It is my honor and pleasure to present the Oakland Park District 2017 Annual Report. The contents of this report represent the efforts of our District, the community and our City staff and officials to address the safety and security of our City. It is the efforts of our community that are truly effective in providing the success we enjoy today.

There were numerous challenges in the year 2017, to include hurricanes, social strife, disgusting acts of violence and political controversy, which have impacted us all. Through all of this, Oakland Park has risen above the fray to show the world how special our City is. Our response as a City to the challenges of Hurricane Irma was commendable. We saw our public safety personnel working hand in hand with our residents and City staff. The City of Oakland Park came closer together and more united while other communities around the nation struggled. Oakland Park received one of the highest ratings from the *Human Rights Campaign Municipality Equality Index*, standing as testament to the cohesive nature of our City's community. Our neighborhoods became safer with declining crime and an emphasis on community partnerships that remains at an all-time high. Our Oakland Park deputies and civilian staff assured that they were seen on a regular basis at all our amazing City events, from Dancing in the Streets to Oktoberfest. Our success lies in not just providing law enforcement for Oakland Park, but in being an integral part of Oakland Park.

Like any successful organization, success cannot be achieved without clear goals and objectives. Each year we sit down as a team and decide what will be our focus in the coming year. This focus must align with the focus of the City and act to support the City in every way. We then relentlessly pursue our goals and measure our success on their attainment. Below you will read our goals, our strategy and our attainment of those goals.

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business, Robbery and Burglary Conveyance.

Strategy

- The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.
- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the District.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole in identifying juveniles who enter and/or complete probation as a way to reduce recidivism. Further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have an impact on juveniles who reoffend, only to victimize the citizens of Oakland Park.
- Carry on the District's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

Attainment

- ✓ There were 97 fewer occurrences of Burglary Conveyance, which represents a 15 percent decrease over the past year. The District has focused closely on those responsible for our car break-ins with numerous arrests to date and several suspects identified.
- ✓ Burglary Residence was decreased to the lowest level in over a decade (209), as a result of several years of concentrated effort. Many of our apprehensions were a direct result of citizen involvement stemming from an extensive education effort focusing on "if it's suspicious to you it's suspicious to us."
- ✓ After a general trend of Robbery reduction over the past several years, the District experienced a slight increase in Robbery. This trend was found to be influenced by the proliferation of social media marketplaces, which required buyers and sellers to meet, often in less than ideal circumstance, for the exchange of goods and money. The District, upon realizing this practice, immediately extended its own parking lot as a "safe place" for such exchanges in the hopes that this would allow our residents a safe location to conduct these transactions.
- ✓ In an attempt to increase communication with the public, and share information, the District continued to use methods to include message boards, internet, attendance at community meetings and other means used in past years. Additionally the District sought new means to communicate information concerning the public. One example being long past practices, re-invented for use today. Deputies on numerous occasions went door to

door with flyers in hand regarding important information and crime awareness. This “old school” outreach was very successful and provided a conduit for communication and crime investigation not provided by some of our modern technology.

- ✓ The District achieved its overall goal of crime reduction with an approximate 12 percent decline in crime across the board, with our largest reductions in Burglary Residence, Theft and Burglary Conveyance.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY – PARKS AND LEISURE DIVISION

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park and Leisure Divisions, the citizens, parents, children and businesses that interact with various recreation programs the City offers.

Strategy

- Deputies will interact with the youth and work on reinforcing a positive relationship with law enforcement. We will ascertain what their needs are in their community and provide crime prevention and safety information. Promote crime prevention plans and increase ways that youth can protect themselves, and their property as well as be involved members of the community.
- Deputies come in contact with hundreds of school aged children each day. Deputies will instill a positive relationship with the various groups of youth. Some of the safety programs the deputies will discuss with the youth are: Increased awareness of law enforcement deputies, drug prevention, anti-crime efforts, bullying, stranger danger, bicycle safety, pool safety, internet safety, neighborhood watch, school watch, pedestrian safety and others.
- Build trust in the communities and with the youths.
- Role models, improve trust and the perception of law enforcement.
- Understand the youth’s perception of the law enforcement officer.
- Use positive interactions to foster better communication and improve relationships.
- Summer break from school is an opportunity for the City’s youth to enjoy the time away from school and summer vacation with their families. Many youths enroll in a summer recreation program with the City’s Recreation Department. Deputies will engage the children attending these summer programs and open a discussion on several topics.
- Deputies would also interact and build positive relationships with the youths by engaging them in the activities at the recreation centers and, in some instances, traveling with them on their field trips to an offsite venue.

Attainment

- ✓ Deputies were embedded into the City’s summer programs, allowing them daily interaction with the children participating in the variety of activities organized by the Parks and Leisure Department. This allowed deputies a non-confrontation venue to educate and mentor our young residents of the City, improving their perception of law enforcement.

- ✓ Deputies organized and attended the AARP Senior Citizen Safe Driver program offered by the City of Oakland Park and AARP. This again provided a valuable opportunity to interact with our citizens and partner with our Parks and Leisure services.
- ✓ Additional presence of deputies at parks and recreational facilities throughout the City. This presence included golf cart patrol where water was distributed along with important crime prevention material. Deputies specifically sought interaction with our residents, even providing “dog watch” tags to our residents walking dogs, in the hopes of encouraging citizen involvement in the community. Deputies conducted daily Park and Talks, as well as regular consultation with parks staff to address park concerns.
- ✓ Regular attendance at community meetings where residents could be provided a forum to discuss their concerns and needs regarding the parks program and safety concerns in Oakland Park.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City’s Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Strategy

- The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects. We will also participate in the planning, approval implementation and follow-up portions of large scaled community events and special events.
- Create a liaison to the City’s Engineering and Community Development Department to review all MOTs (Maintenance of Traffic) and the Neighborhood Traffic Committee.
- The Oakland Park District will participate in the various committees and departments in pre-planning, coordination of resources, approval process, and implementation and after action follow-up in the Special Events Application process.
- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City’s borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

Attainment

- ✓ The Oakland Park District is now a full member of the review committee for all road closures and MOTs affecting the City. This proved very important in 2017, as railway construction had a significant impact on the residents of Oakland Park. The Oakland Park District also is represented on plan review for development within the City. The Oakland Park District has a dedicated position to liaison with Oakland Park Code Enforcement.
- ✓ The Oakland Park District was an integral partner in the review of the Dixie Hwy curve and participated in the DOT review which will have significant impact on safety with planned enhancements.

- ✓ With the increase in special events in the City, Oakland Park District has taken a lead role in review and approval; assuring events are held safely with adequate resources.
- ✓ The Oakland Park District worked to improve cooperation between the District and surrounding jurisdictions. This resulted in several interagency plans to address concerns affecting multiple municipalities. Liaisons were identified to assure instant communication as needed on a daily basis.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

Strategy

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The District developed a program within the District that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens and visitors of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other Districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output: (JuMP) – Juvenile Monitoring Portal.
- The School Resource Officers are tasked with the portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SOA, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamentals to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
- The Crime Suppression Team is assigned to monitor those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their past and present criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the juveniles and their parents to discuss the juvenile's curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with the Juvenile SOA and Juvenile Probation are all fundamentals to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
- The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible for those individuals – both juvenile and adults – who have identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the city. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.

Attainment

- ✓ The Oakland Park District conducted more than 22 safety presentations at our schools to provide our youth with important information to include drug prevention, anti-bullying, crime prevention and a wealth of information on keeping safe.
- ✓ The District continued and expanded our juvenile mentoring and monitoring program to assist youth in meeting the expectations of a variety of youthful offender programs that exist to deter criminal behavior.
- ✓ A direct liaison was created with the Department of Juvenile Justice to provide the District with current information regarding juveniles within the City who were under community control or probation.
- ✓ The Oakland Park Explorer program provided numerous success stories in 2017. Its members included a current Deputy Sheriff, a BSO civilian employee and one member even was accepted into the FBI summer youth program.
- ✓ Deputies sought every opportunity to interact with our youth on a daily basis. Such activities included bicycle rodeos, bicycle give always, backpack giveaways, career days, gift wrapping at our area schools during the holidays and a long list of initiatives all year long.

The above represents only a small example of the work being done day to day in the Oakland Park District. As District Chief, I take great pride in having the opportunity to work with such talented individuals who, as a team, accomplished so much this year. Transparency and an open door are the hallmarks of a successful police department. As in the past, I invite you to review all four of the Quarterly Reports that make up our Annual Report and give numerous examples of the great work that is done each day in our City. I invite your feedback and ask that you call, email, or come by the office to discuss any ideas or concerns you may have.

Subject: Annual 2017 District Activity Report

Attached is the 2017 District Activity Report for the Oakland Park District. Comparing 2017 to 2016, the crime categories with an increase were Larceny – Auto Parts, Larceny – Purse Snatching, and Aggravated Assault. Burglary Residence has decreased by 27% overall. The District is showing a decrease in Part 1 Crimes for 2017 of 11 percent, compared to 2016 (264 fewer crimes). Part 2 Crimes for 2017 increased 17% compared to 2016 (158 additional crimes).

Auto Theft

- During 2017, there were 172 vehicles stolen, with 103 of them recovered and returned to the owner. An increase in Auto Thefts occurred in May, August, September, and November. Of the 103 recoveries, 85 were recovered in Broward and 13 in Dade County. Of the 85 recoveries in Broward, 41 of those were recovered in Oakland Park. 32 of the stolen vehicles were either cleared by arrest, unfounded or exceptions (victim refused to press charges).

Burglary Conveyance

- During 2017, there was a decrease in Burglary Conveyances compared to 2016 (-14%). The two highest months during 2017 were March and April. Zones 1204 (69 incidents) and 1213 (62 incidents) had the highest incidents of conveyance burglaries. Seven action plans were initiated and adjusted as the trends and patterns developed and changed. 66 of the conveyance burglaries were either cleared by arrest, unfounded, or by exception (victim refused to press charges).

Burglary Residence

- During 2017, there was a decrease in Burglary Residence compared to 2016 (-27%). The two highest months during 2017 were January and May. Zones 1204 (35 incidents) and 1207 (32 incidents) had the highest incidents of residential burglaries. One action plan was initiated in response to an identified burglary trend. 43 of the residential burglaries were either cleared by arrest, unfounded, or by exception (victim refused to press charges).




City of Oakland Park Comparison 2016 vs 2017


City of Oakland Park - 3-Year Comparison *Auto Theft*


City of Oakland Park - 3-Year Comparison *Burglary Business*


City of Oakland Park - 3-Year Comparison *Burglary Conveyance*


City of Oakland Park - 3-Year Comparison *Burglary Residence*






City of Oakland Park - 3-Year Comparison *Robbery*

City of Oakland Park - 3-Year Comparison *Petit Theft*




Florida State Statute Crimes - YTD 2017


City of Oakland Park - 2017 by Month *Burglary Conveyance*


City of Oakland Park - 2017 by Month *Burglary Residence*


City of Oakland Park - 2017 Quarter Comparison *Auto Theft*

City of Oakland Park - 2017 Quarter Comparison *Burglary Business*




Burglary Conveyance




Robbery

City of Oakland Park - 2017 Quarter Comparison *Grand Theft*



Crime Developments – 4th Quarter

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify suspects, curb crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes:

- CrimeMapping.com: designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI): a GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView/Desktop: new software technology that allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program, the cornerstone of which is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. Effective implementation of these tactics are due to constant training and evaluating our efforts. Patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe and get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implementation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.


The District developed a program – JuMP (Juvenile Monitoring Portal), previously known as STOP – which is divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output – that targets repeat criminal offenders who prey on the citizens of and visitors to Oakland Park. The program allows for the mentoring and monitoring of repeat juvenile offenders in an effort to reduce recidivism. This model has now been adopted by the agency and implemented in many agencies.

1. School Resource Deputies are tasked with the portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges, and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamental to ensuring successful compliance.
2. The Crime Suppression Team monitors those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their overall criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release, probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the adults or juveniles and their parents to discuss the curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
3. The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible for those individuals – both juveniles and adults – who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.

In order to maintain crime reductions, the district regularly assesses and updates the enforcement methods being utilized. These methods must be coordinated with all units in this district and driven by leveraging all available technology to pinpoint, or as close as possible, predict where crime will occur. In order to accomplish this task, units within the District are brought together to share intelligence, crime analysis, current trends and apprehensions. The units responsible for these programs are:





City of Oakland Park - 4th Quarter 2017 Comparison *Burglary Business*






City of Oakland Park - 4th Quarter 2017 Comparison *Burglary Residence*


City of Oakland Park - 4th Quarter 2017 Comparison *Robbery*


City of Oakland Park - 4th Quarter 2017 Comparison *Grand Theft*

Grand Theft Auto Residential Burglary Arrest

On 10/12/17, at approximately 0830 hours, Dep. T. Brown received a lo-jack hit for a white Range Rover stolen out of the city of Parkland. Dep. T. Brown located the vehicle westbound at 2700 W Commercial Blvd, where it was involved in an accident with a cement truck. A male driver exited the vehicle and fled into a residential neighborhood, while a female who remained in the vehicle was detained. A perimeter was established around the neighborhood the suspect fled into. The suspect was found hiding in a trash can by K-9 Deputies. The suspect was taken into custody, interviewed by Detectives, and transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Burglary Residence and Arson Arrest

On 10/31/17 Deputies responded to a suspicious incident involving four juveniles seen entering an unoccupied residence. A witness provided descriptions of the four juveniles, who were no longer in the residence upon the arrival of Deputies. A check of the residence revealed extensive damage, to include burnt carpeting, items melted onto the floor, broken windows and fixtures, and paint poured into the bathroom plumbing. While Deputies were still at the residence, one of the suspects, along with his father, approached Deputies. Soon after the three remaining juvenile suspects were located and detained.

All four juvenile suspects were positively identified by the witness in this case, at which time they were taken into custody. All four suspects were interviewed by Detectives and transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 10/19/17 Deputies were dispatched to a burglary that just occurred to a vehicle. Deputies responded and established a perimeter around the neighborhood. During the perimeter Sgt. Celletti observed a vehicle backing out of a residence. The vehicle drove away at a high rate of speed without headlights activated, making several evasive turns through the neighborhood. The vehicle came to an abrupt stop in the yard of a residence, at which time a male suspect bailed out of the vehicle, fleeing through the neighborhood. Sgt. Celletti approached the vehicle, detaining a female in the passenger seat. The male suspect in this case was not located.

Several stolen items from Oakland Park burglaries were located within the suspect vehicle, as well as approximately 70 victims IDs, credit cards, checks, passports and personal information. To date, victims have been located as far as northern Florida. The female suspect was interviewed by Detectives and transported to the Main Jail.

Burglary Business Arrest

On 10/28/17 and 10/29/17, a suspect broke into the non-profit business, PTL Cabinets, stealing multiple power tools. After reviewing their surveillance footage, the suspect was identified by the business owner as a former employee and tenant. The victim further advised that he believed the suspect to be dangerous due to his criminal past, possible narcotics use, and what was described as an aggressive attitude. On 11/02/17, detectives received information on the suspect's current location, and with the assistance of the Oakland Park Crime Suppression Team, the suspect was taken into custody without issue. The suspect was interviewed by Detectives and transported to the Mian Jail.

Multiple Structure Burglaries Arrest

Between 08/17 and 10/17, a noted increase in storage unit burglaries occurred at the Public Storage facility, where in excess of 20 burglaries were reported under 14 separate case numbers. Through investigation a primary suspect, who rented a unit at the facility, was identified. It was discovered that the suspect in this case was currently on felony probation, with a GPS ankle monitor. A review of the suspects GPS monitor revealed that during the timeframe of each of the above burglaries, the suspect was at the facility and in close proximity to the burglarized units. Additionally, in one of the burglaries where a large quantity of precious metal was stolen, the GPS monitor showed the suspect immediately driving to a cash for gold business after the burglary. Also, during this investigation it was found that the suspect had disposed of several bags of trash from his unit. The bags were recovered and a check of the bags contents revealed numerous pieces of property stolen out of burglarized units.

With the above information, a search warrant was obtained and executed for the suspect's storage unit. During the search of the suspect's unit, large quantities of stolen property from the above burglarized units were recovered. Also, during the warrant execution the suspect arrived on scene and was taken into custody. The suspect was interviewed by Detectives.

Multiple Conveyance Burglaries Arrest

On 11/10/17, deputies were dispatched to a call in reference to two juvenile males with a flashlight attempting to enter a vehicle. Upon deputies' arrival, the two juvenile males fled. A perimeter was established around the neighborhood. In the perimeter, Dep. Celis observed two juvenile males matching the suspects' descriptions and attempted to stop them. One of the suspects stopped, but the second suspect was able to evade deputies. The suspect stopped by Dep. Celis was positively identified by a witness to the crime.

The suspect was transported to the Oakland Park District office and interviewed by Detectives. During the interview the suspect provided a full confession and identified the second suspect who fled the scene. In addition, the suspect confessed to a second vehicle burglary he and his above accomplice had committed the previous day. The suspect advised they stole a credit card from that vehicle, utilizing it at the Walgreens located at 601 E Commerical Blvd. Surveillance video was obtained from the Walgreens which confirmed the suspect's statements.

The second suspect was subsequently located and taken into custody. Both suspect were transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Residential and Conveyance Burglaries Arrest

On 11/13/17, Dep. Tubbergen responded to a delayed report of a vehicle burglary. Upon her arrival, she discovered that the victim was able to track her stolen iPad via GPS and that the reported location was current. Dep. Tubbergen notified her supervisor, who passed this information on to Detectives. A canvas was conducted and it appeared that the iPad GPS was tracking to the backyard of a residence.

Contact was made with a resident of the home who provided a consent to search, and pointed at another resident and stated, "He probably did it; he likes to steal stuff." Deputies then searched the area and located the stolen iPad hidden under some plant life in the backyard. Detectives began a consensual conversation with the man who the resident had pointed out, who admitted to taking the iPad. While on scene, an additional delayed burglary report was dispatched. Dep. Tubbergen, believing these incidents to possibly be related, took the initiative to contact the victim from the second burglary and gain a description of the stolen items. From her conversation we were able to learn that items located with the stolen iPad were stolen from the second burglary.

The suspect was taken into custody and transported to the Oakland Park District office where he was interviewed by Detectives and then transported to the Main Jail.

Facebook Robberies Arrest

On 11/23/17, a victim was robbed at the Exxon gas station located at 4401 NW 31st Ave. The victim believed he was conducting a legitimate sale of his old cellphone to a subject he met through the website Facebook.com. During the sale, the suspect snatched the victim's cellphone from his hand, fleeing without paying for the phone. Through investigation the owner of the suspect Facebook user page was located and interviewed. Through the interview it was found that the page owner was not the suspect, but rather it was his friend who had utilized his page to setup the sale. The suspect was contacted and willingly turned himself in. The suspect was interviewed by Detectives, provided a full confession, and was turned over to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Grand Theft Auto Arrest

On 11/25/17, the suspect observed the victim's vehicle with its key in the ignition while it was parked in front of the victim's residence. The suspect along with another unidentified juvenile, entered the vehicle and fled westbound as the victim was walking back to his vehicle.

On 11/30/17, Detectives were on patrol when they observed the victim's stolen vehicle backed into a parking space at 3640 Oakland Preserve Way, Oakland Park. Detectives reviewed the high definition surveillance video of the parking lot where the vehicle was parked, and observed the suspect backing up the victim's vehicle into a parking spot, then exiting the driver's door. Furthermore, surveillance video shows the suspect attempting to destroy any possible latent prints by utilizing his t-shirt to wipe down the vehicle's door handles. Detectives were able to positively identify the suspect, via the surveillance video, based on multiple prior encounters.

On 11/30/17, Detectives observed the suspect at the 3600 Blk of NE 3rd Ave and attempted to stop him. The suspect ran through the back yards of multiple residences in an attempt to evade lawful arrest. A perimeter was established and multiple units conducted a search of the area, however, were unsuccessful.

On 12/01/17 Deputies attempted to make contact with the suspect, who once again fled. Deputies subsequently located and apprehended the suspect. The suspect was interviewed by Detectives and transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Misuse of 9-1-1 System Arrest

Between 11/07/17 and 11/28/17, the suspect unlawfully called number 9-1-1 a total of 15 times, utilizing her cellular number. Out of the total 15 emergency calls, 12 of those calls were made in the City of Oakland Park, and the other 3 calls were made for the City of Sunrise, Lauderdale Lakes and Lauderhill. Each time the suspect called, she made false reports that required immediate law enforcement response to the victim's residence.

On 11/28/17, the suspect called 9-1-1 and stated she heard people arguing and gun shots being fired at the victim's residence. She then abruptly ended the call with the emergency operator. The emergency operator and deputies attempted numerous times to re-establish contact with the suspect, without success. This caused several law enforcement personnel to be dispatched to the victim residence. Once contact was made, the victim stated no one called 9-1-1 and they did not need assistance. The residents further stated that BSO has been to their address several times within the last two weeks due to someone making false reports and giving their address.

Due to the safety implications of the above prank 9-1-1 calls, Detectives traced the number the suspect was calling from and located the suspect, taking her into custody. During an interview with Detectives, the suspect confirmed that she made the above emergency calls, stating she wanted to “scare the people” at the residence, because she believed they were related to her ex-boyfriend. The suspect was transported to the Main Jail.

Residential Burglaries Arrest

On 12/4/17 Deputies responded to a residence in reference to two juvenile males who were observed exiting a blue Lincoln and entering the front yard of a residence. Witness #1 observed one of the males knock on the front door of the residence, then try the front door’s handle, as the second black male pulled on the residence’s side gate. Witness #1 stated the dogs in the residence barked and the males ran to a blue Lincoln, which was driven by a third juvenile male. The suspects fled eastbound on NE 57th St in the vehicle.

A second burglary call came out in the area matching the suspects’ descriptions. The suspects were located, but fled on foot from deputies. A perimeter was established and the juveniles were apprehended as they jumped fences into the backyards of residences. A show-up was conducted with Witness #1 who positively identified the suspects.

Witness #2 observed the same suspects in his neighbor’s residence backyard. The suspects were observed within the fenced-in backyard opening the screen to the rear sliding glass door of the residence. The males then made their way to the front yard of the residence, where Witness #2 took a photo of the suspects departing the residence. Entry was not made into the residence.

Both suspects were interviewed by Detectives and one of the juvenile suspects requested an attorney and the other admitted to running from deputies, however denied anything further. The suspects were charged accordingly and transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Burglary Business Arrest

On 12/30/17, Deputies were dispatched to Christian Preparatory Academy in reference to an occupied business burglary that just occurred. The witness gave a very unique description to the 9-1-1 dispatcher, which was relayed to responding deputies. A perimeter was established and K9 was notified. Deputies arrived on scene and confirmed with the building occupants that the suspect used a glass breaking tool to shatter the front door glass, but was scared away when the occupants started screaming.

While deputies were on scene of the above burglary, a delayed alarm came in for another church, Greater Providence Baptist Church, located just four blocks east. Deputies responded to that location and confirmed it was another burglary (shattered glass). The suspect left a blood trail inside and outside of the business.

A suspect was located and detained in close proximity to both scenes. The witness from the initial burglary made a positive identification of the suspect as the same person who broke the glass door of the church. Furthermore, the suspect had fresh blood and multiple cuts on his hands. Search incident to arrest, multiple tools commonly used to commit burglaries were discovered inside of a black bag the suspect was carrying. The suspect was transported to the Oakland Park district office, interviewed by Detectives, and transported to the Main Jail.

Community Action Plans

District Staff meets each week to discuss crime trends, arrests and Juvenile Probationary Offenders to deploy deputies into the affected areas. The Crime Suppression Team is also deployed into the affected crime areas to combat emerging crime trends.

Crime mapping and reporting is performed twice each week. The first mapping and reporting depicts the crimes that occurred the previous week. The second mapping depicts the previous 3 weeks.

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and issued traffic citations. Utilizing this technology allows the district to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the district to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.





Homeless Outreach

District deputies have attended the Crisis Intervention course training. CIT certified deputies respond to persons suffering mental health crises. The Crisis Intervention Team deputies work with the mental health system and advocacy groups to ensure persons with mental health issues receive support. A team of CIT District deputies hits the streets weekly to locate those in need of assistance. They assist with services, transportation, food, clothing and entry into substance abuse programs. These deputies educate, encourage and help these persons get off the streets and into a shelter or abuse program.

Employee of the Month

October 2017 Sergeant Anthony Celletti	<p>Recognizing Sergeant Anthony Celletti for his attentiveness on the morning of October 19, 2017.</p> <p>At approximately 5:00am in the morning, a call was dispatched of a conveyance burglary in progress. Sergeant Celletti responded to the area, and during his patrol, observed a vehicle backing out of a residence with its lights off. The vehicle sped south on NE 7th Avenue, still with its lights off. Due to the proximity of the vehicle to the crime and the driver's suspicious manner, Sergeant Celletti attempted to catch up to the vehicle to conduct a stop. The vehicle turned onto NE 60th Street, and when Sergeant Celletti pulled onto the street, he observed the vehicle parked in front of a residence, and the driver fleeing. Sergeant Celletti approached the vehicle and was able to safely detain the passenger, Angela Smith, and determine that the vehicle had been involved in the burglaries, based on property located in plain view within the vehicle.</p> <p>During an inventory of the vehicle, a substantial quantity of stolen property and more than 50 stolen identification and credit cards were recovered. This property belonged not just to burglary victims within Oakland Park, but in numerous other cities throughout Florida. While the driver was not located in the subsequent perimeter search, Sergeant Celletti's quick actions led to the apprehension of one of the burglary suspects, as well as the recovery of a substantial quantity of stolen property.</p> <p>Based on his actions that led to the arrest and removal of a repeat offender from the streets of Oakland Park, and the peace of mind to more than 20 victims who will be able to recover their stolen property, Sergeant Celletti is the Oakland Park District Employee of the Month for October 2017.</p>
November 2017 Detective Eric Versteeg	<p>Recognizing Detective Eric Versteeg for his meticulous investigation into a rash of storage unit burglaries that occurred at the Public Storage facility between August and October 2017.</p> <p>During the above three month timeframe, a noted increase in storage unit burglaries occurred at the Public Storage facility located at 1650 W Oakland Park Blvd, where in excess of 20 incidents were reported under 14 different case numbers. Detective Versteeg was assigned most of these cases, and through his investigation, he identified as the possible suspect Christopher Caldwell, who rented a unit in the facility.</p> <p>Detective Versteeg tracked down the owner of a cellphone that was located inside one of the victim units, but did not belong to the unit owner. The phone owner advised that her phone had been lost recently while she was hanging out with two men, one of whom was the suspect, Christopher Caldwell. Detective Versteeg also spoke with Public Storage management, who advised they also suspected Caldwell may be involved. Within days of this conversation, Public Storage employees notified Detective Versteeg that they had recovered a bag of trash disposed by Caldwell from his unit. Upon responding, Detective Versteeg discovered in the bag numerous items belonging to several of the burglary victims. Detective Versteeg also found that Caldwell was on active GPS monitoring reference a previous arrest. He made contact with Caldwell's probation officer and reviewed Caldwell's movements during the timeframes of the burglaries, discovering that Caldwell was at the facility during each of the crimes. During one particular burglary, where a large quantity of silver was stolen, Detective Versteeg was able to track Caldwell's movements from the storage facility directly to a gold and silver metals dealer. He responded to the metals dealer and through receipts and a photographic lineup, was able to confirm that Caldwell had, indeed, sold a large quantity of silver, consistent with the items stolen from the</p>

	<p>victim's storage unit.</p> <p>With the above facts, Detective Versteeg applied for and obtained a search warrant for Caldwell's storage unit. Upon execution of the warrant, property belonging to almost every victim in the reported cases was recovered. During the search, Caldwell arrived on scene in his Cadillac CTS, which was also found to contain victims' property. A second search warrant was written and executed by Detective Kessler to recover the additional property.</p> <p>Ten of the 14 reported cases have been cleared, thousands of dollars in property has been recovered and returned to the rightful owners, and a career criminal has been arrested and removed from the streets of Oakland Park.</p> <p>For his investigative skills and commitment to the citizens of the City of Oakland park and Broward County, Detective Eric Versteeg is the Oakland Park District Employee of the Month for November 2017.</p>
<p>December 2017 Deputies Sean Andrews and Wayne Potvin</p>	<p>Recognizing and commending Deputies Sean Andrews and Wayne Potvin for their outstanding commitment to the residents of City of Oakland Park and Broward County on a daily basis.</p> <p>On the morning of November 20, 2017, Deputy Andrews observed a vehicle that was sitting stationery at a traffic signal. He observed the traffic signal cycle several times and the vehicle did not move. Through his experience, he knew this person was either experiencing a medical episode or suffering from some kind of impairment. He notified Dispatch of his location and the circumstance, and then approached the vehicle to find the driver unconscious, but breathing.</p> <p>Deputy Potvin arrived and turned off the ignition. The deputies established the driver had fallen into a slumber at the traffic light and was not in any medical distress, attempted to wake the driver, who came to a conscious state and spoke with the deputies, confirming that he was not in any medical distress. Deputy Potvin's keen observation skills relayed that the driver may be involved in illegal drug sales.</p> <p>The driver made a desperate attempt to flee from the deputies, but remember that he had left his narcotics in the vehicle, dove back inside to retrieve them. He retrieved a baggie containing cocaine, and then intentionally released the contents into the air, activating a smoke screen prior to his flight on foot. Both deputies pursued the suspect across intersections and business parking lots. Deputies Andrews and Potvin apprehended the suspect, and upon further investigation, learned that he was on Probation on 2 separate felony warrants. The suspect was detained and charged with resisting without violence, traffic violations and possession of drug paraphernalia with intent to distribute/sell.</p> <p>Based on their actions that led to the arrest and removal of a repeat offender from the streets of Oakland Park, Deputies Sean Andrews and Wayne Potvin are the Oakland Park District Employees for December 2017.</p>

2017 Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business, Robbery and Burglary Conveyance.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2016 saw a decrease in residential burglaries, but an upswing of vehicle burglaries within the City. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the district.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole in identifying juveniles that enter and/or complete probation as a way to reduce recidivism. Further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have an impact on juveniles who reoffend, only to victimize the citizens of Oakland Park.
- Carry on the district's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY – PARKS AND LEISURE DIVISION

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park and Leisure Divisions, the citizens, parents, children and businesses that interact with various recreation programs the city offers.

Deputies will interact with the youth and work on reinforcing a positive relationship with law enforcement. We will ascertain what their needs are in their community and provide crime prevention and safety information. Promote crime prevention plans and increase ways that youth can protect themselves, and their property as well as be involved members of the community.

- Deputies come in contact with hundreds of school-aged children each day. Deputies will instill a positive relationship with the various groups of youth. Some of the safety programs the deputies will discuss with the youth are: Increased awareness of law enforcement deputies, drug prevention, anti-crime efforts, bullying, stranger danger, bicycle safety, pool safety, internet safety, neighborhood watch, school watch, pedestrian safety and others.
- Build trust in the communities and with the youth.
- Role models, improve trust and the perception of law enforcement.
- Understand the youth's perception of the law enforcement officer.
- Use positive interactions to foster better communication and improve relationships.
- Summer break from school is an opportunity for the City's youth enjoy the time away from school and summer vacation with their families. Many youth enroll in a summer recreation program with the City's Recreation Department. Deputies will engage the children attending these summer programs and open a discussion on several topics.

- Deputies would also interact and build positive relationships with the youth by engaging them in the activities at the recreation centers and in some instances traveling with them on their field trips to an offsite venue.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the City who encounter construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently situations are created when the safety and flow of traffic are compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects. We will also participate in the planning, approval implementation and follow-up portions of large scaled community events and special events.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all MOTs (Maintenance of Traffic) and the Neighborhood Traffic Committee.
- The Oakland Park District will participate in the various committees and departments in pre-planning, coordination of resources, approval process, implementation, and after action follow-up in the Special Events Application process.
- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The District developed a program in the district that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens and visitors of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output: (JuMP) – Juvenile Monitoring Portal:
 - The School Resource Officers are tasked with this portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamentals to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
 - The Crime Suppression Team is assigned to monitor those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their past and present criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the juveniles and their parents to discuss the juvenile's curfews, conditional release and probation.

Partnerships with the Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are all fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.

- The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible those individuals – both juvenile and adults – who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith-based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.

Subject: 2017 – 3rd Quarterly Report

The third quarter of 2017 has seen several challenges for the Oakland Park District and the City of Oakland Park. At the forefront of these was the recent hurricane that struck South Florida and did substantial damage to the City. We may all be thankful we did not feel the full fury of this storm as many others did, but that did not diminish the work required to get the City back up and running. District deputies worked several thousand hours of extra duty to assure the safety of our residents. The Broward Sheriff's Office then worked with federal partners to assure this was funded properly through federal emergency agencies such as FEMA. Traffic control was decimated and the City used all its portable traffic control material to restore some order to intersections. The lessons of the four way stop were lost on some but remembered by most and we all limped through several trying days and weeks. Most importantly, we used this harrowing event as a means to learn how we can perform even better in the future, and these lessons are already being implemented for future storms and emergencies.

Crime is down in numerous categories with only robbery showing slight increase. Burglary residence is on pace to be a record year of reduction so we ask all our residents to stay vigilant so that we might enjoy this great accomplishment together. Robberies have been found to often involve the use of social media to facilitate the sale of property or a social meetup. Robbery suspects use this method to lure victims to vulnerable areas with expensive items victims are often looking to sell. Please remember that the Oakland Park District invites all residents to conduct their transactions for all items, with the exception of firearms, in our District parking lot. Any meeting arranged through social media should always be in a public place ideally with the presence of video surveillance. Your safety is more important than the sale of any item.

It is also important to note that the Broward Sheriff's Office is hiring qualified and dedicated people. A career in law enforcement can be very rewarding, and offers the opportunity to make a difference. In today's society, where the role to practice law enforcement is heavily discussed, we welcome young men and woman who can rise to the challenge and place their own mark on the long traditions of law enforcement. Crime Developments – 3rd Quarter

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify suspects, curb future crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes:

- CrimeMapping.com: designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI): a GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView/Desktop: new software technology that allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program, the cornerstone of which is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. Effective implementation of these tactics are due to constant training and evaluating our efforts. Patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe and get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implementation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.

The District developed a program – JuMP (Juvenile Monitoring Portal), previously known as STOP – which is divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output – that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens of and visitors to Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities.

1. School Resource Deputies are tasked with the portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges, and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamental to ensuring successful compliance.
2. The Crime Suppression Team monitors those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their overall criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release, probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the adults or juveniles and their parents to discuss the curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
3. The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible for those individuals – both juveniles and adults – who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.






City of Oakland Park - 3rd Quarter 2017 Comparison *Auto Theft*

City of Oakland Park - 3rd Quarter 2017 Comparison *Burglary Business*



City of Oakland Park - 3rd Quarter Comparison


Burglary Conveyance


City of Oakland Park - 3rd Quarter 2017 Comparison *Burglary Residence*


City of Oakland Park - 3rd Quarter 2017 Comparison *Robbery*


City of Oakland Park - 3rd Quarter 2017 Comparison *Grand Theft*

Burglary Residence Arrest

During the investigation of a residential burglary, CI detectives discovered that their juvenile suspect had been stopped and FI'd by deputies on 5/24/17 at 110 Lake Emerald Drive at approximately 0055 hours. Further investigation revealed that the subject was on probation out of Palm Beach County for multiple cases, and had a court ordered curfew, as confirmed by his probation officer. On 7/6/17, Detectives Kessler, Versteeg and Upadayya made contact with the juvenile subject at his residence, and transported him to the Oakland Park District Office for interviewing. During the interview, the juvenile subject admitted violating his probation, but when asked about other cases, he invoked his right to speak to an attorney. Detective Kessler then began speaking with the suspect who re-initiated the interview. Detective Kessler was able to obtain a confession to an occupied residential burglary involving a stolen vehicle. The suspect was charged accordingly and released to the custody of his guardian. Based on the juveniles extensive criminal history, he was charged by the State Attorney's Office as an adult.

Petit Theft Arrest

On 7/8/17 deputies responded to the Mobil Gas Station at 901 W Oakland Park Boulevard in reference to a theft. The victim stated that he placed his wallet on the counter, looked away for a moment and when he turned around, his wallet was missing.

Video surveillance shows the defendant standing behind the victim in line. The victim places his wallet on the counter and proceeds to place items down to purchase. The defendant grabs the victim's wallet and places it into his own pocket. The defendant pays for his items and leaves the store with the victim's wallet.

Alert Flyers were prepared and sent to all of BSO DLE and to BSO DOD. A press release was conducted on 8/7/17 where the defendant observed himself on television and called an attorney. The defendant turned himself in at the Oakland Park District Office on 8/9/17 and was issued a Notice to Appear.

Criminal Mischief Arrest

On 07/11/17 at approximately 1936 hours, deputies responded to the Collins Recreation Center located at 3900 NE 3rd Avenue in reference to a large fight amongst juveniles where one vehicle sustained extensive damage and a second vehicle was deemed a total loss.

Upon review of the cities surveillance footage, several known juveniles were positively identified as suspects involved in this case. In total, seven juveniles were taken into custody for Felony criminal mischief and all confessed to their roles in damaging the victim's vehicle.

Armed Occupied Burglary Residence

On 7/14/17 Deputy Murillo responded to 4761 N Andrews Av in reference to a battery. She made contact with three victims who stated that known suspects forced their way into the residence and began striking the victims with a firearm, glass table, television, and porcelain vases. The victims were transported to Broward General Hospital for treatment. Victim #1, a 69-year-old male, sustained a laceration to the top of his head. Victim #2, a 66-year-old female, sustained a fractured nose, black eyes and swelling and bruising. Victim #3, a younger male, sustained two black eyes, several lacerations to his head, and severe swelling and bruising to his face.

In December 2016, these same three individuals were victims of a battery at their residence with different suspects. The three suspects in the 7/14/17 incident were demanding that the victims drop the charges regarding the incident in December 2016. The victims refused

and the suspects stated they were coming down from Georgia to kill them. The victims provided names, dates of birth, cell phone numbers and pictures of the suspects. A cell site warrant was prepared and submitted, which revealed the suspects were back in Georgia. Arrest warrants were completed and entered into the system. Gwinnett Sheriff's Office was notified and all subjects were located in Georgia, taken into custody, and extradited back to Broward to face charges of armed burglary battery.

Burglary Business Arrest

On 7/16/17, a witness observed a black GMC Yukon on the swale near a construction site entrance to the rear of 491 E Commercial Blvd. The witness contacted the owner who informed him that no one was supposed to be there. A short time later, the witness saw the suspect throw several large metal poles over the fence and then squeeze through the opening in the gate. The suspect then put the poles inside the GMC Yukon which had a shattered rear window.

Deputy Klima observed the vehicle leaving the scene and conducted a traffic stop. It should be noted that the poles were in plain view. A show-up was conducted and the witness positively identified the suspect, who was detained and later provided a post-Miranda confession to being within the fenced area and removing the metal poles. He was charged with Burglary Business and transported to the BSO Jail.

Narcotics Arrest

Oakland Park CST along with BSO SID received information of two adult subjects selling narcotics in the area of Carter Woodson Park and the "310" food store. During the investigation, detectives developed information identifying two subjects who were involved in the sale of narcotics in the area. Over a period of two months and during undercover operations, detectives were able to purchase heroin from the two subjects, resulting in arrest warrants being issued: Trafficking in Heroin (5.5g) \$250k bond and Selling Heroin (3.5g) \$15k bond for Suspect #1; and Selling Heroin (2g) \$25k bond and VOP – no bond for Suspect #2.

On 7/20/17, while planning to serve the listed warrants, detectives received information that Suspect #1 was to deliver a large quantity of heroin. During surveillance both subjects were observed in the same area and were arrested, resulting in additional charges: Trafficking in Heroin (15g), Tampering with Evidence and Resisting Arrest w/o Violence for Suspect #1; and Possession of Cocaine w/Intent to Deliver (3g) and Possession of Marijuana (5g) for Suspect #2.

Strong Arm Robbery Arrest

On 7/25/17, the suspect approached the victim as the victim was walking through a parking lot of the business. The suspect threw the victim to the ground and demanded money. The victim advised he did not have any money. The suspect took the victim's cane and a one-dollar bill. The incident was captured on the surveillance camera belonging to a business in the area. The suspect was located and arrested without incident. The Robbery Unit responded to the Oakland Park District to interview and charge the suspect.

Grand Theft Auto Arrest

On 07/30/2017, Deputies located a stolen vehicle at 4137 N Dixie Hwy, which a witness advised had recently been occupied. Deputy Deangelo circulated the area and located a possible suspect on a construction site at 899 NE 37th Street. The suspect matched the

description of the stolen vehicle subject. A show-up was conducted with the witnesses who had observed the suspect hiding under the trailer; the witness confirmed that the suspect was the same individual who had been hiding under the trailer.

While searching for a witness of the stolen vehicle, Deputy Klima found a store clerk from the "Beer Shop" who stated a person had come in and tried to sell him two cases of Heineken brand beer and 3 empty kegs. It should be noted, these items were found in the stolen truck by responding deputies. A photo line-up was conducted with the employee who identified suspect as the person who attempted to sell the beer kegs.

Post-Miranda, the suspect confessed to being in the stolen truck, stealing the empty beer kegs from behind an Olive Garden in the City of Fort Lauderdale, attempting to sell them to the "Beer Shop, trespassing on the construction site, and resisting without violence by running from a uniformed deputy issuing him a lawful command.

Armed Burglary and Burglary Arrest

On 08/01/2017, two juvenile males were arrested by BSO Tamarac in reference to a burglary within their city. Post-Miranda, both subjects admitted to residential burglaries within the City of Oakland Park.

Oakland Park CI detectives conducted a ride around with the suspects, who identified the locations of two separate residential burglaries and the locations of the stolen items, one of which was an unreported stolen firearm. The juveniles were charged accordingly and later turned over to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Multiple Business Burglaries Arrest

From January to June 2017, Oakland Park, Ft. Lauderdale and Margate experienced a high rate of Business Burglaries with the same MO. The suspect would utilize a large rock to smash out the front glass window door of the business to gain entry, and then only remove the cash register. The suspect used an older model Kia Optima in the majority of the business burglaries. Detective Weymouth of Fort Lauderdale PD assisted Oakland Park detectives in locating a case involving a stolen recovered 2004 Kia Optima. The suspect in the stolen vehicle case was identified as the primary suspect in the business burglaries and was taken into custody.

On 8/2/17, Detective Sokol contacted the victim/owner of the Kia, and discovered that the suspect was known to her. Detective Sokol showed the victim four business burglary alert flyers from Oakland Park and one from Margate. The owner/victim positively identified the subject with 100% in all the alert flyers as the suspect. Further Deputy Gaitan 100% positively identified the suspect from two separate alert flyers from Oakland Park and Margate. In total five Oakland Park Business Burglaries and two from Margate were cleared by arrest. Ft. Lauderdale will have several cases cleared as well.

Fleeing and Eluding, Tampering with Evidence Arrest

On 8/3/17 Deputy Khafaga initiated a traffic stop on a 2009 Honda Accord after the driver disregarded a stop sign. While in contact with the driver, Deputy Khafaga smelled the odor of marijuana emanating from the interior of the vehicle. When asked for his license and registration, the driver stated he did not have them in his possession and then advised he had some marijuana in the car. He produced a white tray containing a small amount of marijuana, and in front of Deputy Khafaga, poured the contents onto the street where it was dispersed in a manner that it was unrecoverable for testing. At that time Deputy Khafaga asked the driver to

turn off the vehicle, who briefly complied, but when he was asked to step out of the vehicle, he turned the vehicle back on and quickly accelerated away from Deputy Khafaga in a manner showing clear reckless disregard for the safety of others. Moments later, Dispatch advised of a vehicle matching the one that fled from Deputy Khafaga driving recklessly through the yard of a residence. Deputies responded to the residence where they located a bag of marijuana weighing approximately 45 grams. Latents were obtained from the bag and submitted to the lab for processing. Through road patrol's investigation, the driver in this case was identified as the suspect.

With the new initiative in place to aggressively investigate and apprehend subjects fleeing from Law Enforcement, all body camera footage and case evidence was shared with Oakland Park detectives. Through the body camera footage, Detectives Encina and Sokol were able to confirm the suspect's identity. On 8/4/17, detectives responded to the suspect's last known address where they made contact with his father. The suspect's father stated he did not know his son's current whereabouts, but promised he would turn himself in by Monday. On Monday 8/7/17, the suspect and his attorney responded to the Oakland Park District Office where the suspect was taken into custody for Fleeing and Eluding and Tampering with Evidence. Several days later the vehicle the suspect utilized to flee in was located and seized after a seizure warrant was completed.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 8/8/17, after receiving latent fingerprint hits from vehicle burglaries on the west side of Oakland Park, including the Florida Department of Transportation property, Detectives Versteeg and Upadayya apprehended the juvenile suspect at his residence.

The juvenile suspect agreed to speak with Detectives and agreed to a ride around on the west side of the city. He admitted to committing vehicle burglaries from three separate locations, but denied involvement in any other burglaries in the City. He was charged with eight counts of Burglary Conveyance, Felony Criminal Mischief and two counts of Grand Theft of a Fire Extinguisher.

It should be noted that the suspect was recently placed on probation for the same offenses and had active Pick-Up Orders. He was transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center for booking.

Burglary Structure and Grand Theft Auto Arrest

On 8/17/17 the juvenile defendant unlawfully entered The German Bread Haus located at 311 E Commercial Boulevard by popping the window lock with a screwdriver. The defendant opened the rear window, unlawfully entered the business and removed a set of keys to a 2016 Dodge delivery van, which he then stole.

On 8/22/17, the defendant was apprehended in Polk County, along with five co-defendants during a police chase where the stolen van crashed and all occupants fled from the stolen van. All occupants were apprehended after a foot pursuit. Polk County charged the defendant with Grand Theft Auto, Loitering and Prowling and Resisting without Violence.

Post-Miranda, the defendant provided a full confession to Oakland Park detectives, stating his sole intention in burglarizing The German Bread Haus was to steal the 2016 Dodge delivery van. The defendant was charged with Burglary Structure. It should be noted the van is considered a total loss.

Occupied Burglary Residence and Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 8/30/17, deputies responded to 1931 NW 42nd Street, in reference to a burglary that just occurred. The victim reported seeing a black male juvenile wearing a blue shirt and blue jeans across the street from his residence in his neighbor's driveway. He confronted the subject and later realized that his phone was missing from his unlocked vehicle which was parked inside his garage. Upon checking his video surveillance, the subject was seen leaving his garage shortly before being confronted by the victim.

While on scene, the victim was able to track his iPhone to the Oakland Park Flea Market located at 3161 W Oakland Park Blvd. Deputies responded to the area and detained a black male subject matching the description of the suspect observed in surveillance. A black iPhone 7 was found in his possession with a picture of the victim's grandson on the phone home screen. The sim card was located inside the suspect's pocket and the phone was activated. Contact was made with the owner of the Flea Market phone store who stated that the subject was attempting to unlock the phone but left the store when seeing law enforcement. The victim responded to the scene identified the suspect with 100% certainty. The suspect was transported to the Oakland Park District Office where he provided a full detailed confession of the incident. He was charged with Occupied Residential Burglary and Burglary Conveyance.

Occupied Burglary Residence Arrest

On 09/15/17, the defendant stole the victim's generator from inside a secured fenced in area of the front porch, out of public sight. The generator was being used to provide power to the victim's three young children, two of whom suffer from Autism. The victim was without power due to Hurricane Irma. The defendant was captured on the victim's CCTV camera committing the crime and the victim posted the CCTV footage on social media in an attempt to identify the defendant and retrieve her generator.

An anonymous tipster advised BSO that the defendant was her former boyfriend. The tipster provided a full name and address for the defendant, but insisted on remaining anonymous due to fear of retaliation from the defendant. Oakland Park detectives were able to obtain 100% positive identification from an acquaintance of the defendant who had known him for more than four years. A sworn statement was completed.

Contact was eventually made with the defendant through his current girlfriend. Detective Upadaya convinced the defendant to meet at the District office to discuss the incident. The defendant arrived at the Oakland Park District Office in the same white Hyundai SUV he was seen driving when he committed the burglary. The defendant also had the victim's generator in his possession. The generator was recovered and the defendant was taken into custody.

Post-Miranda, the defendant gave a full confession and stated he needed the generator because his residence did not have power. The defendant was charged and transported to BSO main jail.

Burglary Business Arrest

On 9/23/17 Alpha shift Deputies responded to the Metro PCS at 2312 W Oakland Park Blvd regarding an audible alarm. The responding deputies made a tactical approach to the business, which allowed them to see the suspect loitering in front of the business which had a smashed front window. Upon seeing law enforcement, the suspect fled the scene on his bicycle. Deputy Arce was able to follow the suspect to the Dollar General across the street from the incident location and detain him, at which time the suspect provided a false name.

The building was searched for additional suspects, however no other suspects were located. The victim responded to the store and provided video footage of the incident which

showed the suspect who Deputy Arce had detained enter the store and steal two cell phones. The stolen phones were located on the suspect when he was detained.

The suspect was interviewed and confessed to entering the store and stealing the phones. The suspect had an active warrant for drug paraphernalia. He was charged with Burglary and providing a False Name to Law Enforcement.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 9/23/17, Alpha shift Deputies responded to a Burglary Conveyance at 559 NE 34th Court. The victim advised observing the suspect inside of his vehicle. When the victim confronted the suspect, the suspect entered his own car, which was parked next to the victim's car, and fled. However, the victim was able to video record the incident on his cell phone.

Deputy Murillo was able to confirm the license plate on the video after several attempts and located the suspect vehicle. Contact was made with the suspect and he was identified in a field show-up by the victim. The suspect was transported to the district office, but declined to speak with detectives. He was charged with burglary conveyance and was transported to the Main Jail.

Community Action Plans

District Staff meets each week to discuss crime trends, arrests and Juvenile Probationary Offenders to deploy deputies into the affected areas. The Crime Suppression Team is also deployed into the affected crime areas to combat emerging crime trends.

Crime mapping and reporting is performed twice each week. The first mapping and reporting depicts the crimes that occurred the previous week. The second mapping depicts the previous 3 weeks.

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and issued traffic citations. Utilizing this technology allows the district to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the district to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.

The District also addressed several traffic related initiatives during this quarter.

- Weekly analysis of traffic crash hot spots
- Crash Reduction
 - 1700 to 3100 W Oakland Park Blvd
 - N Andrews Av to 1300 E Commercial Blvd
- Deployed Message Boards with educational messages
- FDOT Road Safety Audit
- City of Oakland Park Traffic Safety Committee meeting
- Daily traffic enforcement in the school zones
- Commercial Vehicle Traffic Enforcement

The City of Oakland Park has two major roadways that experience heavy congestion. The Oakland Park corridor is currently under construction which magnifies the situation and increases the rear-end type crash. This has increased the number of commercial vehicles utilizing these roadways.

The Oakland Park Traffic unit has deployed information signs to provide traffic warnings to commuters. Increased traffic enforcement has been conducted at key intersections in an attempt to educate the public and reduce the crashes in these areas.

During this quarter, a pattern of traffic crashes developed on two major roadways.





Employee of the Month

July 2017 Deputy C. Howard	<p>Recognizing Deputy Charles Howard for his diligence, commitment and compassion.</p> <p>A family recently purchased a used car and shortly thereafter it needed major repairs. The owner brought the vehicle to Kay's Tires/Marathon Gas Station, in the City of Oakland Park, to have it evaluated and potentially have the repair work completed. The manager failed to complete a diagnostic report, submit it to the warranty company and repair the vehicle. The family was in dire need of the car, due to the mother confined to the NICU with a newborn premature baby, as well as three older children. The car was left at the gas station for three months, unrepaired, when the family decided to take the vehicle to another repair shop. The gas station manager, however, refused to release the vehicle, demanding an exorbitant storage fee.</p> <p>Deputy Howard was assigned to intervene and provide assistance in resolving the dispute. He immediately escorted the mother to the gas station where the car was being held. He was able to get the mechanic to release the car to the family without them having to pay the storage fee. In addition, Deputy Howard learned the mechanic was not licensed, nor was the gas station zoned for any type of repair work. He made notifications to the appropriate City entities to conduct follow-up regarding the violations.</p> <p>Deputy Howard received a thank you letter from the Children's Diagnostic & Treatment Center outlining his actions, as the family was very grateful for his dedication, commitment and compassion. Through his involvement in a civil matter, Deputy Howard was able to assist a family with retrieving their much-needed vehicle that was being held by a non-licensed gas station. For these reasons, Deputy Howard is the Oakland Park District Employee of the Month for July 2017.</p>
August 2017 Detective R. Sokol	<p>Recognizing Detective Robert Sokol for his thorough investigation and interagency cooperation, which led to the identification and arrest of a habitual business burglar.</p> <p>During the first six months of 2017, numerous jurisdictions in Broward County, including the City of Oakland Park, experienced a rash of business burglaries, all with a similar MO. The subject smashed out the front glass windows in order to gain entry, and the theft of exposed cash registers. Detective Sokol was assigned several of these Oakland Park cases and through his investigations was able to establish that the same subject was involved in each case. With surveillance video obtained in five of these burglaries, he composed a media release in an effort to obtain leads on the subject's identity. He reached out to surrounding jurisdictions to determine which, if any, other cities were experiencing similar crimes and found that the same subject who was hitting Oakland Park was also victimizing the Fort Lauderdale, Margate, Pompano Beach and Tamarac.</p> <p>Knowing the value of shared intelligence, Detective Sokol set up a meeting with the detectives from all the victimized cities and during this meeting, based on shared intelligence, the two vehicles utilized by the subject to drive to his target locations were identified. One of these vehicles had been reported stolen and listed in the auto theft report was a possible subject, Andre Burke. Detective Sokol conducted a background check on Burke, which revealed a substantial number of arrests and prison sentences for burglary.</p> <p>With the possible subject identified, Detective Sokol took the initiative to consolidate all the alert flyers from each City's cases and met with the Auto Theft victim, who advised that Andre Burke is a longtime family friend. Due to the victim's intimate knowledge of Burke, Detective Sokol was able to clear five Oakland Park business</p>

	<p>burglaries, and his ability to work in cooperation with other Cities and agencies led to the identification and charging of Burke for approximately 12 business burglaries to date throughout the County.</p> <p>Based on his commitment and investigative skills that led to the arrest of a prolific business burglary suspect, Detective Robert Sokol is the Oakland Park District Employee of the Month for August 2017.</p>
<p>September 2017 Detective E. Blevins, Detective E. Earnest, and Detective B. Lorenzo</p>	<p>Commending CST Detectives Eric Blevins, Edward Earnest and Bryan Lorenzo for their investigative skills and dedication to the City of Oakland Park.</p> <p>In recent months, the Oakland Park District has experienced a rash of Auto Thefts. On September 19, 2017, deputies were investigating one such theft in which the victim's cellphone was "pinging" in the area of Carter Woodson Park. This location has been the subject of numerous investigations by the Oakland Park CST Unit, and they are very familiar with the subjects who frequent that area.</p> <p>Upon securing the area, detectives observed a known subject within the park acting suspiciously. Detectives knew this subject had active warrants for absconding and was in violation of conditional release from previous crimes. The subject attempted to elude detectives, but was quickly detained, and the victim's car keys, cellphone and other property were recovered. CST detectives searched the District's "hot spots" in an attempt to locate the victim's stolen vehicle. Later that afternoon, the vehicle was located in The Oaks apartment complex, south of Oakland Park Boulevard, several blocks from the arrest location, and was returned to its owner.</p> <p>Again on September 19, 2017, Oakland Park CST detectives assisted road patrol with a stolen vehicle that was being followed by a relative of the original victim. The vehicle was last observed entering The Lakes apartment complex. While road patrol deputies established a perimeter around the area, CST and CI detective entered the complex in unmarked vehicles. CST detective located and detained a suspicious person approximately one building away from the stolen vehicle. During a search of the subject's person, the stolen vehicle key was recovered. The subject also had several outstanding warrants. Again, the vehicle was returned to its owner.</p> <p>Also on September 19, 2017, CI detectives informed the CST Unit of a probable cause for the arrest of a known subject for Grand Theft Auto. The subject fled from detectives earlier in the day. CST detectives returned to the area the subject is known to frequent in an attempt to locate him. Upon seeing detectives, the subject fled. A foot chase ensued and the subject was quickly apprehended and taken into custody. He was turned over to the CI detectives and charged accordingly.</p> <p>The CST detectives' knowledge of the common players, the territories they are known to frequent, and their exceptional work ethics led to the arrest of several Auto Theft suspects. For these reasons, Detectives Eric Blevins, Edward Earnest and Bryan Lorenzo are the Oakland Park District Employees for September 2017.</p>

2017 Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business, Robbery and Burglary Conveyance.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2016 saw a decrease in residential burglaries, but an upswing of vehicle burglaries within the City. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the district.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole in identifying juveniles that enter and/or complete probation as a way to reduce recidivism. Further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have an impact on juveniles who reoffend, only to victimize the citizens of Oakland Park.
- Carry on the district's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY – PARKS AND LEISURE DIVISION

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park and Leisure Divisions, the citizens, parents, children and businesses that interact with various recreation programs the city offers.

Deputies will interact with the youth and work on reinforcing a positive relationship with law enforcement. We will ascertain what their needs are in their community and provide crime prevention and safety information. Promote crime prevention plans and increase ways that youth can protect themselves, and their property as well as be involved members of the community.

- Deputies come in contact with hundreds of school-aged children each day. Deputies will instill a positive relationship with the various groups of youth. Some of the safety programs the deputies will discuss with the youth are: Increased awareness of law enforcement deputies, drug prevention, anti-crime efforts, bullying, stranger danger, bicycle safety, pool safety, internet safety, neighborhood watch, school watch, pedestrian safety and others.
- Build trust in the communities and with the youth.
- Role models, improve trust and the perception of law enforcement.
- Understand the youth's perception of the law enforcement officer.
- Use positive interactions to foster better communication and improve relationships.
- Summer break from school is an opportunity for the City's youth enjoy the time away from school and summer vacation with their families. Many youth enroll in a summer recreation program with the City's Recreation Department. Deputies will engage the children attending these summer programs and open a discussion on several topics.
- Deputies would also interact and build positive relationships with the youth by engaging them in the activities at the recreation centers and in some instances traveling with them on their field trips to an offsite venue.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the City who encounter construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently situations are created when the safety and flow of traffic are compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects. We will also participate in the planning, approval implementation and follow-up portions of large scaled community events and special events.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all MOTs (Maintenance of Traffic) and the Neighborhood Traffic Committee.
- The Oakland Park District will participate in the various committees and departments in pre-planning, coordination of resources, approval process, implementation, and after action follow-up in the Special Events Application process.
- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The District developed a program in the district that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens and visitors of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output: (JuMP) – Juvenile Monitoring Portal:
 - The School Resource Officers are tasked with this portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamentals to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
 - The Crime Suppression Team is assigned to monitor those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their past and present criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the juveniles and their parents to discuss the juvenile's curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with the Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are all fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
 - The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible those individuals – both juvenile and adults – who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.
 - Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith-based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.

Subject: 2nd Quarter Report - 2017

The Oakland Park District's focus on the safety and security of its residents, business owners, and visitors remains in place with outstanding results, in the continued suppression of residential burglaries and robberies within the City. Burglary residence, burglary conveyance, grand theft, and petit theft are all down with only marginal increases in robbery. Auto theft has increased, driven in part by juvenile crime and crimes of opportunity. Overall, 2017 is on course for crime reduction with some hope of lowest recorded occurrences in burglary residence. This is good news for the City of Oakland Park, as it has long been believed that burglaries to one's home represent one of the most impactful crimes an individual or family can experience. The district has maintained its extensive analytical practices and works daily to assure that the resources are deployed in an efficient and effective manner. The attached report represents these facts in detail, including a historical Uniform Crime Report chart to show just how well our City has done over the past sixteen years.

Crime suppression is a core mission of the District, but only part of what we do. Community outreach as well as youth outreach is an integral part of our overall strategy. The crimes of tomorrow can be mitigated by the outreach we do today. Our JuMP program continues to reach out to our troubled youth, coordinating with various groups including counselors and the judicial branch. Few people know that the Oakland Park District actually houses one of the best juvenile diversion programs in the state, assuring that our Oakland Park kids have a local location to receive services to assist them in succeeding and overcoming challenges. Our deputies also continue a program started last year where deputies become regular attendees at the City's summer programs. In the past we gave a presentation and interacted with the kids for a day. Today our deputies are daily attendees, building relationships and sharing the experience of summer camp with our kids. The Oakland Park Explorer program is growing and showing real success with the first Oakland Park Explorer, Amy Tubbergen, joining our ranks as a certified deputy sheriff.

The District currently has a large number of vacancies. The BSO is working hard to fill these positions with qualified candidates. This is an excellent time to apply for a job with the BSO, and the District is always looking for motivated individuals to serve the community locally. Our success is only due to all of us working together to make our City a better place to live, work and play. It takes our businesses, police, elected officials, city employees, and most importantly, our citizens, to make a difference. We appreciate your support and together we are making things better each day.

Crime Developments – 2nd Quarter

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify suspects, curb future crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes:

- CrimeMapping.com: designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI): a GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView/Desktop: new software technology that allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program, the cornerstone of which is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. Effective implementation of these tactics are due to constant training and evaluating our efforts. Patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe and get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implementation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.

The District developed a program – JuMP (Juvenile Monitoring Portal), previously known as STOP – which is divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output – that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens of and visitors to Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities.

1. School Resource Deputies are tasked with the portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges, and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamental to ensuring successful compliance.
2. The Crime Suppression Team monitors those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their overall criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release, probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the adults or juveniles and their parents to discuss the curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
3. The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible for those individuals – both juveniles and adults – who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.







Burglary Business




City of Oakland Park - 2nd Quarter Comparison *Burglary Conveyance*


City of Oakland Park - 2nd Quarter 2017 Comparison *Burglary Residence*


City of Oakland Park - 2nd Quarter 2017 Comparison *Robbery*


City of Oakland Park - 2nd Quarter 2017 Comparison *Grand Theft*

Robbery by Sudden Snatching Arrest

On 4/5/17, as the victim was riding his bicycle eastbound on Oakland Park Blvd, the suspect rode his own bicycle up behind the victim and removed a wallet from the victim's rear pocket. The suspect fled and the victim gave chase. The victim caught the suspect in the Walgreen's parking lot and demanded the return of his wallet. The suspect dumped his bike and fled on foot upon seeing Oakland Park and Wilton Manors units. The suspect was apprehended shortly thereafter.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 4/14/17, three juvenile suspects were observed breaking into the victim's vehicle in the Isles of Oakland Park community. Two of the subjects were confronted by a witness and held until deputies arrived. The third suspect fled on foot. A search of the neighborhood identified a total of 20 vehicle burglaries. Juvenile suspect #1 was in possession of a Glock handgun that he stole from one of the vehicles.

Post Miranda, juvenile suspect #2 gave a full, detailed confession. Juvenile suspects #1 and #2 went on a ride along with deputies, identifying other crimes in several surrounding Oakland Park communities. Both were charged and transported to JAC. Juvenile suspect #3 was subsequently identified via video surveillance and taken into custody.

Based on intelligence obtained during the interview with juvenile suspect #2, a search warrant was obtained and executed on juvenile suspect #2's residence, where another stolen handgun was recovered.

In total, over 30 conveyance burglaries, conducted in four separate Oakland Park communities were cleared based on the detailed confessions of the above suspects.

Armed Robbery Arrest

On 5/01/17, two suspects beat and robbed the victim of \$60 in cash, after one suspect displayed a firearm. When the victim fled on foot, the suspects attempted to run him over. Units responded to Sunshine Mobile Park, located the suspect vehicle and conducted a felony stop. Deputies observed a hard plastic gun case on the front floorboard. The suspects were detained without incident and the victim positively identified them with one hundred percent certainty. Detectives sealed the vehicle and towed it pending a search warrant. Both subjects were charged accordingly and transported to the BSO main jail.

Grand Theft Auto Arrest

On 5/2/17, deputies responded to an auto theft in progress. The victim left his vehicle running while he stepped into the Lowe's Home Improvement Store, whereupon three juvenile suspects jumped into the vehicle and began to drive it away. The juveniles became scared and jumped from the moving vehicle, at which point it plowed into a parked vehicle, causing extensive damage. The juveniles fled the scene, but were apprehended a short time later and positively identified. Post-Miranda, they all admitted to their roles in the auto theft. All juveniles were charged with grand theft auto and transported to JAC.

Burglary Residence w/Battery Arrest

On 5/3/2017, the suspect entered the victim's residence through an unlocked front door. The victim observed the suspect rummaging in his room and confronted him. The victim

attempted to restrain the suspect while contacting law enforcement. A physical altercation ensued, during which time the suspect suffered a small laceration to his head. The suspect was able to flee from the victim, exiting from the rear of the residence.

Deputies Klima and Howard apprehended the suspect shortly thereafter. A show-up was conducted with the victim, who positively identified the suspect. Post-Miranda, the suspect admitted to being inside the residence but denied any wrongdoing, stating that he went inside the residence to inform the occupant that he had found a key on the window sill after knocking several times resulted in no answer. The suspect was transported to Florida Medical Center for treatment. He was charged with Burglary Battery and later transported to the Main Jail.

Stolen Vehicle Arrest

On 5/11/17, Deputy Villafane was at 1900 W Oakland Park Blvd on a call for service and observed the suspect sleeping in a car. Deputy Villafane conducted a records check on the car and discovered it was reported stolen from Delray Beach. The suspect was detained, the car verified as stolen and the suspect arrested. Pictures of the suspect were taken and emailed to Delray Beach PD. The suspect refused to answer any questions regarding the car.

Burglary Residence Arrest

On 05/15/17, deputies were dispatched to 4092 NW 8th Ter. In reference to an audible alarm. On arrival, Deputy Y. Garcia conducted an exterior check of the residence and observed the rear master bedroom's window ajar. Deputy Garcia then observed the suspect – known to him from previous incidents – in the backyard of the neighboring residence, peeking over the fence. When Deputy Garcia attempted to make contact, the suspect fled southbound on foot – jumping fences. Deputy Garcia gave chase and apprehended the suspect four houses south of the incident location. Found on the suspect's person were a window punch and three Chase credit/debit cards bearing the victim's name.

Post-Miranda, the suspect denied burglarizing the residence at 4092 NW 8th Ter, and stated he had no idea where the credit cards came from. The suspect was charged with burglary and transported to the Main Jail. A print comparison was submitted to the Crime Lab to determine if the suspect had been inside the residence.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 05/22/17, deputies responded to a Burglary Conveyance at 3469 NW 44th Street and immediately set up a perimeter. Two suspects, 1 juvenile and 1 adult, were detained inside of the perimeter. A show up was conducted with the victim who positively identified the suspects as the two subjects who burglarized her vehicle. They were arrested and transported back at the district office.

Post-Miranda, the adult suspect invoked his Miranda Rights. The juvenile suspect admitted to acting as a lookout while the adult suspect entered the victim's vehicle, looking for anything valuable. He further stated they fled the area when the victim activated the factory alarm on the vehicle. Nothing was taken from the vehicle. There were no other burglaries located while Deputies were on scene.

Both suspects were charged with Burglary Conveyance. The adult suspect was transported to the Main Jail, the juvenile to JAC.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 06/07/17, Oakland Park Detectives took a juvenile subject into custody while he was at a hearing at the Broward County Courthouse on an unrelated court hearing. On 3/8/17, the Oakland Park Criminal Investigations Unit received a crime lab analysis report for two separate burglaries that occurred in the Isles of Oakland Park on 01/30/17. The report identified the juvenile suspect, who had additional open charges in Broward County.

Post-Miranda, the juvenile suspect admitted to his involvement in the burglaries. He was charged with 4 counts of Burglary Conveyance and 1 count of Petit Theft. At least 3 cases were cleared as a result of this arrest.

Multiple Robberies/Burglaries Arrest

On 6/20/17, Detectives Blevins, Earnest and Celis observed a maroon Toyota parked at 310 NE 38th St that matched a BOLO disseminated by BSO Dispatch in reference to an attempted Robbery that occurred at Target, 3200 N. Federal Hwy, Fort Lauderdale.

They conducted a traffic stop at the Oasis Apartment Complex, 3870 N. Andrews Ave, where one individual was detained. Fort Lauderdale detectives responded, and with the assistance of a cooperating defendant, two black male juveniles (brothers who had moved to Oakland Park from Washington, DC ten days prior) were located by Oakland Park CST detectives and Fort Lauderdale detectives in the 3800 blk. of NE 3rd Ave.

The two juveniles were subsequently charged with one count of Attempted Robbery by Sudden Snatching and Robbery (that occurred the evening of 6/19 in Fort Lauderdale). The juveniles admitted to six conveyance burglaries and several robberies involving taxis, along with the aforementioned crimes. The investigation is ongoing.

Community Action Plans

District Staff meets each week to discuss crime trends, arrests and Juvenile Probationary Offenders to deploy deputies into the affected areas. The Crime Suppression Team is also deployed into the affected crime areas to combat emerging crime trends.

Crime mapping and reporting is performed twice each week. The first mapping and reporting depicts the crimes that occurred the previous week. The second mapping depicts the previous 3 weeks.

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and issued traffic citations. Utilizing this technology allows the district to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the district to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.

The District also addressed several traffic related initiatives during this quarter.

The City of Oakland Park has two major roadways that experience heavy congestion. The Oakland Park corridor is currently under construction which magnifies the situation and increases the rear-end type crash. Additionally, a major beach re-habilitation project is underway. This has increased the number of commercial vehicles utilizing these roadways.


The Oakland Park Traffic unit has deployed information signs to provide traffic warnings to commuters. Increased traffic enforcement has been conducted at key intersections in an attempt to educate the public and reduce the crashes in these areas. Additionally, the City of Oakland Park is currently participating in a Pedestrian / Bicycle Safety Grant. The first phase of this grant is directed towards education which would explain the increased number of warnings citations being issued.

During this quarter, a pattern of traffic crashes developed on two major roadways.



What is the most active Crime. **Auto Theft Burglary Conveyance**

Crime Trends Response

During this reporting period the most active crimes were auto theft and burglary conveyance. Two auto thefts occurred, one in 1205 Zone with an overnight time delay and the second in 1211 Zone where the vehicle was left running and unattended. A burglary conveyance occurred in 1204 Zone Saturday night into Sunday morning.

As a result of the burglaries that occurred overnight Tuesday into Wednesday morning in Cambridge (1211 Zone) the westside deputies remained in and around the complex when not responding to calls for service. The 1201, 1202, and 1203 Zone deputies conducted business checks in 1202 Zone as a result of the recent smash and grab business burglaries which occurred the week prior.

Employee of the Month

April 2017 Detective B. Gillespie & Detective S. Cottam	<p>Recognizing Detectives Brian Gillespie and Samantha Cottam for their investigative tenacity and thoroughness during a burglary investigation.</p> <p>On April 14th, 2017, Detective Gillespie was called out to the Isles of Oakland Park community after two juvenile subjects were taken into custody, caught in the process of burglarizing vehicles. A possible stolen firearm was located in one of the juvenile's pockets. On arrival, Detective Gillespie diligently worked to manage the scene, and assisted Road Patrol with a canvas of the entire community, which led to the discovery of a total of 20 burglarized vehicles. Based on the sheer quantity of victims, Detective Cottam also responded to assist in the investigation. Detective Gillespie located and reviewed video surveillance which captured the two in-custody subjects, along with a third suspect who he was able to identify based on his intimate knowledge of repeat offenders in the city. Detective Gillespie also located the owner of the stolen gun, who advised the loaded firearm had been taken from the interior of his vehicle.</p> <p>While Detective Gillespie managed the crime scene, Detective Cottam interviewed both juveniles. Detective Cottam's meticulous interview skills led not only to confessions from both subjects to the burglaries at the Isles, but also to the commission of recent burglaries within several other Oakland Park communities. Detectives Cottam and Gillespie conducted a ride around with one of the juveniles, who provided detailed information on burglaries he committed in the communities of Summer Lake, Lake Pointe, and Lake Emerald. He also confessed to possessing a stolen gun in his residence, which he claimed he stole during a conveyance burglary in Bridgewater Place. A search warrant was obtained and executed for the subject's residence, leading to the recovery of the stolen firearm described by the suspect.</p> <p>Detectives Cottam and Gillespie have cleared approximately 25 conveyance burglaries (three of which were armed), recovered two stolen firearms, and identified and removed from the streets three chronic, armed burglars. Their persistence has given closure to more than two dozen residents and led to a notable reduction in burglaries within the communities of West Oakland Park.</p> <p>For their commitment to the citizens of Oakland Park and Broward County, Detectives Brian Gillespie and Samantha Cottam are the Oakland Park Employees of the Month for April 2017.</p>
May 2017 Deputy S. Andrews	<p>Recognizing Deputy Sean Andrews for his attention to details and commitment to the citizens of the City of Oakland Park.</p> <p>On May 21, 2017, deputies were dispatched to a burglary conveyance that just occurred. The victim stated to dispatch that two juveniles broke into her vehicle and fled the area on foot. A perimeter was set up. Deputy Andrews located two subjects fitting the suspects' descriptions. The suspects were detained, a show-up conducted and the victim positively identified the two juveniles as the subjects who burglarized her vehicle. The suspects were taken into custody and transported to the District. Detective Taji Parrish responded, conducted his investigation and both suspects confessed to the burglary.</p> <p>Deputy Andrews' attention to details led him to locate the two subjects who matched the descriptions, leading to their arrest. Deputy Sean Andrews is the Oakland Park Employee of the Month for May 2017.</p>

<p>June 2017 Deputy M. Ciccone</p>	<p>Commending Deputy Matthew Ciccone for his investigative skills and commitment to the Citizens of the City of Oakland Park and Broward County.</p> <p>On June 15th, 2017, Deputy Ciccone received a call about a retail theft, in which the suspect committed a battery on the loss prevention officer. The suspect was last seen fleeing the area in a vehicle. The caller was able to provide the license plate for the vehicle in which the suspect fled. Upon Deputy Ciccone's arrival, the suspect and vehicle were no longer in the area. Deputy Ciccone, knowing that investigative leads existed in this case, used his training to clear the case by arrest instead of documenting and passing the responsibility to the investigative unit.</p> <p>At times, dedicated routine work is not recognized, a well-written report with supporting documentation would have been sufficient to meet Deputy Ciccone's obligation. However, it was not enough to meet his personal obligation to excellence with this investigation. He further obtained a sworn recorded statement, a transcription of that statement and a double-blind photo array to ensure the case would be filled with the State Attorney's Office. Additionally, he discovered that the suspect had made numerous pawn shop transactions of merchandise similar to the items he stole in this case. Deputy Ciccone ensured the Oakland Park Criminal Investigations Unit was notified of these transactions.</p> <p>When Deputy Ciccone completed his necessary paperwork, he could have easily filed the charges as a not in custody probable cause affidavit, which would have exceeded his obligations as a patrol deputy. Instead, he utilized available resources and determined that subsequent to this event, the suspect was arrested for a similar theft. Deputy Ciccone then had the probable cause affidavit delivered to the Main Jail, where the suspect was charged with these crimes and remained in custody.</p> <p>While this call is routine across the nation, Deputy Ciccone took a vested interest in the prosperity and safety of the community he serves. It is for these reasons that Deputy Ciccone is the Oakland Park District Employee for the Month of June 2017.</p>
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2017 Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business, Robbery and Burglary Conveyance.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2016 saw a decrease in residential burglaries, but an upswing of vehicle burglaries within the City. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the district.

- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole in identifying juveniles that enter and/or complete probation as a way to reduce recidivism. Further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have an impact on juveniles who reoffend, only to victimize the citizens of Oakland Park.
- Carry on the district's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY – PARKS AND LEISURE DIVISION

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park and Leisure Divisions, the citizens, parents, children and businesses that interact with various recreation programs the city offers.

Deputies will interact with the youth and work on reinforcing a positive relationship with law enforcement. We will ascertain what their needs are in their community and provide crime prevention and safety information. Promote crime prevention plans and increase ways that youth can protect themselves, and their property as well as be involved members of the community.

- Deputies come in contact with hundreds of school-aged children each day. Deputies will instill a positive relationship with the various groups of youth. Some of the safety programs the deputies will discuss with the youth are: Increased awareness of law enforcement deputies, drug prevention, anti-crime efforts, bullying, stranger danger, bicycle safety, pool safety, internet safety, neighborhood watch, school watch, pedestrian safety and others.
- Build trust in the communities and with the youth.
- Role models, improve trust and the perception of law enforcement.
- Understand the youth's perception of the law enforcement officer.
- Use positive interactions to foster better communication and improve relationships.
- Summer break from school is an opportunity for the City's youth enjoy the time away from school and summer vacation with their families. Many youth enroll in a summer recreation program with the City's Recreation Department. Deputies will engage the children attending these summer programs and open a discussion on several topics.
- Deputies would also interact and build positive relationships with the youth by engaging them in the activities at the recreation centers and in some instances traveling with them on their field trips to an offsite venue.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the City who encounter construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently situations are created when the safety and flow of traffic are compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects. We will also participate in the planning, approval implementation and follow-up portions of large scaled community events and special events.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all MOTs (Maintenance of Traffic) and the Neighborhood Traffic Committee.
- The Oakland Park District will participate in the various committees and departments in pre-planning, coordination of resources, approval process, implementation and after action follow-up in the Special Events Application process.
- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The District developed a program in the district that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens and visitors of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output: (JuMP) – Juvenile Monitoring Portal:
 - The School Resource Officers are tasked with this portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamentals to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
 - The Crime Suppression Team is assigned to monitor those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their past and present criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the juveniles and their parents to discuss the juvenile's curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with the Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are all fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
 - The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible those individuals – both juvenile and adults – who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.
 - Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith-based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.

During the first quarter of 2017, the District remained focused on the Goals and Objectives set forth for the year. The District continues to focus on the reduction of top tier crime. When looking at 1st quarter crime statistics for 2016 to 2017, our greatest successes to date can be seen through the 46% reduction in Burglary Residence, 26% reduction in Auto Theft and 8% reduction in Burglary Businesses. A review of the "notable arrests" included in this report, demonstrates a few reasons why we have been able to accomplish such achievements thus far: community involvement. Much of our success has come because of our steadfast dedication to not only "serve and protect" the Oakland Park community, but also how important it is to "be a part of the community." As part of our objectives to meet the annual goals, the District's continued involvement and presence at City recreational events, Home Owner's Association meetings and youth mentoring help build the bonds and encourage a true partnership between law enforcement and the members of the community. With all community members, to include City Staff, residents and business owners, actively keeping an eye out on crime, and we are able to make a greater impact on crime.

Moving into the 2nd quarter of 2017, our efforts dedicated to addressing Burglary Conveyance will be unfaltering. This is a trend that has become prominent not just in Oakland Park, but many cities in the area. Juveniles appeared to drive this trend with crime sprees, occurring in a single night in many neighborhoods and apartment complexes. Our continued message to the community, business owners and citizens, of calling us when they see something suspicious or crimes in progress has resulted in the apprehension of numerous suspects and the recovery and return of stolen property to its rightful owner. The District will carry on with its multi-disciplinary approach to deterring this type criminal behavior.

The District has also made strides addressing Theft, which has continued to drive up part one crime numbers. A majority of these thefts are from retail locations. As the City prospers and large chain and box stores occupy store fronts within the City, we have now made it a priority to build stronger relationships with the Loss Prevention Units and Management of these stores. Our Neighborhood Response Team and Criminal Investigations Unit have recently provided several of these locations with crime preventions measures, that if employed would likely help drive the number of incidents down.

As always, the District appreciates and encourages the ongoing support and communication with the public. As Captain Hubrig has stated before, "No suspicious incident is too minor to not warrant a call to BSO."

Crime Developments – 1st Quarter

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify suspects, curb future crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes:

- CrimeMapping.com: designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI): a GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView/Desktop: new software technology that allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program, the cornerstone of which is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. Effective implementation of these tactics are due to constant training and evaluating our efforts. Patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe and get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implementation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.

The District developed a program – JuMP (Juvenile Monitoring Portal), previously known as STOP – which is divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output – that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens of and visitors to Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities.

1. School Resource Deputies are tasked with the portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges, and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamental to ensuring successful compliance.
2. The Crime Suppression Team monitors those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their overall criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release, probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the adults or juveniles and their parents to discuss the curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
3. The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible for those individuals – both juveniles and adults – who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.






City of Oakland Park - 1st Quarter 2017 Comparison *Auto Theft*



City of Oakland Park - 1st Quarter Comparison


Burglary Conveyance


City of Oakland Park - 1st Quarter 2017 Comparison *Burglary Residence*


City of Oakland Park - 1st Quarter 2017 Comparison *Robbery*

City of Oakland Park - 1st Quarter 2017 Comparison *Grand Theft*



Grand Theft/Fraud Arrest

On 1/12/17, deputies were dispatched to A Discount Liquor Store located on N Andrews Av in reference to a fraud in progress. Deputies made contact with the two subjects, who each attempted to cash fraudulent/forged checks from the business First Florida Landcare, Inc. Both suspects were taken into custody, each charged with Uttering Forged Instrument and Grand Theft.

When Detective Wagener responded to the scene, he discovered that a prior fraud case involving one of the suspects had been reported on 1/10/17, wherein suspect cashed two other fraudulent checks. As a result, that suspect was charged with two additional counts of Uttering Forged Instrument and two additional counts of Grand Theft. Suspects refused to provide statements without attorneys present, so were transported to Broward County Jail.

Multiple Burglary Residence Arrest

When victim returned to her residence on 1/25/17, she heard commotion from within, at which time she called 9-1-1, as no one had permission to be inside, and the residence had been burglarized previously on 1/22/17 and 1/23/17.

Responding deputies observed subject attempting to escape from a rear bedroom window. Subject fled back into the residence upon observing the deputies, and barricaded himself within. SWAT, K-9 and Aviation responded to assist with apprehension. Following a several-hour standoff, suspect, who is a known subject, was taken into custody.

A red Kia sedan was located at the residence next to the victim home, and it was determined to be the vehicle suspect utilized during this burglary. In plain view within the vehicle were items believed to have been stolen from the victim's residence during the 1/23/17 burglary. As such, the vehicle was sealed pending a search warrant. Suspect was interviewed and admitted involvement in the 1/25/17 burglary, and intimate knowledge of the 1/23/17 burglary, though he denied involvement.

On 1/26/17, a search warrant was executed on above listed vehicle during which evidence was recovered linking subject to the 1/23/17 residential burglary. Subject was charged with burglaries from 1/23/17 & 1/25/17. The investigation is ongoing.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 01/25/17, deputies responded to an in-progress Burglary Conveyance. Victim witnessed the juvenile suspect within his vehicle, as victim was departing his residence. Victim held the car door closed until deputies arrived, took him into custody and transported him to the Oakland Park District Office. Post-Miranda, suspect provided a full confession. He was charged and transported to JAC.

Burglary Residence Arrest

On 1/31/17, after being alerted by his security system, victim observed four subjects (1 adult, 3 juveniles) breaking into his residence. He then called 9-1-1. The subjects fled, but were located nearby. All four subjects were detained in a traffic stop. Victim showed deputies video from the security system that identified the four individuals as the suspects who tried to break into his home. All four were charged with Burglary.

Strong Armed Robbery Arrest

On 2/1/17, two male subjects approached the victims who were walking from the City Library. One subject asked to use victim's phone to call his mom. When victim handed his

phone to suspect, he grabbed the phone and fled towards N Dixie Hwy. Victims chased suspects and caught them in the empty lot at Central Bark. During the ensuing struggle, one of the suspect threatened to stab the victims. Two adults witnessed the struggle.

Deputy Earnest was circulating the area and observed a suspect matching the clothing description given for one of the suspects. Following a foot chase, Deputy Earnest apprehended the suspect. A show-up line-up was conducted, in which the witnesses and victims positively identified the suspect.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

During the overnight hours of 2/24/17, victim's 1997 Ford truck was burglarized and tools removed from the bed of the truck. On 3/1/17, suspect was arrested and charged. On 3/2/17, a pawn check of the suspect revealed that he had pawned several tools on 2/25/17, at a local pawn shop, just hours after the burglary. The victim responded and positively identified all the stolen items. Suspect was charged with Burglary Conveyance, multiple counts Dealing in Stolen Property and False Ownership.

During the pawn search, it was discovered that suspect pawned additional items that were stolen in a separate residential burglary. The investigation is on-going and more charges are expected.

Multiple Burglary Conveyances Arrest

On 2/26/17, units were dispatched to a report of a suspicious person and incident in progress. Caller advised that a black male was in the parking lot, pulling on car doors. Caller remained on the phone and gave responding units timely information. Deputies located subject walking toward the parking lot exit and caller advised this was the correct individual. Area canvass revealed three vehicles had been entered via unlocked doors. A show-up was conducted and two witnesses positively identified the subject, who was the same person depicted in the 2/21/17 Alert for a spree of Burglary Conveyances at Lake Emerald Condos.

Suspect was arrested. While on scene, deputies recovered from the suspect's pocket items he had stolen from the vehicles. Post-Miranda, suspect admitted to being subject depicted in the alert flyer, and to finding the stolen property in this incident, but denied entering the vehicles, even though two of the suspect's phones were located inside victim's vehicle. Suspect was charged accordingly. Investigation is on-going.

Multiple Burglary Conveyance / Grand Theft Arrest

During December 2016, several bicycle thefts occurred at Sunshine Holiday RV and Camping Resort located at 2802 W Oakland Park Blvd. During follow-up investigation, Sgt. Frey developed a lead from RAPID pawn system, in which a known suspect had been selling bicycles to different pawnshops throughout Broward County. Multiple victims from the Sunshine Holiday Park positively identified the pawned bicycles.

It was also determined that the suspect sold a Canon Rebel DSLR camera. While the camera was not listed as stolen, Detective Versteeg was able to track down the victim who reported the camera as stolen from a conveyance burglary in Palm Beach County.

On 3/21/17, the suspect was apprehended and charged with Burglary Conveyance by Palm Beach County. Oakland Park Detectives obtained arrest warrants for the suspect, which were then forwarded to Palm Beach County Jail. Oakland Park detectives were able to clear several cases and are assisting Palm Beach County detectives in clearing their related cases.

Strong Armed Robbery Arrest

On 3/21/17, when the victim was waiting at the 100 E Commercial Blvd bus stop, a juvenile male subject approached her, grabbed her hand and attempted to take her cell phone. The victim resisted, at which time the suspect pushed her to the ground and continued using force, including stomping her foot and ankle as he pulled on the phone. To avoid further violence, the victim let go of her cell phone and the suspect fled.

Witnesses called the Sheriff's office and a perimeter was established. Deputy Poehl was instrumental in locating and capturing the suspect, who the victim positively identified in a show-up. The victim's cell phone was recovered and the suspect was charged accordingly.

Grand Theft Arrest

On 3/29/17, suspect stole the victim's suitcase from out of the victim's motel room. The victim reported the theft the next day, and shortly thereafter began receiving emails from the suspect stating that he had the suitcase, would return it to the victim for reward money, and requested that the victim meet him at the nearest police department (BSO District 12).

When the suspect arrived at the Oakland Park District Office on 3/31/17, he was placed under arrest. Post-Miranda, he denied stealing the suitcase, advising he found it by the dumpster. He further denied trying to force the victim to pay for the suitcase, rather, emailed "Offer your reward please," advising it was "found property and it now belonged" to him. The suspect said he was going to dump out the belongings, keeping only those of value. The suspect charged with Grand Theft.

Community Action Plans

District Staff meets each week to discuss crime trends, arrests and Juvenile Probationary Offenders to deploy deputies into the affected areas. The Crime Suppression Team is also deployed into the affected crime areas to combat emerging crime trends.

Crime mapping and reporting is performed twice each week. The first mapping and reporting depicts the crimes that occurred the previous week. The second mapping depicts the previous 3 weeks.

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and issued traffic citations. Utilizing this technology allows the district to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the district to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.

The District also addressed several traffic related initiatives during this quarter.

- Weekly analysis of traffic crash hot spots
- Crash Reduction
 - 1800 to 3100 W Oakland Park Blvd
 - 600 to 1000 E Commercial Blvd
- Deployed Message Boards with educational messages

- Daily traffic enforcement in the school zones
- Commercial Vehicle Traffic Enforcement

The City of Oakland Park has two major roadways that experience heavy congestion. The Oakland Park corridor is currently under construction which magnifies the situation and increases the rear-end type crash. Additionally, a major beach re-habilitation project is underway. This has increased the number of commercial vehicles utilizing these roadways.

The Oakland Park Traffic unit has deployed information signs to provide traffic warnings to commuters. Increased traffic enforcement has been conducted at key intersections in an attempt to educate the public and reduce the crashes in these areas. Additionally, the City of Oakland Park is currently participating in a Pedestrian / Bicycle Safety Grant. The first phase of this grant is directed towards education which would explain the increased number of warnings citations being issued.

During this quarter, a pattern of traffic crashes developed on two major roadways.





The Crisis Intervention Team deputies work with the mental health system and advocacy groups to ensure persons with mental health issues receive support. A team of CIT District deputies hits the streets weekly to locate those in need of assistance. They assist with services, transportation, food, clothing and entry into substance abuse programs. These deputies educate, encourage and help these persons get off the streets and into a shelter or abuse program.

Crime Trends Response

During this reporting period several conveyance burglaries occurred at You Fit (1203 Zone) and LA Fitness (1202 Zone). Employee of the Month

January 2017 Deputy C. Howard	<p>Recognizing Deputy Charles Howard for his outstanding, daily commitment to the residents of the City of Oakland Park.</p> <p>On January 25, 2017, deputies were dispatched to a burglary in progress at a residence that had been twice burglarized earlier in the week. The victim returned home and was entering through the front door when she heard someone in her house. Deputy Howard was first on scene and met with the victim, who informed him of the situation.</p> <p>Deputy Howard observed the suspect re-enter the back of the residence, whereupon he coordinated responding deputies in setting up a perimeter, containing the suspect inside the home. After a few hours, the suspect voluntarily exited the home and was taken into custody.</p> <p>Due to Deputy Howard's quick thinking, his ability to coordinate responding deputies, and having knowledge of the previous burglaries, the suspect was apprehended without incident. For these reasons, Deputy Charles Howard is the Oakland Park Employee of the Month for January 2017.</p>
February 2017 Deputy J. Sasso	<p>Recognizing the lifesaving efforts of Deputy Joseph Sasso, for his commitment to and compassion for the residents of Oakland Park.</p> <p>On February 8, 2017 at approximately 03:59 hours, Deputy Sasso was dispatched to the area of 3005 N Oakland Forest Dr, in reference to a possible suicide. The call came in via secondhand information by NYPD and dispatch could only provide the name of the subject. Dispatch also provided a second possible location of 381 E Commercial Blvd. Multiple Oakland Park patrol units responded to check both locations.</p> <p>Deputy Sasso utilized both RMS and DAVID to obtain vehicle information and a photo of the subject. At approximately 04:20 hours, Deputy Sasso located the subject's vehicle at 2881 N Oakland Forest Dr. The vehicle's engine was running, and a hose ran from the driver's side window attached at the other end to the exhaust pipe. The occupant was unresponsive. Deputy Sasso removed the hose, opened the driver's side door, and attempted to wake the subject while Fire Rescue responded. The subject later admitted to being depressed over a recent breakup and that he had taken twenty sleeping pills in an attempt to kill himself.</p> <p>Deputy Joseph Sasso's knowledge and utilization of the BSO information system to retrieve pertinent information and quick actions enabled him to save the life of a person in despair. For these reasons, he is the Oakland Park District Employee for the month of February 2017.</p>
March 2017 Deputy K. Poehl	<p>On March 20, 2017, Deputy Karl Poehl, who is assigned to the Oakland Park District Motor Unit, witnessed a horrific traffic crash involving a vehicle and a pedestrian waiting at the bus stop. The victim suffered critical injuries wherein his lower leg was nearly severed. Deputy Poehl acted quickly, simultaneously rendering aid, controlling traffic, and establishing a preliminary crime scene.</p> <p>The next day, he visited the victim of the crash in the hospital to check on the man's condition. 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2017 Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business, Robbery and Burglary Conveyance.

Despite a continued decrease in the violent crime of robbery, 2016 saw a decrease in residential burglaries, but an upswing of vehicle burglaries within the City. The safety and security of our residents and business owners remains the highest priority of the Oakland Park District.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the district.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole in identifying juveniles that enter and/or complete probation as a way to reduce recidivism. Further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have an impact on juveniles who reoffend, only to victimize the citizens of Oakland Park.
- Carry on the district's mentorship program wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques, training and enhancing their knowledge of different investigative resources so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.

ENHANCE COMMUNITY – PARKS AND LEISURE DIVISION

The Oakland Park District will seek to improve the working relationship with the City of Oakland Park and Leisure Divisions, the citizens, parents, children and businesses that interact with various recreation programs the city offers.

Deputies will interact with the youth and work on reinforcing a positive relationship with law enforcement. We will ascertain what their needs are in their community and provide crime prevention and safety information. Promote crime prevention plans and increase ways that youth can protect themselves, and their property as well as be involved members of the community.

- Deputies come in contact with hundreds of school-aged children each day. Deputies will instill a positive relationship with the various groups of youth. Some of the safety programs the deputies will discuss with the youth are: Increased awareness of law enforcement

deputies, drug prevention, anti-crime efforts, bullying, stranger danger, bicycle safety, pool safety, internet safety, neighborhood watch, school watch, pedestrian safety and others.

- Build trust in the communities and with the youth.
- Role models, improve trust and the perception of law enforcement.
- Understand the youth's perception of the law enforcement officer.
- Use positive interactions to foster better communication and improve relationships.
- Summer break from school is an opportunity for the City's youth enjoy the time away from school and summer vacation with their families. Many youth enroll in a summer recreation program with the City's Recreation Department. Deputies will engage the children attending these summer programs and open a discussion on several topics.
- Deputies would also interact and build positive relationships with the youth by engaging them in the activities at the recreation centers and in some instances traveling with them on their field trips to an offsite venue.

IMPROVE CITYWIDE PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The Oakland Park District will become a more integral part of the City's Engineering and Community Development Team in regards to planning and impact assessment of the various city projects within the community.

Residents and those traveling through the City who encounter construction or traffic flow changes are often confused and sometimes frustrated. Subsequently situations are created when the safety and flow of traffic are compromised. The Oakland Park District will integrate itself with the City Engineering & Community Development Department to assure input and participations in traffic mitigation due to these projects. We will also participate in the planning, approval implementation and follow-up portions of large scaled community events and special events.

- Create a liaison to the City's Engineering and Community Development Department to review all MOTs (Maintenance of Traffic) and the Neighborhood Traffic Committee.
- The Oakland Park District will participate in the various committees and departments in pre-planning, coordination of resources, approval process, implementation and after action follow-up in the Special Events Application process.
- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow at the City's borders.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will organize a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The District developed a program in the district that targets criminal offenders who prey on the citizens and visitors of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output: (JuMP) – Juvenile Monitoring Portal:

- The School Resource Officers are tasked with this portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamentals to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
- The Crime Suppression Team is assigned to monitor those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their past and present criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the juveniles and their parents to discuss the juvenile's curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with the Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are all fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
- The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible those individuals – both juvenile and adults – who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith-based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target the youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.
