary conveyance, trespassing and resisting arrest.

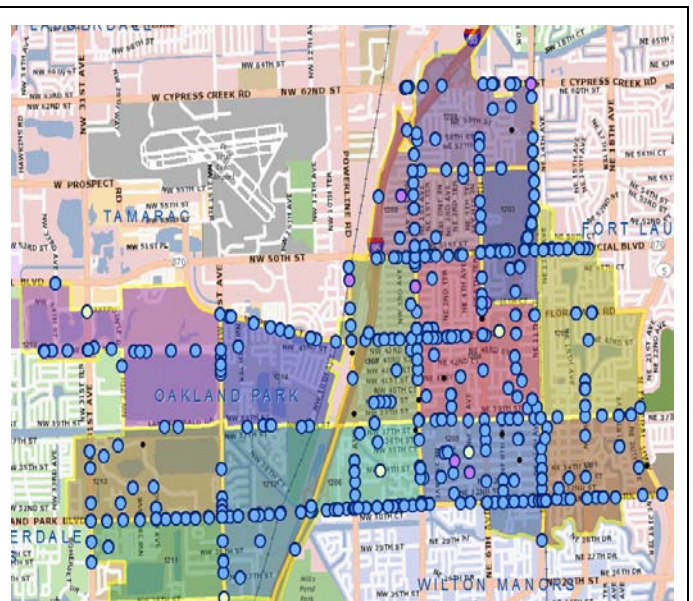
Burglary Business Arrest

On 8/26/14, deputies were dispatched to an auto theft at auto lot Anything on Wheels, where they discovered that several Dodge Charger SRT 8s had been stolen and other vehicles vandalized. Blood was discovered inside one of the vehicles that had its passenger side window smashed out. DNA was collected and sent for examination. On 8/23/2016, crime lab analysis report indicated that the DNA matched that of suspect, who has an extensive history of auto theft and weapons charges. Detectives apprehended suspect without incident. Post-Miranda, suspect denied any involvement with the auto thefts. He was charged with Burglary Business and transported to the main jail.

Upon responding to the building, they discovered several more of the same type boxes, which conformed that the suspect stole the boxes from the construction property. The suspect confessed to stealing the boxes and was taken into custody for burglary.</p> <p>The actions of Deputies Andrews and Zinglo thwarted a burglary in progress, led to the arrest of a burglary suspect as well as the recovery of all stolen property, preventing any loss to the business. LaCerra was essential in planning the City of Oakland Park's Oktoberfest, which was expanded from a 2-day event in prior years to a 3-day event that kicked off on September 30th. He not only ensured the event was staffed properly for the safety of those who attended, he also took into consideration the new challenges presented this year (i.e. road, railway and City beatification projects that were in progress near the site location, as well as local businesses that would be effected by the event and pedestrian routed traffic).</p> <p>Sgt. 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Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business and Robbery.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2015 saw a slight increase in residential burglaries due to an organized group of adults and juveniles that targeted homes within the city. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the district.
- Identify and implement the most effective ways to communicate real time crime trend analysis to all members of the district to assure a team approach.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole and further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have positive impact on recidivism and sentencing.
- Carry on the district's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park Community Enhancement to address neglected properties, assure code compliance and improve the overall appearance of the city.

All it takes is one neglected property to impact an entire neighborhood. The District will work at all levels to support and assist the City Community Enhancement. By working closely with the city and combining resources in nontraditional roles, we can maintain and improve the high standards the residents expect, helping Oakland Park sustain the reputation of being a desirable and safe place to live, shop, visit, work, and play.

- District deputies will report abandoned properties, graffiti and vandalism to Community Enhancement and work together to address the problems.
- District deputies will attend Community Enhancement meetings to ensure input and participation in city projects.
- District deputies will attend Home Owners and Business Group meetings to ensure the community's concerns are shared and effectively addressed with the City's Community Enhancement.
- District Deputies will educate the community of how to report nuisance/abandoned properties utilizing the City's P.O.P. smartphone application.
- Coordinate with the residents and businesses to improve the environmental design of their property. This will be accomplished through the partnership with various City departments.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the city who encounter construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently situations are created when the safety and the flow of traffic is compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all M.O.T.'s (Maintenance of Traffic).

- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The variety of innovative youth programs will be utilized to maximize positive outcomes from those youth who are ensnared within the criminal justice system.
 - Habitual Offender Tracking, (HOT) focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their repeated criminal behavior and getting back on the right track becoming positive and productive citizens. Those in the program will be given guidance and support to obtain employment, attend trade schools, college and the military.
 - Operation Grounded are juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court mandated sanctions. The Oakland Park District will seek ways to assist and support the Department of Juvenile Probation so as to minimize the likely hood of reoffending. Emphasis will be placed to encourage public service and participation in community oriented activities.
 - TOP Tier are juvenile and adults who we have identified through intelligence who are likely committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution by working in tandem with the State Attorney's Office as well as Probation and Parole.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.

It should be noted that final UCR numbers for 2015 have been released and Oakland Park continues to enjoy the lowest crime index in the past several decades. With both Robbery and Burglary to residence down in 2016 we can hope to sustain and further the substantial gains made in past years. It should be remembered that this accomplishment is symbolic not only for the efforts of deputies on the street, but of the synergistic effect of a community including its police, its city employees, elected officials and most importantly the residents themselves working together to build stronger and safer communities. I welcome you to read and enjoy several of the examples contained in this quarterly report.

I would also like to highlight an initiative note from the Oakland Park team which is ongoing through the second and third quarter involving our youth here in the City. The summer programs offered by the City of Oakland Park are exceptional both in their content and in the diverse population they serve. Police and community relations in general are a focus of our national attention which spawned the idea of an enhanced partnership between the Oakland Park District and the City's exemplary youth programs. BSO Oakland Park has always had involvement in the programs usually limited to a few days of instruction and safe practices. Crime Developments – 2nd Quarter

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address the emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify the suspects, curb future crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes.

- CrimeMapping.com is designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI) is a GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView / Desktop is a new software technology that allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

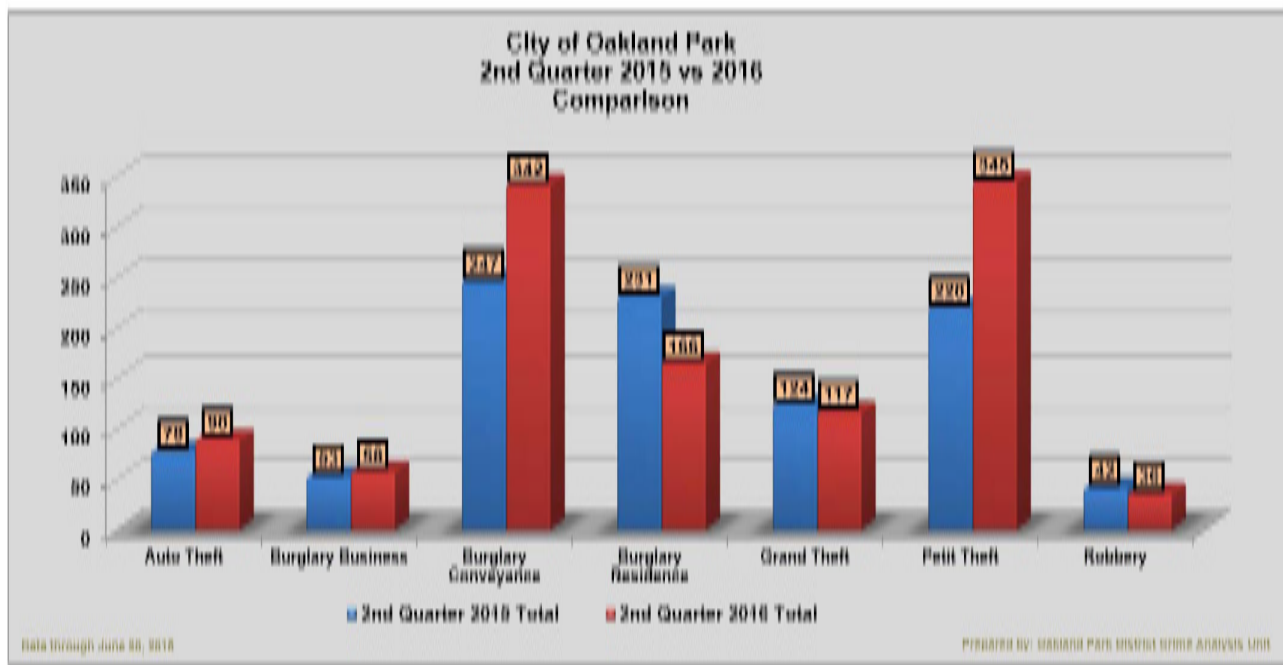
Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program. The cornerstone of this foundation is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. These tactics are implemented effectively by constant training and evaluating our efforts. The patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe, get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implantation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.

S.T.O.P. is an inclusive program in the district that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output:

1. **HOT** focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens.
2. **Operation Grounded** are those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend.
3. **TOP Tier** are those individuals – both juvenile and adults – we have identified through intelligence who are committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.

In order to continually maintain crime reductions it will be necessary to retool, reinvigorate and refocus our efforts. These efforts must be coordinated with all units in this district and driven by leveraging all available technology to pinpoint, or as close as possible, predict where crime is going to occur. In order to accomplish this task, Crimes Response Unit is the platform for success. Below is a breakdown of how this section will operate:

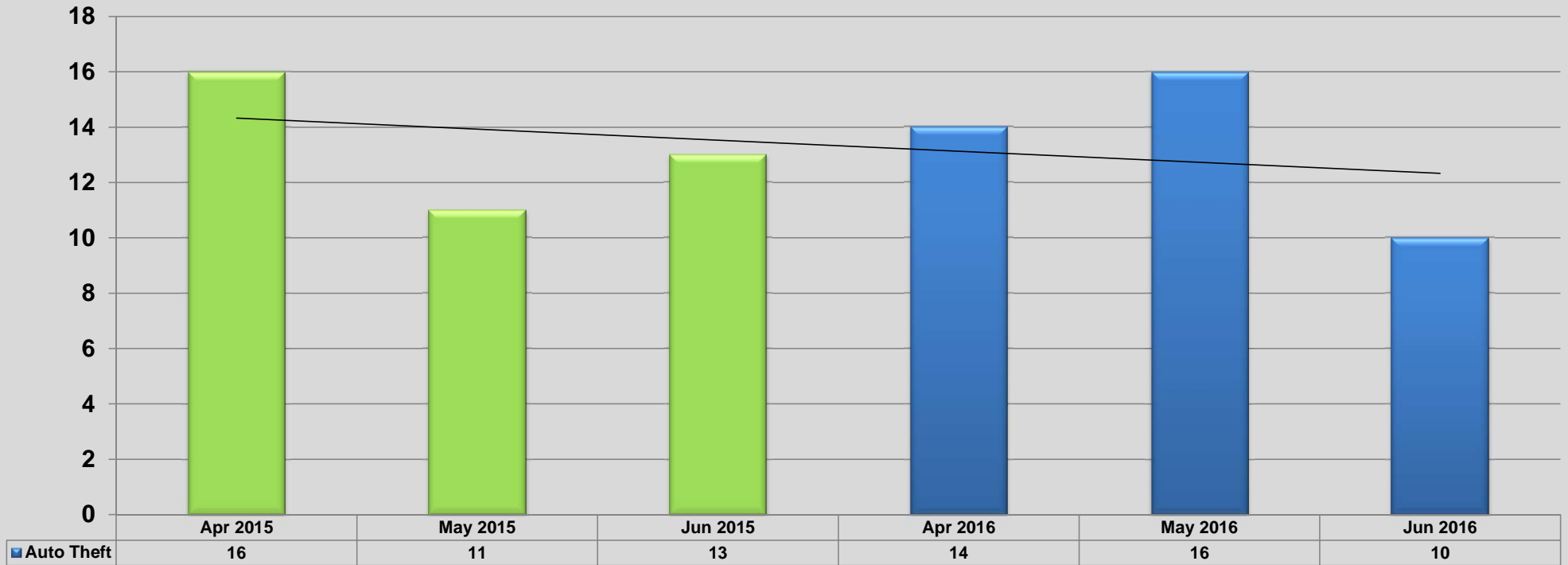

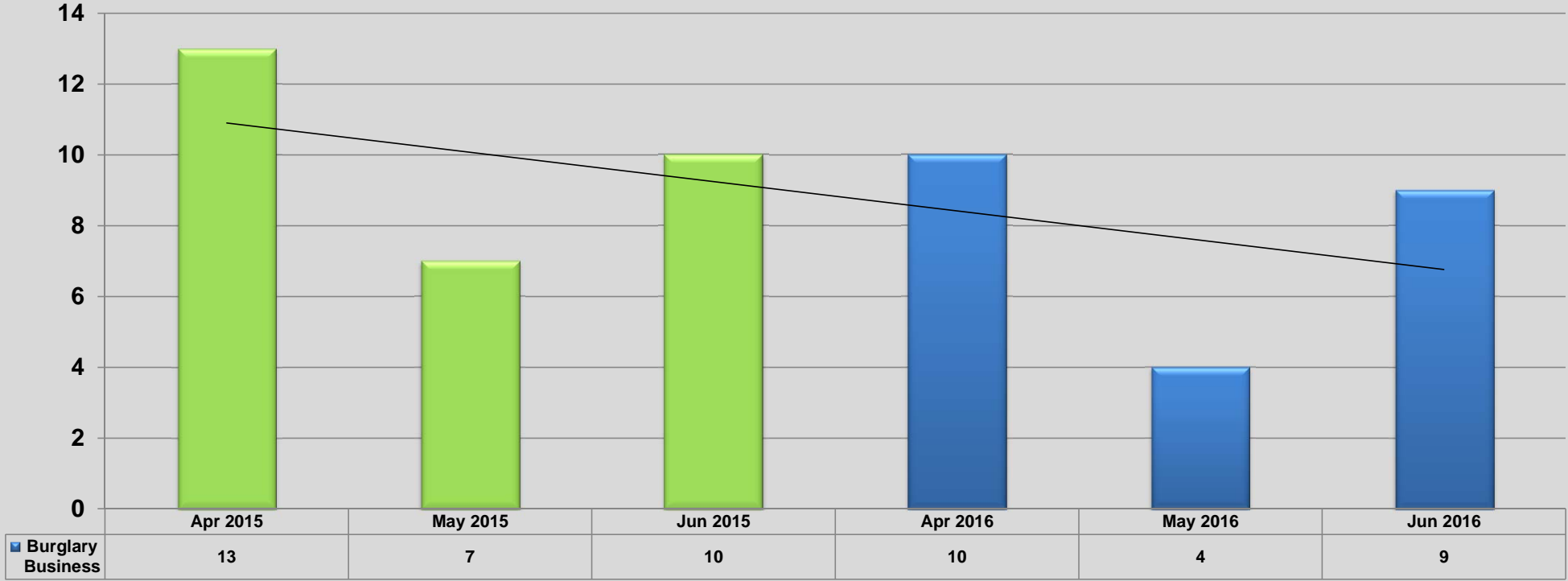

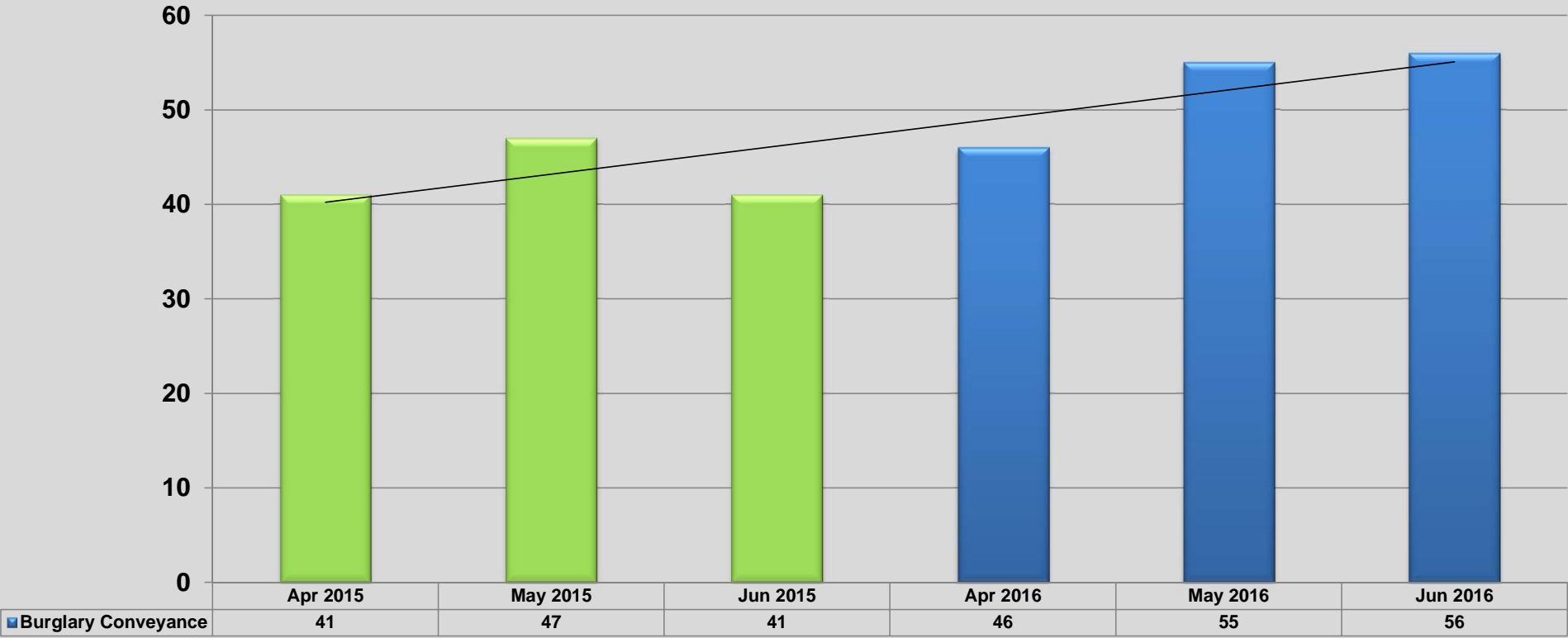

*Auto Theft***



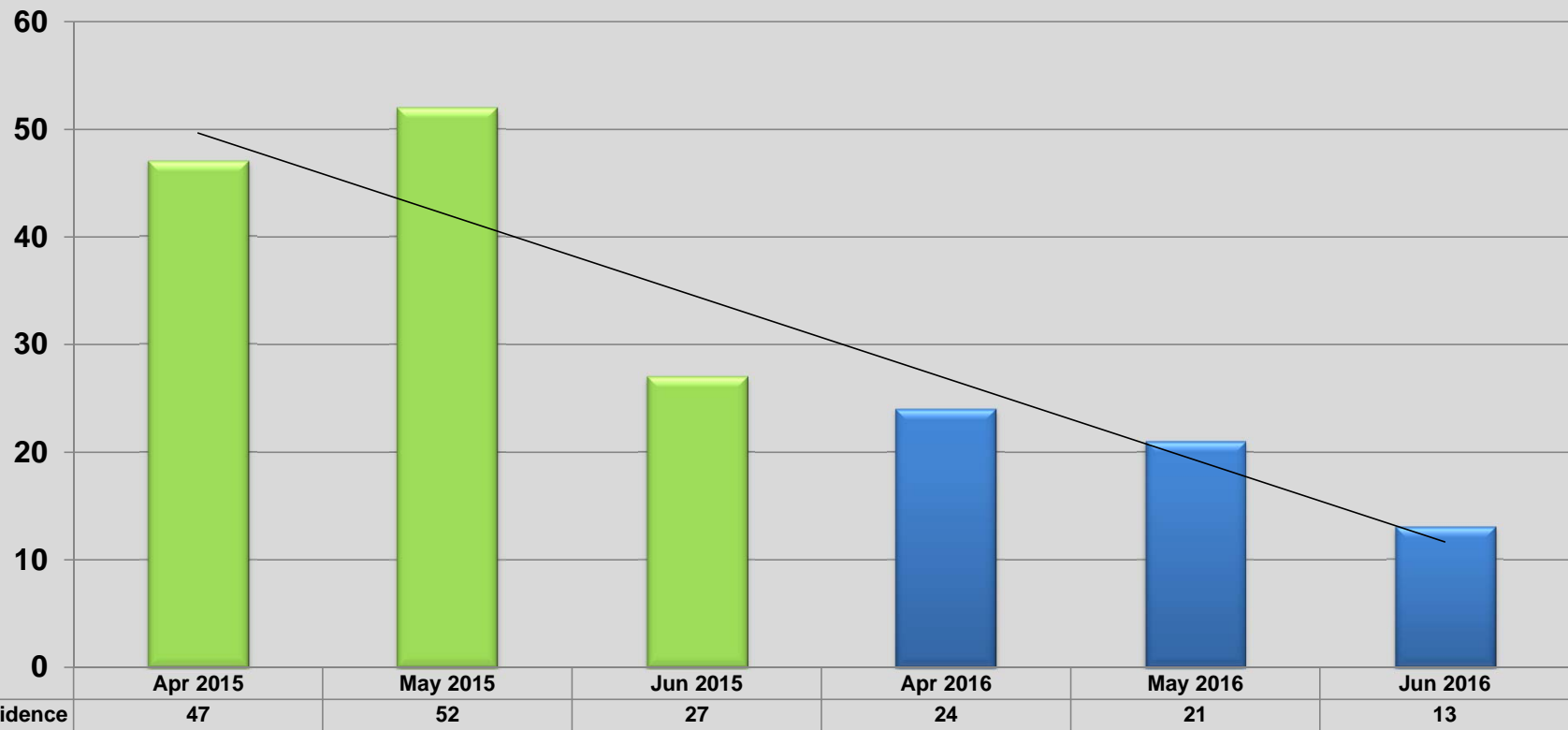
City of Oakland Park - Comparison

City of Oakland Park - Comparison 2nd Quarter 2015 vs 2016 *Burglary Conveyance*



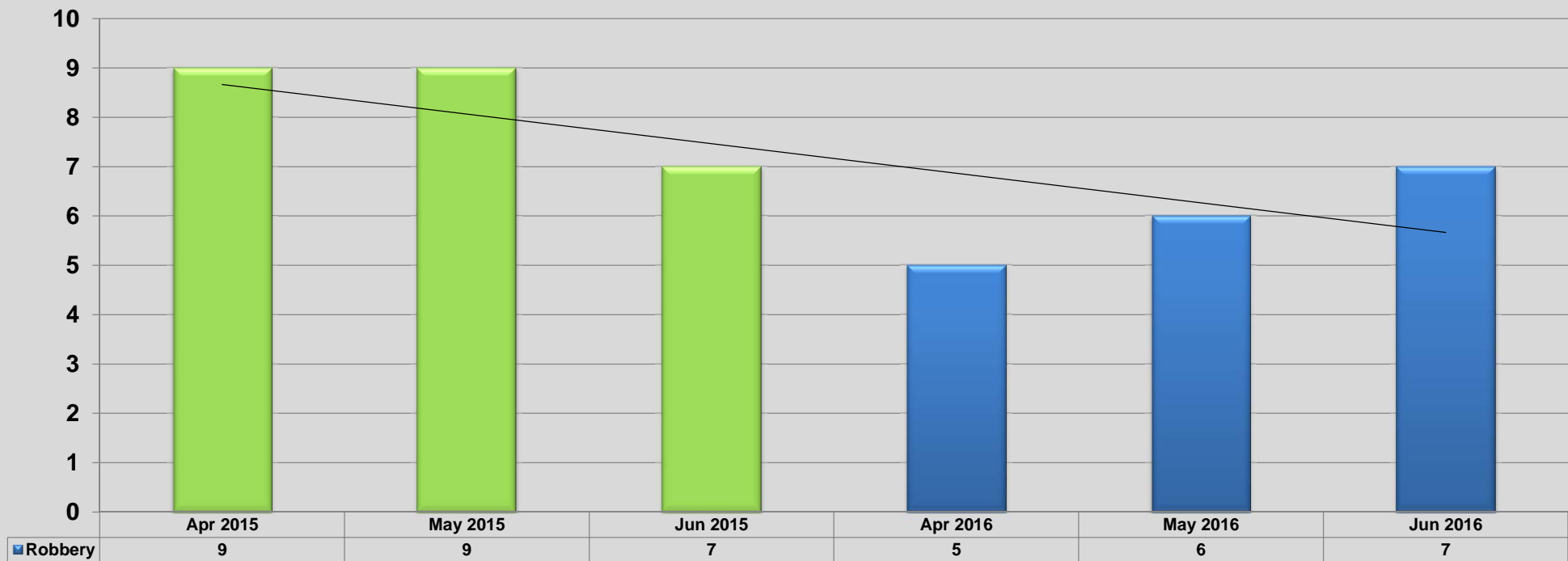

*Burglary Residence***



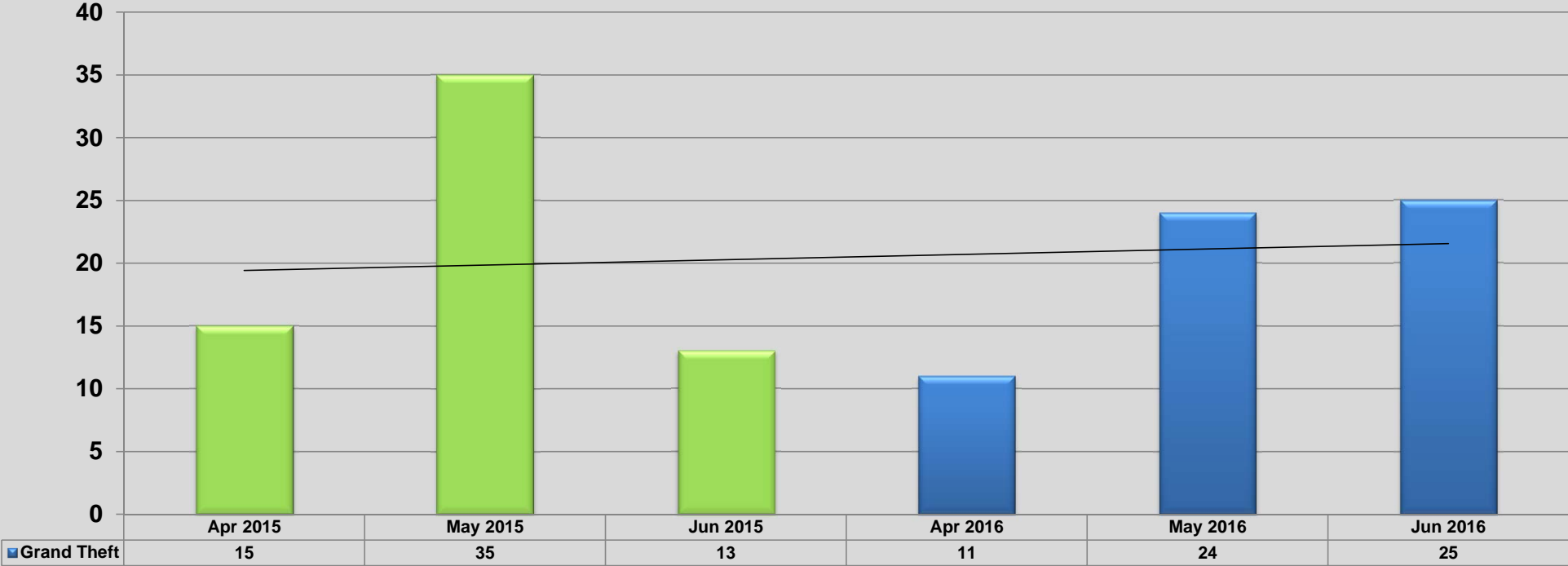

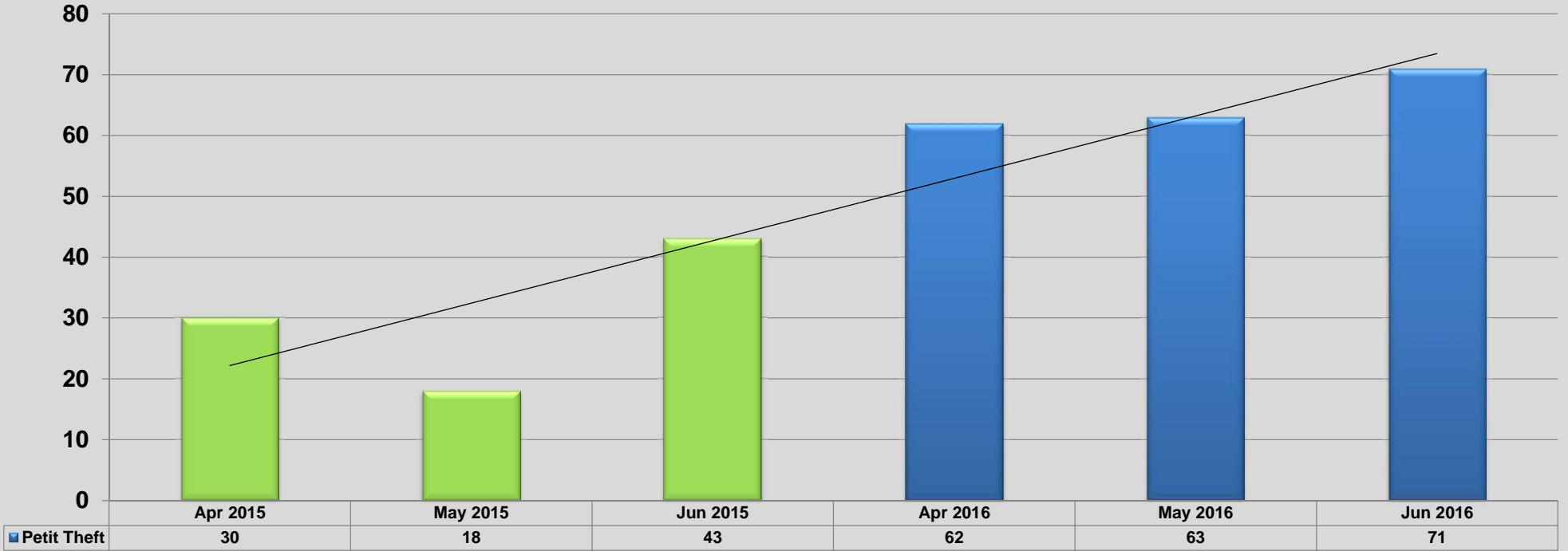

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and traffic citations that are issued. Utilizing this technology allows the district to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the district to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.

The District also addressed several traffic related initiatives during this quarter:

- Weekly analysis of traffic crash hot spots
- Crash Reduction
 - 2100 to 3100 West Oakland Park Blvd
 - 600 to 100 E Commercial Blvd
- Deployed Message Boards with educational messages
- City of Oakland Park Accident Review Committee Meeting
- FDOT Community Traffic Safety Committee meeting
- Broward FDOT Traffic Safety Committee meeting
- Daily traffic enforcement in the school zones
- Commercial Vehicle Traffic Enforcement

The City of Oakland Park has two major roadways that experience heavy congestion. The Oakland Park corridor is currently under construction which magnifies the situation and increases the rear-end type crash. Additionally, a major beach re-habilitation project is underway. This has increased the number of commercial vehicles utilizing these roadways.

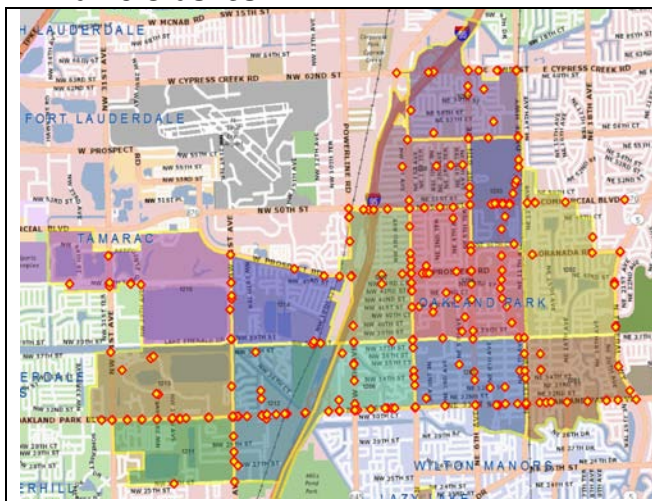
The Oakland Park Traffic unit has deployed Information signs to provide traffic warnings to commuters. Increased traffic enforcement has been conducted at key intersections in an attempt to educate the public and reduce the crashes in these areas. Additionally, the City of Oakland Park is currently participating in a Pedestrian / Bicycle Safety Grant. The first phase of this grant is directed towards education which would explain the increased number of warnings citations being issued.

During this quarter, a pattern of traffic crashes developed on two major roadways.

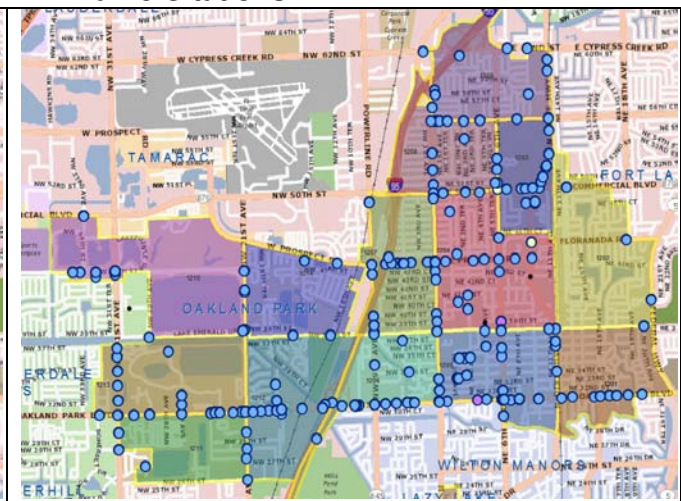

District deputies have attended the Crisis Intervention course training. CIT certified deputies respond to persons suffering from mental health crisis situations. The Crisis Intervention Team deputies work with the mental health system and advocacy groups to ensure persons with mental health issues are addressed. A team of CIT District deputies hits the streets weekly to locate those in need of assistance. They assist with services, transportation, food, clothing and entry into substance abuse programs. These deputies educate, encourage and help these persons get off the streets and into a shelter or abuse program.

What is the most active Crime. **Burglary Conveyance** .

Crime Trends Response

The most prevalent crime during this reporting period were Conveyance Burglaries in 1210-1214 zones. To address this trend, one extra unit was hired to increase Deputy presence on the West side. In addition, between 0230-0600hrs one East side unit was moved out West to assist in patrolling communities along the Lauderdale Lakes border. On 06/10/16 a conveyance burglary in progress was called out in Mira Lago. Due to the increase in personnel out West, a quick response was able to be made and the subject was taken into custody. He subsequently confessed to numerous vehicle burglaries in Oakland Park and Lauderdale Lakes.

Additionally, during this reporting period several conveyance burglaries were reported in 1204 zone. With this in mind East side units conducted increased patrols in the victimized neighborhoods and two units conducted home checks of our most prolific burglars. Vinson Vernius, a well known vehicle burglar, was located in the vicinity of a call where a vehicle tag had just been stolen. Vernius fled from Deputies and was taken into custody after a brief foot pursuit.

Sheriff's Targeted Offender Program (Top Tier and Operation Grounded / Current List)

Deputies were directed to check the areas frequented by the Top Tier and Operation Grounded list. No contacts were made.

P.O.P. / Quality of Life Issues (Graffiti, Street Lights, Business Watch, Snipe Signs and dumping, etc)

-Area checks conducted at NW 37 St and NW 17 Terr in reference to complaints of subjects possibly spray painting stolen bikes. No subjects found in area.

- Area checks conducted at 2180 W Oakland Park Blvd in reference to complaints of homeless sleeping behind business.

-Requested home checks were conducted.

Employee of the Month

April 2016 Deputy R. Radulic	<p>Deputy Rachel Radulic is recognized for her investigative skills, outstanding police work and commitment serving the citizens of Oakland Park and Broward County.</p> <p>During the overnight hours of April 18th into April 19th, 2016, there were several burglary conveyances in 1204 zone. The suspects found an ignition key in one of the cars, and stole the vehicle. While on patrol during the day, Deputy Radulic observed a parked vehicle with two juveniles sitting nearby, and she immediately recognized the car as the one that had been stolen the previous night. She notified dispatch, and initiated a conversation with the suspects. Utilizing her extensive investigative skills, she solicited information that tied the two individuals to the stolen car. Both were transported to the district office for further investigation. Deputy Radulic worked with Oakland Park detectives to interview the suspects. Ultimately, a full confession was obtained, additional suspects were identified, and stolen property was recovered. Due to the keen observation and superior investigative skills, the stolen vehicle was returned to the owner, and all conveyance burglaries were cleared by arrest.</p> <p>Deputy Rachel Radulic is the Oakland Park Employee of the Month for April 2016.</p>
May 2016 Deputy T. Arce	<p>Recognizing Deputy Thomas Arce for his keen observation skills, advanced interview techniques and thorough investigation that led to the apprehension of two juvenile suspects.</p> <p>On Thursday May 26th 2016, Deputy Arce observed two juvenile subjects wearing dark colored clothing walking south across Prospect Rd and NE 1st Ter carrying property in their hands, (power drill & TV wall mount). Deputy Arce made contact with the subjects and conducted a records check to verify their identities. The subjects were separated and read their Miranda Rights. One of the subjects admitted to taking the property in his possession from several vehicles and he was willing to show Deputy Arce the location of the vehicles where the items were taken.</p> <p>Deputy Arce searched the subject and located a kitchen steak knife in his right front pants pocket which was properly secured. The subject advised he carries it for protection. Deputy Arce conducted a drive around with the subject and identified where the property had been taken. Deputies made contact with vehicle owners at three separate addresses and confirmed that property had been taken from their vehicles. The stolen items were identified and returned to the owners. Additional property (loose change and cigarettes) was also recovered from the subjects however the owner(s) of the additional property was/were not located.</p> <p>Deputy Thomas Arce is recognized for his outstanding police work, investigative skills and commitment to serving the citizens of Oakland Park and Broward County. For these reasons, he is the Oakland Park Employee of the Month for May 2016.</p>
June 2016 Deputy T. Khafaga	<p>Deputy Tarik Khafaga is recognized for his quick response and situational awareness, which led to the apprehension of a prolific burglar.</p> <p>On June 10th, 2016, Deputy Khafaga responded to the area of 3300 NE 46th St, in reference to a possible burglary in progress. Deputy Khafaga quickly arrived at the intersection of 4400 NW 31st Ave where he observed two black males fitting the descriptions of the burglary subjects running</p>

	<p>from the apartment complex where the call originated. Deputy Khafaga gave the subjects lawful orders to stop, but both fled from him, heightening his concern for persons or property in the community. Deputy Khafaga pursued one of the subjects while providing updated locations via dispatch, allowing an effective perimeter to be established. After running through numerous backyards, Deputy Khafaga temporarily lost visual of the subject and provided the last seen location where K-9 responded. Deputy Khafaga and the K-9 Deputy tracked the area where the suspect was located hiding inside a trash can on the curtilage of a residence.</p> <p>Once in custody, Deputies found the suspect's backpack, which contained a firearm and numerous articles of property that were found to have been taken during vehicle burglaries in the City of Oakland Park and Lauderdale Lakes over a 2-day time frame. The suspect confessed to committing the burglaries and was ultimately charged with 13 separate counts of armed burglary.</p> <p>Deputy Khafaga's quick and decisive actions undoubtedly prevented further burglaries within the City of Oakland Park and removed an armed felon from the streets. Based on his actions, Deputy Tarik Khafaga is the Oakland Park District Employee of the Month for June 2016.</p>
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Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business and Robbery.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2015 saw a slight increase in residential burglaries due to an organized group of adults and juveniles that targeted homes within the city. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the district.
- Identify and implement the most effective ways to communicate real time crime trend analysis to all members of the district to assure a team approach.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole and further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have positive impact on recidivism and sentencing.
- Carry on the district's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park Community Enhancement to address neglected properties, assure code compliance and improve the overall appearance of the city.

All it takes is one neglected property to impact an entire neighborhood. The District will work at all levels to support and assist the City Community Enhancement. By working closely with the city and combining resources in nontraditional roles, we can maintain and improve the high standards the residents expect, helping Oakland Park sustain the reputation of being a desirable and safe place to live, shop, visit, work, and play.

- District deputies will report abandoned properties, graffiti and vandalism to Community Enhancement and work together to address the problems.
- District deputies will attend Community Enhancement meetings to ensure input and participation in city projects.
- District deputies will attend Home Owners and Business Group meetings to ensure the community's concerns are shared and effectively addressed with the City's Community Enhancement.
- District Deputies will educate the community of how to report nuisance/abandoned properties utilizing the City's P.O.P. smartphone application.
- Coordinate with the residents and businesses to improve the environmental design of their property. This will be accomplished through the partnership with various City departments.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the city who encounter construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently situations are created when the safety and the flow of traffic is compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all M.O.T.'s (Maintenance of Traffic).

- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The variety of innovative youth programs will be utilized to maximize positive outcomes from those youth who are ensnared within the criminal justice system.
 - Habitual Offender Tracking, (HOT) focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their repeated criminal behavior and getting back on the right track becoming positive and productive citizens. Those in the program will be given guidance and support to obtain employment, attend trade schools, college and the military.
 - Operation Grounded are juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court mandated sanctions. The Oakland Park District will seek ways to assist and support the Department of Juvenile Probation so as to minimize the likely hood of reoffending. Emphasis will be placed to encourage public service and participation in community oriented activities.
 - TOP Tier are juvenile and adults who we have identified through intelligence who are likely committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution by working in tandem with the State Attorney's Office as well as Probation and Parole.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.

Subject: 1st Quarterly Report - 2016

The Oakland Park District has met with several challenges in the beginning of 2016. Crime has increases across several categories. These increases while troubling must be kept in perspective as historical crime remains low compared to past years. Constant analysis and true transparency are our best tool to address this trend. True crime reductions in the community requires a team approach between city staff, the police, and the residents of our City. By sharing crime information on a timely basis we hope to create awareness and garner information and calls for service. No suspicious incident is too minor to not warrant a call to the BSO. All our efforts remain to promote and expand this partnership.

The Oakland Park District will remain steadfast in its focus on top tier crime to include Burglary to Residence, Robbery and Burglary Business. These core crimes remain relatively flat with crime increases mostly being attributed to the burglary of vehicles and auto theft. Investigations have revealed that these crimes are mostly the result of juveniles with numerous arrests during the time period. The District has focused extensive efforts to address this youth crime trend with the implementation of a deputy for truancy as well as coordination with state or local juvenile organizations and schools. Many of these crimes are ones of opportunity involving valuables left in plain sight and unlocked car doors resulting in multiple cars being entered during a single spree. Public education is being conducted on a daily basis with new and innovative ways to reach out being sought.

These efforts in combination with diligent efforts to fill several vacancies in the District, are hoped to address any further increase in crime. Analysis of surrounding areas around the City and in the county have shown similar increases and trends, but the focus will remain on the relentless reduction of crime within the City of Oakland Park.

Crime Developments – 1st Quarter

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address the emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify the suspects, curb future crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes.

- CrimeMapping.com is designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI) is a GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map Crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView / Desktop is a new software technology allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

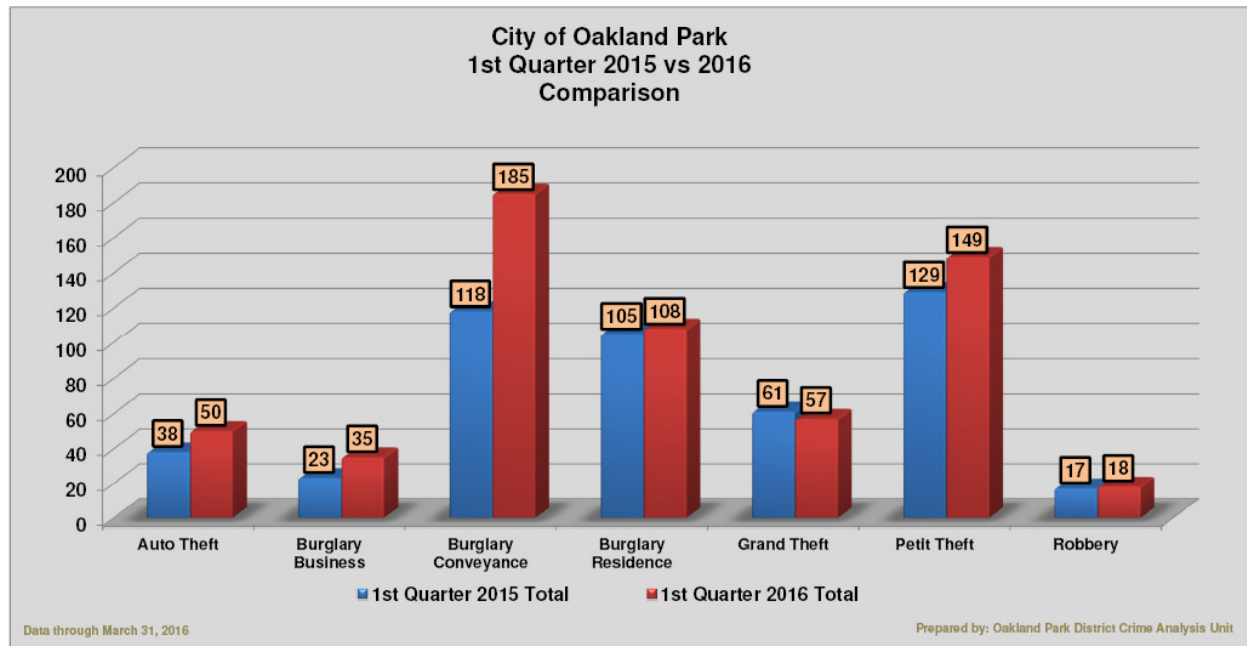
Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program. The cornerstone of this foundation is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. These tactics are implemented effectively by constant training and evaluating our efforts. The patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe, get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implantation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.

The STOP Program is an inclusive Program in the district targeting criminal offenders who prey on the citizens of Oakland Park. It is divided into the 3 subprograms each focusing on a different output.

1. **HOT** focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track becoming positive and productive citizens.
2. **Operation Grounded** are those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court mandated sanctions. If not it is our belief they will reoffend.
3. **TOP Tier** are those individuals both juvenile and adults who we have identified through intelligence that are committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.

In order to continually maintain crime reductions it will be necessary to retool, reinvigorate and refocus our efforts. These efforts must be coordinated with all units in this district and driven by leveraging all available technology to pin point or as close as possible predict where crime is going to occur. In order to accomplish this task, Crimes Response Unit is the platform for success. Below is a breakdown of how this section will operate.

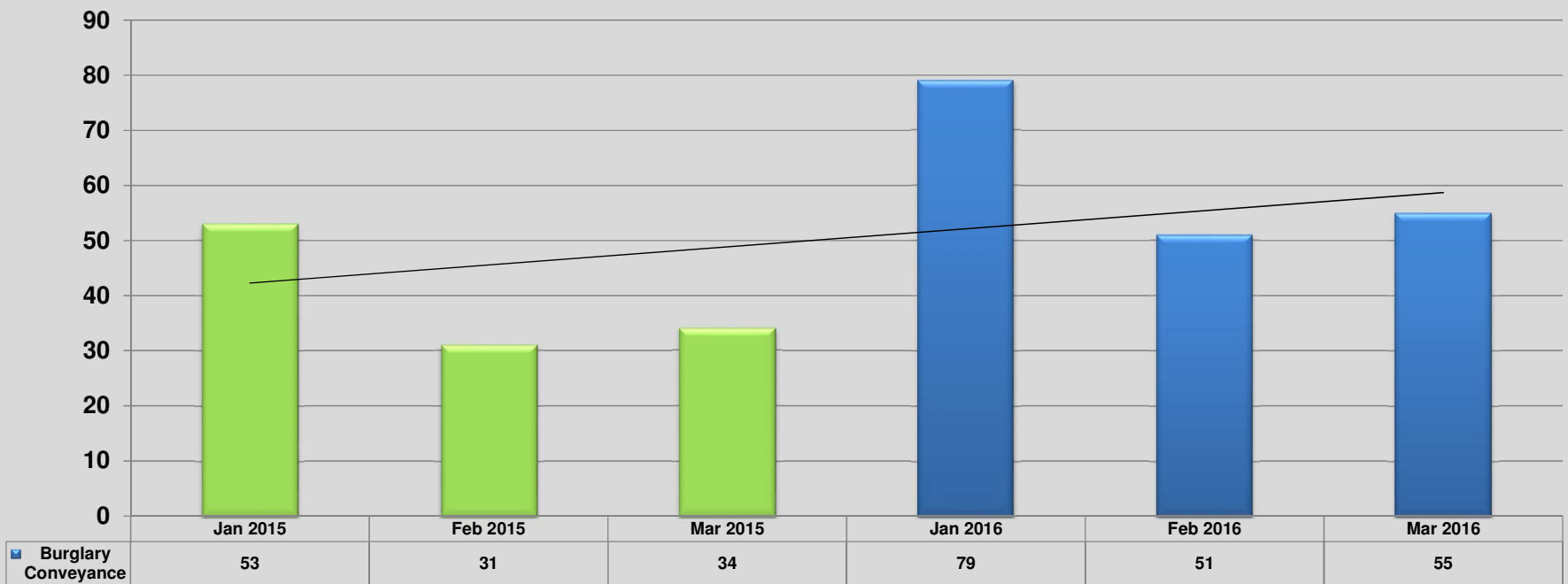

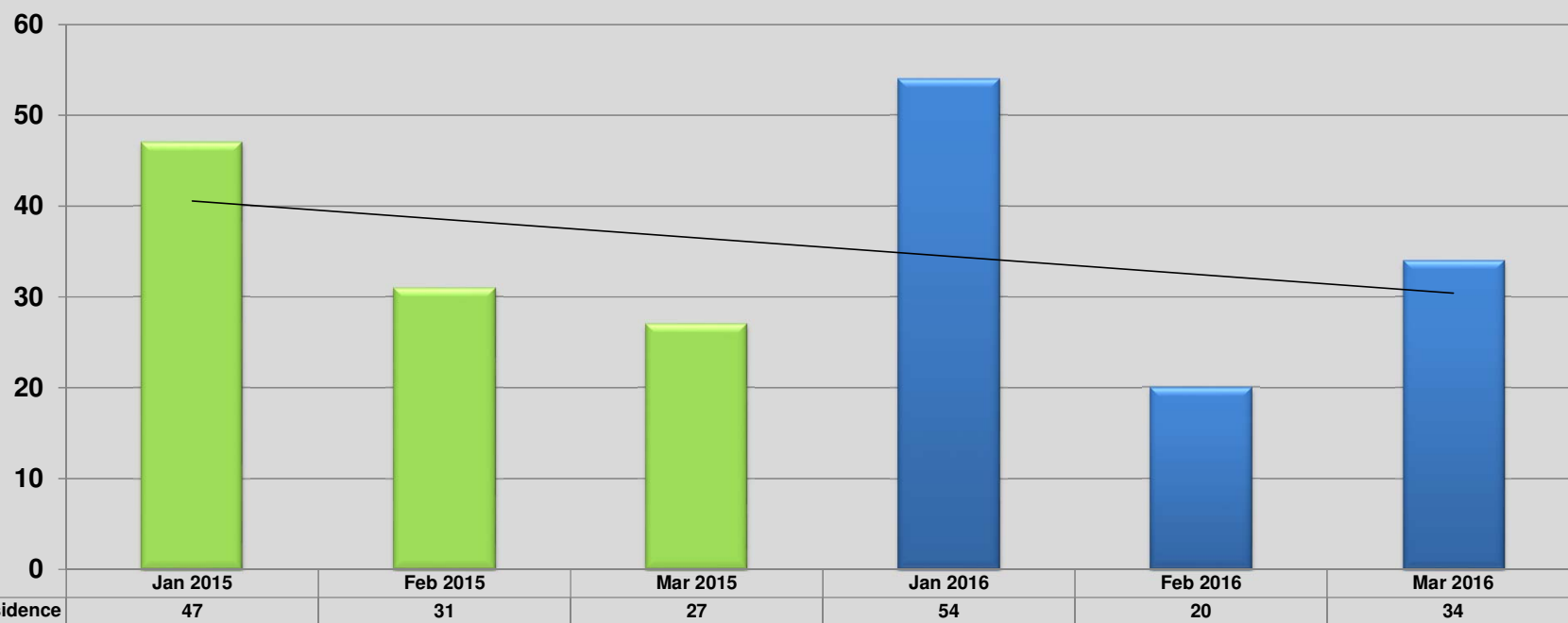

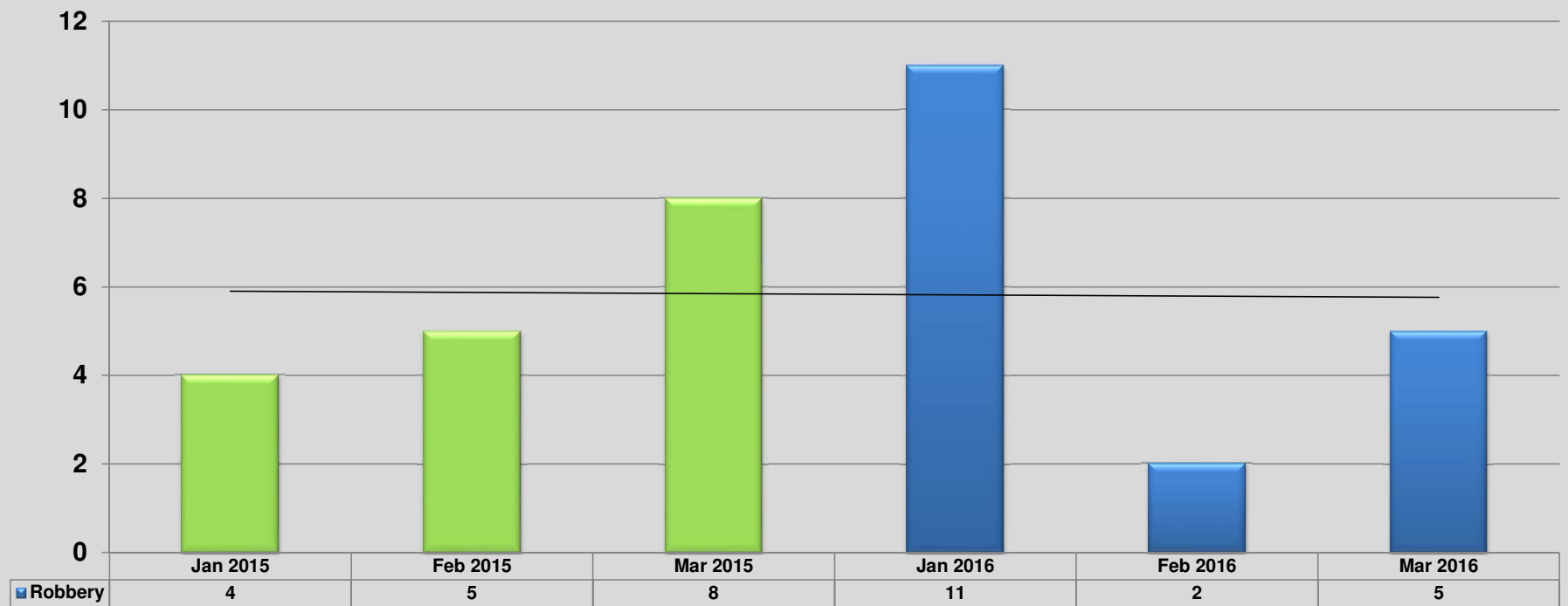

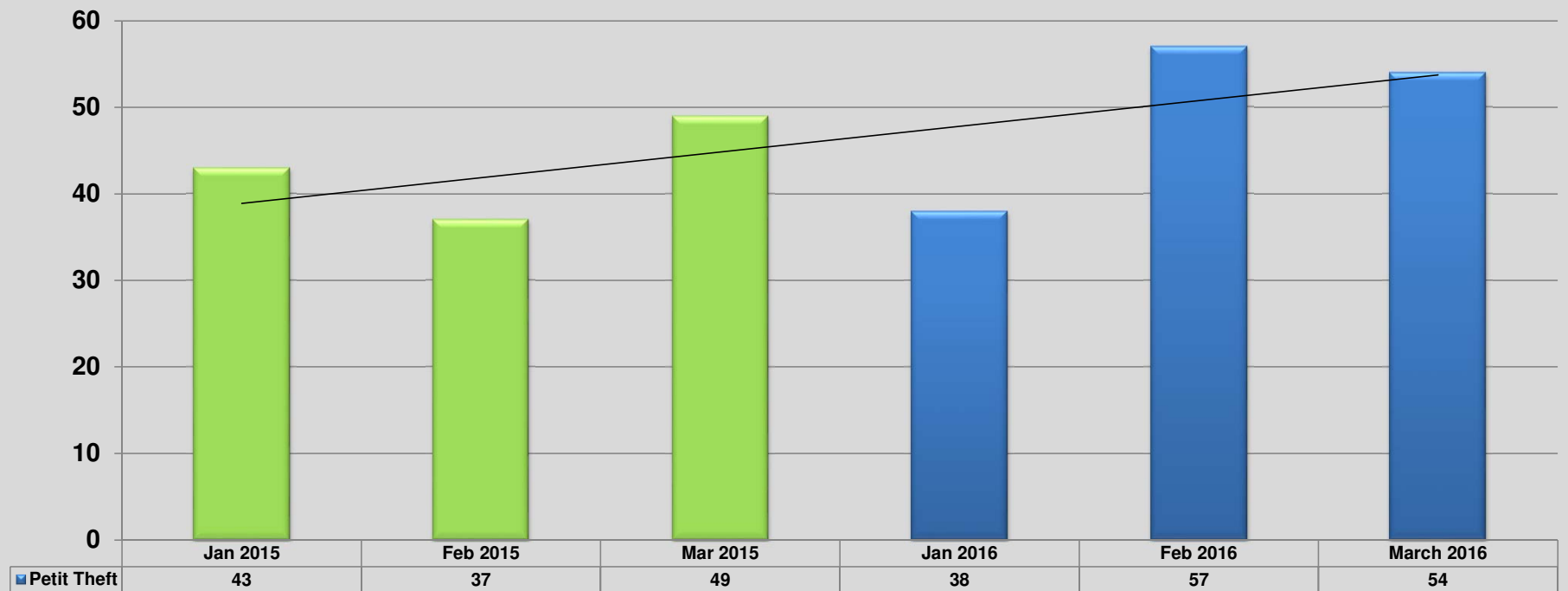

Auto Theft Arrest

On 2/14/2016, the victim received alerts from blue link advising her where her stolen vehicle was. She responded to 2915 NW 2nd Street and observed her stolen vehicle which was occupied. District 5 deputies responded, detained both occupants and contacted District 12 office. Detectives responded to District 5 office and interviewed both subjects. The driver stated the other occupant was just picked up 10 minutes prior to being placed into custody and had no involvement in the stolen vehicle. Passenger provided the same statement and was charged by District 5 deputies for obstruction, trespassing in stolen vehicle and VOP. Driver stated he did not steal the vehicle and it was given to him by a known subject. Driver was charged with Grand Theft Auto.

Grand Theft Arrest

On 1/13/2016 at approximately 1942 hours deputies responded to an employee theft at the Lowes Store located at 1001 W. Oakland Park Blvd. Upon arrival deputies met with loss prevention personnel who stated that an employee fraudulently activated and stole \$5000 worth of gift cards from the store on several occasions, throughout the month of December. Suspect was arrested and transported to the Oakland Park District Office where he was interviewed by Det. Wagener. During the interview suspect provided a full confession. It was determined that suspect was on felony probation for previous burglary and grand theft auto charges. Suspect was charged with (1) count of grand theft \$5000-\$10,000 and (1) count of felony VOP.

Burglary Residence Arrest

On 03/28/16, deputies responded to a Burglary residence at 3580 NW 17th Terr. The victim advised that while standing in her yard the suspect approached her in a confrontational matter. The victim felt threatened and attempted to go back inside her home at which time the suspect grabbed her by the waist preventing her from entering her home. She was eventually able to break free. Suspect opened the unlocked door of victim's home and entered the residence which was occupied by her juvenile son. Victim ran into the residence after suspect, where she was able to physically remove him from the residence. Victim's son called 911.

Victim advised that suspect is a former high school classmate. The two had been talking back and forth thru Facebook, but hadn't seen each other in years. Victim advised that suspect had a crush on her while they were in high school and believes he wants a romantic relationship with her.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On Thursday, 3/24/16, suspect attempted to burglarize victim's vehicle at 5150 N Andrews Ave. Victim confronted suspect who attempted to flee. Victim gave chase, catching suspect and holding him down until deputies arrived. Post-Miranda, suspect confessed to burglarizing victim's vehicle. Suspect is a juvenile and suspected of at least 2 additional burglary conveyance incidents (at 461 NW 47th St & 417 NW 47th St) the same date.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 01/11/2016 at 0300 hours Sgt. Chaves observed the suspect on a bicycle to the rear of Fort Lauderdale Prep School 3275 W Oakland Park Blvd. Sgt. Chaves questioned the suspect who lied about his name due to several active warrants. The suspect was found to have in his possession an Apple iPad. Sgt. Chaves observed two other bicycles resting against the wall which separates the school and The Isles. Sgt. Livingston was notified and responded to The Isles. A passport was located in front of 3177 NW 32nd Ct. Contact was made with the

victim at 3226 NW 31st Terr, who stated her vehicle was burglarized and the passport stolen. Contact was made with the victims at 3220 NW 32nd Terr, both of whom stated their vehicles were also burglarized. One victim was missing an Apple iPad and black cell phone charger and the other victim was missing a purple cell phone charger. The victim positively identified the Apple iPad the suspect had in his possession. Several other pieces of property were located to the rear of 3231 NW 32nd Terr which is directly on the other side of the wall where the bicycles and suspect was located. A purple cell phone charger was located and positively identified by the other victim. The suspect was charged accordingly.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On January 9th, 2016, at 2116hrs, deputies responded to 221 W Prospect Road in reference to a vehicle burglary in progress. The victim advised that (3) black male subjects had broken into his vehicle, and he chased them to the businesses at 221 West Prospect Road, where the subjects climbed onto the roof of the business. Dep. Perricone established a perimeter around the business plaza and the Papa Unit and K-9 responded. Papa Unit discovered that the (3) B/M subjects were hiding on the roof of Ward's City and advised that the subjects appeared to be dumping items out of their pockets. Deputies maintained the perimeter around the business and a Fire Rescue ladder truck was requested and responded to allow deputies access to the roof. Upon the arrival of the ladder truck, orders were relayed over a vehicle PA system by Dep. Celis, and the three subjects turned themselves in, climbing down the ladder. Once in custody a show-up was conducted and all three subjects were positively identified by the victim. A subsequent check of the rooftop revealed several credit cards which belonged to a different victim (Victim #2)

Det. Sokol arrived and made contact with victim #2, who advised that his vehicle had been burglarized between 7pm and 9pm on the above date, while he was parked at 3550 N Andrews Ave (Kimling Martial Arts Academy). Det. Sokol obtained statements from all parties and received confessions during his interviews.

All three subjects were charged accordingly and transported to JAC without incident.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 01/09/2016 at approximately 5:33am the victim was sleeping inside his vehicle in the parking lot of Set Point Apartments located at 241 NE 38th Street when he was awakened by the suspect as suspect was pulling on the handle of victim's locked vehicle. Due to the dark tint on the vehicle suspect didn't realize there was someone within the vehicle at the time. Suspect then continued on to the next vehicle when he realized victim's vehicle was locked. Victim waited for suspect to leave the immediate area, at which point he exited his vehicle and located suspect still trying vehicle door handles down the parking lot. Victim immediately called 9-1-1 and directed responding deputies to suspect, who fled upon seeing them. After a short foot pursuit, Dep. Foote took suspect into custody within his residence across the street at 200 NE 38th Street. A show-up was conducted with victim who positively identified suspect with 100% certainty. JAC confirmed suspect was not eligible for a Civil Citation. He was charged with Occupied Burglary & Resisting and transported to JAC.

Burglary / Domestic Violence Arrest

On 03/01/2016, deputies were dispatched to a domestic disturbance at 3035 NW 28th Lane. Victim #1 stated her ex-boyfriend of 8 years entered her residence without permission and battered her and her current boyfriend. Victim #1 stated suspect forcefully pushed his way through the front door screaming "where is that pussy?!" looking for victim #1's new boyfriend, victim #2. Once inside the residence the suspect physically fought victim #2 by placing him in a

chokehold and striking him numerous times. Victim #2 fought back by striking the suspect with an unloaded black powder rifle numerous times. All parties refused medical treatment on scene. Sworn statements were taken from both victims stating they wished to pursue criminal charges against the suspect, who was charged with Burglary w/Battery, Domestic battery and transported to the district office for further investigation. The suspect immediately requested a lawyer and refused to speak with detectives. The suspect was then transported to main jail for further processing.

Burglary / Domestic Violence Arrest

Victim reported that she was involved in a dispute with the father of her 2-year-old daughter while he was visiting the baby at her residence. During the argument, he produced a .40 caliber S & W handgun, and threatened to shoot the baby's mother and grandmother with it. He then drove off with their daughter. Victim provided a vehicle description and possible address. Deputies located the vehicle, apprehended the suspect, and recovered the firearm. SVU Det. Robson responded to the location of arrest to continue the investigation.

Burglary Residence Arrest

On 03/23/16, Dep. Earnest CCN #16979 observed involved subject riding a bike with suspect on the handlebars. The subjects were headed east on NE 57th Ct. and NE 6th Ave., away from the location of a burglary residence that just occurred. Suspect and involved subject are known burglars and co-defendants from previous case #12-1502-002284. Dep. Earnest attempted to conduct a traffic stop with the individuals. Suspect jumped off the handle bars of the bike and ran. A perimeter was set. Shortly thereafter, suspect was apprehended.

A canvas was conducted and a t-shirt, Bluetooth speaker, earphones and a Publix bag containing 6 watches were observed on the south side of a residence located at 5660 NE 5th Ter. The fence was also broken. Victim had observed suspect running through his backyard and did desire to prosecute.

Post-Miranda, suspect admitted to jumping the fence and dropping the items in the yard, stating the found items belonged to him. Detectives conducted a 3- hour interview with suspect, during which time he admitted to committing several burglaries throughout Oakland Park; refusing, however, to give specific dates, times and locations. Suspect was advised of his charges and transported to the Main Jail.

Burglary Storage Unit Arrest

On 03/15/16, District 11's Det. Pedre arrested suspect for several counts of burglary, grand theft, false owner info to pawn shops and dealing in stolen property. Suspect subsequently confessed to several burglaries that occurred in Pompano Beach and Oakland Park.

On 03/16/16 at approximately 1700 hours, Oakland Park detectives assisted Det. Pedre and Pompano Beach C.I. with the execution of a search warrant for the suspect's storage units located at 4048 NE 11th Ave. Oakland Park, and 1100 NE 45th St. Unit #329 Oakland Park.

So far, two Oakland Park victims have been identified: Victim #1, who reported that his storage unit located at 4500 N. Dixie Hwy. #478 Oakland Park, was burglarized on 02/21/16, and approximately \$2,500.00 worth of miscellaneous items was stolen. Victim #1 responded to 4048 NE 11th Ave. and 1100 NE 45th St., where he positively identified several items as stolen from his storage unit. Photographs were taken of the stolen items. A property receipt was completed and the items were released to victim #1

Victim #2 did not report a burglary to his storage unit, however he did confirm that his storage unit was burglarized sometime in February of 2016. Additional burglary charges are pending for suspect.

Burglary Residence Arrest

On 02/10/2016 Dep. Desposito responded to an audible alarm at 740 NE 59th Street. Upon arrival he observed an open bedroom window, beneath which were a chair, backpack and a flashlight. A perimeter was immediately established; the house was cleared and found to be unoccupied, but ransacked. Dep. Desposito retrieved the backpack and flashlight. Inside the backpack was paperwork from Rickards Middle School with suspect's name.

On 2/11/2016 contact was made with suspect and his mother at the district office. Suspect provided a full confession to the burglary, stated he was with two others but declined to identify them. Suspect advised entry was made into the residence via the bedroom window while using the victim's chair. Once inside the residence he utilized the victim's flashlight which was found inside the residence. Suspect began ransacking the residence. The residential alarm was activated and suspect fled through the bedroom window. He dropped the flashlight outside and fled the residence, leaving behind his backpack. Suspect was charged accordingly.

While at JAC, the intake officer asked suspect if he'd attended his court date the previous day. Suspect shook his head and the intake officer contacted Judge Orlando, who immediately issued eight (8) warrants for suspect for the previous two burglary conveyances, two thefts and four possessions of stolen credit cards when he was arrested on 1/9/16 under case 12-1601-000914.

Burglary School/Structure Arrest

Deputies responded to the Oakland Park Elementary school at 936 NE 33rd St regarding an alarm. Video monitoring showed a W/M suspect opening doors and collecting computers, placing them into a bag. A perimeter was established and BSO K9 conducted a search and apprehended suspect, who was charged with Burglary and Grand Theft.

Burglary Residence Arrest

On 01/11/2016 at approximately 0810 hours, deputies and detectives responded to an in-progress residential burglary. Upon arrival, contact was made with the witness who stated she observed a beige Hyundai drop off a light-skinned black or Hispanic female. Witness then observed the suspect enter the victim's backyard at which time she called the police. Det. Sokol observed the suspect in the backyard throwing a bag containing stolen items over the west side of the fence. Suspect was subsequently placed in to custody by Det. Sokol and positively identified by the witness on-scene. Suspect stated she is currently homeless but was staying at the Plantation Inn, and then invoked her right to an attorney.

Det. Wagener responded to the Plantation Inn in an attempt to locate the suspect vehicle. He observed a Hyundai matching the description and license plate of the vehicle that dropped off suspect. While conducting surveillance, Det. Wagener observed a 2nd suspect enter the vehicle. He followed the vehicle as it departed the Plantation Inn parking lot, and conducted a traffic stop on the Hyundai at 1861 NW 59th Av., Sunrise. Suspect #2, the sole occupant/driver of the vehicle, was positively identified by Det. Sokol as the driver of the vehicle seen leaving the area of the burglary as he responded to the scene. Suspect #2 was placed in to custody and invoked his right to an attorney.

Suspect #1 was charged with Burglary Residence, Grand Theft, Poss. of Cocaine and Poss. of Drug Paraphernalia. Suspect #2 was charged with Burglary Residence and Poss. of Cannabis.

Community Action Plans

District Staff meets each week to discuss crime trends, arrests and Juvenile Probationary Offenders to deploy deputies into the affected areas. The Crime Suppression Team is also deployed into the affected crime areas to combat emerging crimes.

Crime mapping and reporting is performed three times each week. These maps and reports depict the crimes that occurred during the previous week and then again mid-week and at the end of the week.

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and traffic citations that are issued. Utilizing this technology allows the district to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the district to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.

The District also addressed several traffic related initiatives during this quarter.

The City of Oakland Park has two major roadways that experience heavy congestion. The Oakland Park corridor is currently under construction which magnifies the situation and increases the rear-end type crash. Additionally, a major beach re-habilitation project is underway. This has increased the number of commercial vehicles utilizing these roadways.

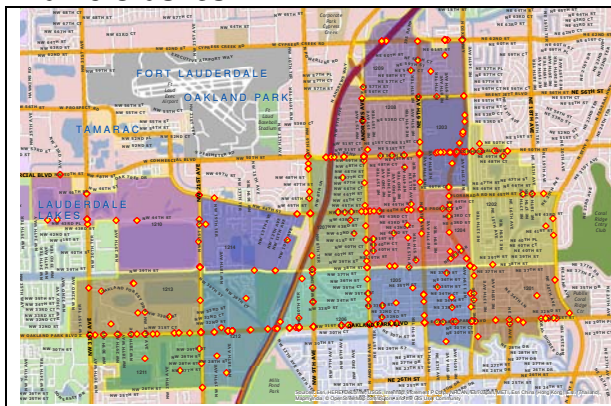
The Oakland Park Traffic unit has deployed Information signs to provide traffic warnings to commuters. Increased traffic enforcement has been conducted at key intersections in an attempt to educate the public and reduce the crashes in these areas. Additionally, the City of Oakland Park is currently participating in a Pedestrian / Bicycle Safety Grant. The first phase of this grant is directed towards education which would explain the increased number of warnings citations being issued.

During this quarter, a pattern of traffic crashes developed on two major roadways.

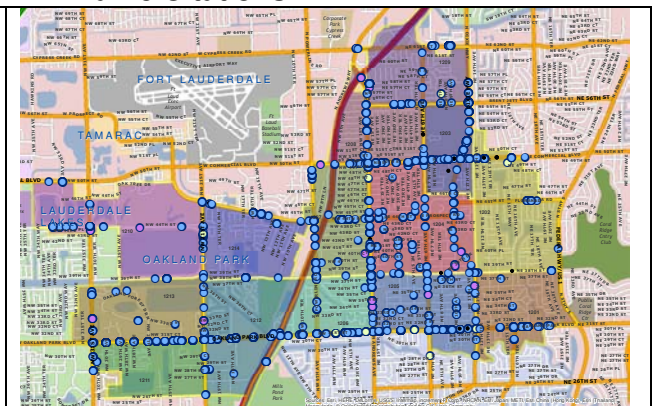

Homeless Outreach

District deputies have attended the Crisis Intervention course training. CIT certified deputies respond to persons suffering from mental health crisis situations. The Crisis Intervention Team deputies work with the mental health system and advocacy groups to ensure persons with mental health issues are addressed. A team of CIT District deputies hits the streets weekly to locate those in need of assistance. They assist with services, transportation, food, clothing and entry into substance abuse programs. These deputies educate, encourage and help these persons get off the streets and into a shelter or abuse program.

What is the most active Crime. **Burglary Conveyance** .

Crime Trends Response

During this period the most prominent crime was burglary conveyance. Three occurred Sunday night in 1210 Zone. One occurred during church services where a b/m suspect was seen by a witness inside an unlocked vehicle. When confronted the suspect fled. The vehicle owner chased the suspect until he lost visual. A perimeter was established and canine responded however the suspect was not located. The other two burglary conveyances in 1210 Zone had smashed out windows. Monday on Alpha Shift a burglary conveyance occurred in 1204 Zone. The juvenile suspect was arrested on scene and charged accordingly. Tuesday morning on Alpha Shift deputies responded to a residential burglary in progress in 1205 Zone. The suspect was apprehended, debriefed by District CI, and subsequently charged with two counts of trespass. Westside deputies continued to conduct proactive enforcement which led to the recovery of a stolen vehicle, two stolen license plates, and several misdemeanor arrests.

Sheriff's Targeted Offender Program (Top Tier and Operation Grounded / Current List)

No contacts were made during this time period.

P.O.P. / Quality of Life Issues (Graffiti, Street Lights, Business Watch, Snipe Signs and dumping, etc)

Deputies conducted area checks at Courts of Oakland Park as request by a condo board member.

Deputies continued to conduct area checks at the Laundrymat located at 2180 W Oakland Park Blvd in reference to vagrants loitering and sleeping inside the business as requested by the business owner.

Fawcett	<p>Deputy Fawcett is a senior deputy and he applies an extremely proactive effort to his daily assignments and that effort has resulted in a positive effect on the community. He clearly understands the implications of situations and uses sound judgment when deciding what course of action to take in his daily routines. Bonilla	<p>Recognizing the lifesaving efforts of Deputy Yasmani Garcia and Deputy Sean Bonilla for their commitment and compassion for the residents of the City Oakland Park.</p> <p>On February 14, 2016 deputies were dispatched to 631 NE 43rd Street in reference to a female attempting to commit suicide. Deputies Garcia and Bonilla quickly arrived on scene and were met by the victim's mother who advised that her daughter had swallowed several pills and locked herself inside a vehicle. The deputies tried to calm the victim down and have her unlock the car, but she refused to open the door. The victim then produced a razor blade and began to cut her wrist. Deputies Garcia and Bonilla were forced to break the windows and in the process sustained lacerations on their hands. March 2016 Detective E. Blevins Detective S. Magri	<p>On February 24, 2016, Detectives Blevins and Magri received an anonymous tip of a subject possibly delivering methamphetamine within the City of Oakland Park. Detectives set up surveillance in the area and identified a suspicious vehicle that had committed several traffic violations. They conducted a traffic stop and the driver was identified as a resident of Oakland Park and operating as an UBER driver. The suspect had a suspended driver's license and 11 grams of methamphetamine in his possession. The driver was arrested and charged accordingly, the vehicle and cash were submitted for seizure/forfeiture. Detectives Blevins and</p>

	<p>Magri, along with BSO SID detectives, utilized information gleaned from this arrest and were able to arrest two more suspects for methamphetamine delivery on February 25, 2016, both were also UBER drivers and residents of the City of Oakland Park.</p> <p>On February 28, 2016, further follow-up investigation, working with SID and other LE counterparts, led to a Federal Search Warrant being executed in Miami-Dade County in which a fourth suspect arrested and a pound of methamphetamine and over \$60,000.00 in cash were seized. The investigation did not stop there, a fifth person who agreed to make a delivery of methamphetamine, was also arrested.</p> <p>Detectives Eric Blevins and Steven Magri exhibited exceptional investigative skills and commitment serving the citizens of Oakland Park, arrested five narcotics dealing suspects. For these reasons they are the Oakland Park Employee of the Month for March 2016.</p>
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Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business and Robbery.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2015 saw a slight increase in residential burglaries due to an organized group of adults and juveniles that targeted homes within the city. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the district.
- Identify and implement the most effective ways to communicate real time crime trend analysis to all members of the district to assure a team approach.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole and further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have positive impact on recidivism and sentencing.
- Carry on the district's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park Community Enhancement to address neglected properties, assure code compliance and improve the overall appearance of the city.

All it takes is one neglected property to impact an entire neighborhood, the District will work at all levels to support and assist the City Community Enhancement. By working closely with the city and combining resources in nontraditional roles, we can maintain and improve the high standards the residents expect, helping Oakland Park sustain the reputation of being a desirable and safe place to live, shop, visit, work, and play.

- District deputies will report abandoned properties, graffiti and vandalism to Community Enhancement and work together to address the problems.
- District deputies will attend Community Enhancement meetings to ensure input and participation in city projects.
- District deputies will attend Home Owners and Business Group meetings to ensure the community's concerns are shared and effectively addressed with the City's Community Enhancement.
- District Deputies will educate the community of how to report nuisance/abandoned properties utilizing the City's P.O.P. smartphone application.
- Coordinate with the residents and businesses to improve the environmental design of their property. This will be accomplished through the partnership with various City departments.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the city who encounter construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently situations are created when the safety and the flow of traffic is compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all M.O.T.'s (Maintenance of Traffic).
- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The variety of innovative youth programs will be utilized to maximize positive outcomes from those youth who are ensnared within the criminal justice system.
 - Habitual Offender Tracking, (HOT) focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their repeated criminal behavior and getting back on the right track becoming positive and productive citizens. Those in the program will be given guidance and support to obtain employment, attend trade schools, college and the military.
 - Operation Grounded are juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses and due to their past and present criminal behavior have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court mandated sanctions. The Oakland Park District will seek ways to assist and support the Department of Juvenile Probation so as to minimize the likely hood of reoffending. Emphasis will be placed to encourage public service and participation in community oriented activities.
 - TOP Tier are juvenile and adults who we have identified through intelligence who are likely committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution by working in tandem with the State Attorney's Office as well as Probation and Parole.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.
