The Oakland Park District continues to experience a low crime rate in comparison to years past. This is an extension of the trend observed in the Uniform Crime Report where the City of Oakland Park has a lower crime rate than seen in decades. This progress represents the teamwork between the police, citizens, City staff and elected officials. No one entity can truly impact crime by itself. Citizens have been a key part of our crime fighting strategy as can be seen in the Notable Events portion of this report. Oakland Park citizens have become adept at recognizing suspicious behavior, and most importantly, calling it in! City staff and elected officials have had unwavering support for our men and women; this support encourages good morale and community inclusion.

Our largest challenge this quarter was undoubtedly the new school security protocols, as required by the State. This included increased staffing, as well as the implementation of several policies and practices within the schools themselves: increased police presence, single points of entry, perimeter improvements, and secured campuses. While this has increased the safety of our schools tremendously, these improvements have not occurred without some impact to our community. Wait times to enter the campuses have been extended, pick up and drop off is a longer process with increased traffic as a result of new traffic patterns. Please remember that this legislation is new and the implementation is an ongoing process. We are working with our schools, the City and the community to find solutions.

As we enter the holiday season in the fourth quarter, we ask all residents to be aware of their neighbors and keep an eye out for suspicious activity. This may include burglars, as well as the seasonal scam artists who often prey on our elderly. Remember to ask any contractor approaching you for roofing, driveway sealing, or portraying themselves as a utility worker for authentic identification and contractor's license. If they don't have it give us a call. No legitimate worker will mind the police coming by.

Working together we can continue to reduce crime and make our neighborhoods and businesses the safest they can be.

Major Crimes – (Reported UCR)

Crime Developments – 3rd Quarter

Community Action Plans were executed during this quarter to address emerging crime trends. The District implemented several initiatives to identify suspects, curb crimes and track known offenders.

The District utilizes several programs to analyze, track trends and report crimes:

- CrimeMapping.com: designed to provide the public with information about recent crime activity in their neighborhoods.
- CrimeStar (ESRI): a GIS Mapping software that allows the user to map crime activity, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and conduct deep analysis.
- CrimeView/Desktop: new software technology that allows law enforcement to analyze crime, Hot Spot mapping, Repeat Calls for Service, Computer Aided Dispatch. This software allows each user to visualize crime activity geographically.

Road Patrol continues to be the foundation of our crime reduction program, the cornerstone of which is the emphasis on successfully responding to crimes in progress by setting up good perimeters in an exhaustive effort to catch and identify the offender(s) in the progress of committing these crimes. Effective implementation of these tactics are due to constant training and evaluating our efforts. Patrol deputies learn to contain the suspects, keep each other safe and get the criminals in custody, thus making Oakland Park a poor choice to commit a crime. The implementation of this program coupled with good community interaction and identifying suspicious persons and vehicles leads to an overall focus of crime reduction in Oakland Park.


The District developed a program – JuMP (Juvenile Monitoring Portal), previously known as STOP – which is divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output – that targets repeat criminal offenders who prey on the citizens of and visitors to Oakland Park. This program allows for the mentoring and monitoring of repeat juvenile offenders in an effort to reduce recidivism. This model has now been adopted by the agency and implemented in many districts.

- School Resource Deputies are tasked with the portion that focuses on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges, and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamental to ensuring successful compliance.
- 2. The Crime Suppression Team monitors those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their overall criminal behavior, have been placed on conditional release, probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. Weekly, these deputies meet with the adults or juveniles and their parents to discuss the curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are fundamental to ensuring a successful compliance and program outcomes.
- 3. The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible for those individuals both juveniles and adults who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.

In order to maintain crime reductions, the District regularly assesses and updates the enforcement methods being utilized. These efforts must be coordinated with all units in this District and driven by leveraging all available technology to pinpoint, or as close as possible, predict where crime will occur. In order to accomplish this task, units within the District are brought together to share intelligence, crime analysis, current trends and apprehensions. The units responsible for these programs are:


* High volume of calls includes traffic enforcement in school zones, patrol of commercial parking lots and other proactive enforcement.

















Notable Events

Home Invasion Robbery Arrests

On 06/30/18, deputies responded to the 300 block of NW 43rd Street in reference to a home invasion robbery. The victim stated that two suspects forced their way into the residence, brandished a firearm, and stole property from within the residence. One suspect was possibly known to the victim. A line-up was conducted and the juvenile suspect was positively identified by the victim. A warrant was obtained for the juvenile suspect, who was located and taken into custody on 07/05/18. The suspect was interviewed by detectives and transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center, charged with Armed Robbery, Armed Occupied Burglary, and Grand Theft.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 07/21/18, deputies responded to the Denny's located at 3151 NW 9th Avenue in reference to an armed conveyance burglary. While enroute, deputies were updated that the victim was following the suspects, who had driven to the Checkers located at 590 E Oakland Park Blvd. Upon deputies' arrival, the suspect fled in a maroon Chevy. The suspect vehicle was located by Fort Lauderdale Police, who pursued the vehicle until it crashed within their jurisdiction. A K-9 track was conducted and both suspects were located and taken into custody. A firearm was also recovered from one of the suspects. Jewelry that was stolen from the victim's vehicle was located inside of the suspect vehicle. Both suspects were interviewed by detectives and transported to the BSO main jail, charged with Armed Burglary.

Burglary Residence and Conveyance Arrest

On 07/24/18, Deputies responded to the 5200 block of NE 3rd Avenue in reference to an occupied residential burglary and conveyance burglary. On scene deputies made contact with both victims, who provided the same description of a juvenile suspect. Deputies circulated the area, locating a juvenile who fit the provided description. The juvenile was detained and positively identified by both victims. During an interview with detectives, the juvenile suspect stated he entered victim 1's residence because he was "playing a game," and fled when he saw the homeowner. He gave the same reasoning for entering into victim 2's vehicle. The juvenile suspect was charged with Occupied Residential Burglary and Conveyance Burglary and transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Multiple Grand Theft Auto and Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 07/26/18, deputies responded to the 300 block of 33rd Street in reference to a suspicious vehicle parked in front of an abandoned residence. On arrival, deputies observed a Jeep Cherokee, reported as stolen, parked in front of the residence. As deputies approached the vehicle, two juvenile males exited and fled from the vehicle. Deputies established a perimeter and one of the juvenile suspects was located and taken into custody. During an interview with the juvenile suspect, he confessed to stealing the Jeep Cherokee. Additionally, he confessed to committing numerous other crimes within the City. In total, the juvenile suspect confessed to committing four auto thefts and four conveyance burglaries, all of which were confirmed from previous reports. The suspect was charged with four counts each of Grand Theft Auto and Burglary Conveyance and transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Burglary Business Arrest

On 07/14/18, deputies responded to G&F Equipment located at 680 W Prospect Road in reference to a delayed burglary. The victim stated that an unknown suspect entered the closed business, stealing several hundred dollars worth of tools. The victim had video surveillance and was able to identify the suspect as a former employee. Detectives located the victim's propery at Lucky Pawn, where the suspect had sold it. The suspect was located on 08/08/18, and interviewed by detectives. He was charged with Burglary Structure, Grand Theft, and Dealing in Stolen Property and transported to the BSO Main Jail.

Burglary Business Arrest

On 08/18/18, deputies responded to Save-a-Lot located at 3400 N Andrews Avenue in reference to a call of an adult suspect crawling under the fenced-in area next to the business. On arrival, deputies located the suspect inside of the compound, disassembling an air conditioner. The suspect was taken into custody for burglary and interviewed by detectives. The suspect confessed to disassembling the air conditioners with the intent of selling the copper. The suspect was charged with Burglary Structure and transported to the BSO Main Jail.

Multiple Grand Theft Auto Arrest

On 08/21/18, deputies responded to a warehouse located at 1022 NE 44th Court in reference to a victim who advised the GPS on his stolen motorcycle was tracking to the location. On scene, deputies made contact with a suspect who was in the warehouse. Inside the warehouse was the victim's stolen motorcycle, along with several more motorcycles being concealed under tarps. The suspect was detained and a search warrant was obtained for the warehouse. A search of the location revealed a total of five stolen motorcycles from the cities of Coral Springs and Coconut Creek. The suspect was charged with five counts of Grand Theft Auto and transported to the BSO Main Jail.

Multiple Burglary Residence Arrest

On 08/01/18, deputies responded to the 1500 block of NE 48th Court in reference to a delayed burglary to the victim's residence. The victim stated that unknown suspect(s) broke into the residence, stealing jewelry, golfing equipment, and banking information. Soon after, the victim reported his stolen credit card was utilized several times. A check of the stolen credit card usage traced to a residence in Fort Lauderdale. Additionally, several items belonging to the victim were pawned by a suspect utilizing the address tied to the stolen credit card usage. Detectives responded to the residence, taking two suspects into custody. Both suspects were interviewed and provided confessions to detectives. Additionally, during follow-up investigation, detectives located property in possession of the suspects belonging to two more residential burglary victims from the cities of Coral Springs and Fort Lauderdale. Both suspects were charged with Residential Burglary and Grand Theft and transported to the BSO Main Jail.

Occupied Burglary Residences Arrest

On 08/30/18, deputies responded to the 200 block of NE 43rd Court in reference to an occupied burglary. The victim stated that she awoke to a noise inside the residence. Looking into the living room she observed two suspects inside her home stealing her television. Detectives received the case and identified a possible suspect after he sold property matching the victim's

at a pawn shop. The suspect was located and taken into custody. During an interview the suspect confessed to the above burglary and identified the second suspect. In addition, the suspect confessed to a second occupied burglary that occurred the week prior on the 300 block of NE 42nd Street. The suspect was charged with both Occupied Burglaries and Dealing in Stolen Property and transported to the BSO Main Jail. An arrest warrant was obtained for the second suspect in this case.

Burglary Residence Arrest

On 09/09/18, deputies responded to the 4000 block of NE 13th Avenue in reference to a burglary alarm. On arrival, deputies observed an adult suspect exiting the residence. The suspect was detained by deputies on scene. The suspect was interviewed by detectives and confessed to breaking into the residence. The suspect was charged with Residential Burglary and transported to the BSO main jail.

Burglary Conveyance Arrest

On 09/16/18, deputies responded to the 1800 block of NW 36th Street in reference to two juvenile suspects breaking into a vehicle. On arrival, deputies located the two juvenile suspects, detaining them. Surveillance video was obtained showing the detained juvenile suspects attempting to enter into vehicles on the street. Detectives interviewed both suspects who confessed to entering cars in an attempt to obtain money for "Halloween Horror Night." The juvenile suspects were charged with Conveyance Burglary and transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center.

Fraud Arrest

On 08/16/18, the victim contacted deputies to report a fraudulent use of his credit card. The victim stated that an uknown suspect utilized his stolen credit card to pay for vehicle maintenance at the business Autobahn Performance located at 698 NE 45th Street. Detectives responded to the business, obtaining videos surveillance and work receipts. Through investigation the suspect was identified and detained on 09/20/18. During an interview with the suspect, he confessed to using a credit card he knew to be fraudulent to obtain service on a vehicle belonging to his girlfriend. The suspect was charged with Grand Theft and Criminal Use of Personal Identification Information and transported to the BSO Main Jail.

Community Action Plans

District Staff meets each week to discuss crime trends, arrests and Juvenile Probationary Offenders to deploy deputies into the affected areas. The Crime Suppression Team is also deployed into the affected crime areas to combat emerging crime trends.

Crime mapping and reporting is performed twice each week. The first mapping and reporting depicts the crimes that occurred the previous week. The second mapping depicts the previous 3 weeks.

Community Action Plans

Traffic Crash Analysis

The District utilizes CrimeView Dashboard to analyze all traffic crashes and issued traffic citations. Utilizing this technology allows the District to evaluate the location, days of week and times that traffic crashes occur. This same technology allows the District to examine where and when traffic citations are issued to a violator.

The District also addressed several traffic related initiatives during this quarter.

- Weekly analysis of traffic crash hot spots
- Crash Reduction
 - 1700 to 3100 W Oakland Park Blvd
 - Andrews Av to 1200 E Commercial Blvd
- Deployed Message Boards with educational messages


The City of Oakland Park has two major roadways that experience heavy congestion. The Oakland Park corridor is currently under construction which magnifies the situation and increases the rearend type crash. This has increased the number of commercial vehicles utilizing these roadways.

The Oakland Park Traffic unit has deployed information signs to provide traffic warnings to commuters. Increased traffic enforcement has been conducted at key intersections in an attempt to educate the public and reduce the crashes in these areas.

During this quarter, a pattern of traffic crashes developed on two major roadways.

- 1. East Commercial Blvd, from N Andrews to 1100 blocks.
 - 108 traffic crashes during this quarter in that targeted area.
 - Peak days and times are:
 - Tuesday 1300-1800
 - Friday 1400-1900
 - 181 Traffic citations were issued in this targeted area.
 - Zones effected: 1203, 1208
- 2. West Oakland Park Blvd, from 1700 to 3100 blocks.
 - 112 traffic crashes during this quarter in that targeted area.
 - Peak days and times are:
 - Sunday 1100-1900
 - Wednesday 1300-2100 0600-1000
 - Thursday 1400-2100
 - 238 Traffic citations were issued in this targeted area.
 - Zones effected: 1211, 1212 and 1213

Resources were deployed during the peak days and times, including message boards displaying educational messages to the motoring public of following too closely and speeding.

A team of CIT District deputies hits the streets weekly to locate those in need of assistance. They assist with services, transportation, food, clothing and entry into substance abuse programs. These deputies educate, encourage and help these persons get off the streets and into a shelter or abuse program.

July 2018 Deputy Jonathan Zinglo	On the evening of July 25 th , 2018, Deputy Zinglo was dispatched to a police service call. Upon his arrival, he encounter a deaf and mute individuals who was experiencing a life crisis. The subject had recently become homeless due to family issues. It appeared that the subject had been living out of his vehicle, with two small kittens, for several weeks due to these circumstances. Not desiring to continue his current living situation, and attempting to get back on his feet, the subject had made arrangements to live with other family members. Unfortunately, as family members were flying in to assist the following morning, the subject ended up with a disabled vehicle and nowhere to stay. With no other alternatives, the subject asked a local business to make contact with BSO Communications to summon police for assistance. Deputy Zinglo overcame the subject's inability to speak and hear by transcribing their conversation, and was able to perform several tasks in an attempt to help the subject get back on his feet. Deputy Zinglo made arrangements with the BSO Oakland Park authorized tow service for the disabled vehicle. He also was able to facilitate contacting a family member in order for the subject to make arrangements for a hotel room with close proximity to Fort Lauderdale International Airport. Deputy Zinglo then sought permission from his supervisor to transport the subject was able to check in to the room without any issues and also assisted him with transporting his personal property.
	Deputy Zinglo displayed the dedication, compassion and empathy we desire as employees of the Broward Sheriff's Office. It is for these reasons, Deputy Jonathan Zinglo is the Oakland Park Employee of the Month for July 2018.
August 2018 Deputies Dionne Valdez and Alvaro Gomez, and Detective Steve Upadayya	Recognizing Deputies Dionne Valdez and Alvaro Gomez, and Detective Steve Upadayya for their continued commitment to the citizens of the City of Oakland Park and Broward County. On July 26 th , 2018, Deputies Valdez and Gomez responded to a call of a suspicious vehicle parked in front of an abandoned residence. Both deputies made a tactical approach, locating two juvenile subjects inside the vehicle, which was later determined to be stolen out of the City of Oakland Park. Upon the juveniles observing the deputies, both fled. Deputies established a perimeter and were able to locate and apprehend one of the juveniles, identified as the driver of the stolen vehicle.
	Once in custody, Detective Upadayya responded to interview the juvenile subject. Through interview techniques, he was able to obtain a full confession to the auto theft. Furthermore, utilizing the rapport Detective Upadayya quickly established with the subject, he was able to elicit confessions to numerous other felony crimes within the city. In total, the subject provided in- depth confession to the commission of four auto thefts and four vehicle burglaries.
	The actions of Deputies Valdez and Gomez, and Detective Upadayya were crucial in identifying and removing a prolific juvenile offender from the streets. Their attentiveness and attention to detail helped close numerous cases and provided closure to several residents. They are the Oakland Park District Employees for the month of August 2018.

September 2018	Recognizing Deputy Bryan Lorenzo for his continued commitment and
Deputy Bryan Lorenzo	dedication to the City of Oakland Park and the Broward Sheriff's Office.
	Deputy Lorenzo has addressed various types of crimes to include narcotics, auto thefts and burglaries within the City of Oakland Park. There were two specific incidents that stood out in September 2018.
	On September 27, 2018, deputies were dispatched to a call of a church bus being driven in a suspicious manner. The concerned citizen provided a description and license plate of the vehicle. Deputy Lorenzo recognized the vehicle as likely one from an alert flyer. He located the vehicle, which was parked and unoccupied at the 3300 block of Powerline Road. Deputy Lorenzo set up a tactical surveillance position in an attempt to apprehend the suspect driver. Moments later, the suspect attempted to enter the vehicle and drive away, however, Deputy Lorenzo intercepted the suspect and took him into custody. The suspect was positively identified and charged with grand theft.
	Later that same day, another call was dispatched advising of two subjects burglarizing vehicles in the area. Deputy Lorenzo apprehended one of the subjects and conveyed information enabling his co-workers to apprehend the second suspect. Both suspects were positively identified by the witness and charged with the vehicle burglaries.
	It should be noted that Deputy Lorenzo leads the District in arrests, with 15 arrests for the month of September 2018. Deputy Lorenzo's diligence to duty and dedication to the residents of Oakland Park has earned him the Oakland Park District Employee for the month of September 2018.

2018 Goals and Objectives

REDUCE CRIME

The Oakland Park District will continue to strive to reduce top tier crime to include Burglary Residence, Burglary Business, Robbery and Burglary Conveyance.

Reducing crime and increasing the sense of security will always remain the primary focus of the Oakland Park District. In 2017, the District saw decreases in the majority of Part One Crimes. The Oakland Park District will focus on these categories to maintain a low level of occurrence and seek further reductions. As is always stated, these reductions are not the product of policing alone, but more so achieved through the partnership of police, community, city staff, and elected officials working together here in Oakland Park.

- District resources will be allocated to educate residents and business owners about crime prevention and current trends to achieve the goal of crime reduction.
- Maintain an emphasis on information sharing between the residents and employees of the District.
- Patrol tactics will continue to be evaluated and improved in an effort to increase apprehensions and deterrence.
- Units will continually be monitored for effectiveness and proper resource allocation.
- Continue to build upon the working relationship with Probation and Parole in identifying juveniles who enter and/or complete probation as a way to reduce recidivism. Further expand the partnership with the Juvenile Division of the State Attorney's Office to have an impact on juveniles who reoffend, only to victimize the citizens of Oakland Park.
- Carry on the District's mentorship programs wherein training and career development are emphasized. Patrol deputies in the mentorship program will be exposed to different interview styles, techniques and training to enhance their knowledge of different investigative resources, so as to assure the best patrol practices and work product.
- Utilize new technology such as the recent introduction of body cams to make better cases and present stronger evidence.

ENSURE ROADWAY AND RAILWAY SAFETY

The Oakland Park District will seek to Increase the safety of our residents and visitors by addressing safety concerns in regards to our roadways, sidewalks and rail corridors.

The City of Oakland Park is making great strides towards making the City friendly for pedestrians, bicyclists and drivers. These efforts include sidewalks, bike lanes, improved roadways with larger swales, and greenspace. The City of Oakland Park is also trifurcated by two dual rail corridors that have numerous rail crossings throughout the City. The Oakland Park District will focus on education and enforcement to increase safety for all these transportation modes.

- Educate our residents and visitors on rail crossing safety, emphasize the expansion and increase frequency of train traffic due to the recent introduction of new rail service in South Florida.
- Assure proper signage on City roadways informing drivers of needed information.
- Specifically task our school resource deputies to provide youth with safe driving information to include the dangers of driving and texting or drinking.
- Seek positive interactions to foster better communication and improve perceptions of traffic enforcement. It is important to stress to the public the reality, that traffic enforcement is an education effort as well as enforcement.
- Conduct operations specifically addressing unsafe practices and violations of traffic laws.

- Assign resources to increase enforcement and promote safety.
- Seek additional funding where available to support this initiative.
- Evaluate traffic patterns and deploy District resources to educate and enforce traffic laws in the effected neighborhoods.

PROMOTE LIVABILITY

The Oakland Park District will participate in advising, guiding and enacting a global approach to livability in the City. The District will seek to leverage the recent development and community improvement projects to improve the daily life of residents. These efforts will seek every opportunity to meet the needs of our communities and residents.

With the recent growth in the City of Oakland Park as well as the investment by the City in improvements to roadway, structures, and community events, there is an unprecedented opportunity to make long term improvements to the livability of the City of Oakland Park. The Oakland Park District, which often serves as the face of the City to the residents, will be an invested partner in these efforts with the goal of improving the City's livability.

- Seek means to assure pedestrian and bicyclist safety and security, including school routs and sidewalks.
- The Oakland Park District will be an active participant in the planning process to provide feedback and also allow for understanding of the City's vision.
- The District will seek to address organizations and developments, neighborhood compatibility and address concerns of our residents in regards to safety and security.
- Communicate with adjacent cities to coordinate the traffic pattern and flow to minimize traffic and improve transit times through the City.
- Pedestrian and bicycle patrols will be encouraged to facilitate community contacts and encourage others.
- The District will assure extensive participation in a variety of City activities by our staff as a full partner in the community.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

The Oakland Park District will continue to build and improve a multi-prong effort to curtail youth crime and provide opportunities for growth and enrichment of Oakland Park youth.

- Resources will be dedicated to creating positive circumstances where youth may interact with law enforcement officers in a non-confrontational and collegial manner.
- Highlighting the Explorer Post program that provides today's youth who may be interested in a career in law enforcement with a comprehensive program of training, competition, service and practical experiences. Character development, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism are integral components of the overall program.
- The District developed a program that targets criminal juvenile offenders who prey on the citizens and visitors of Oakland Park. It has become the model for the agency that other districts use to target the offenders in their cities. It's divided into 3 subprograms, each focusing on a different output: (JuMP) Juvenile Monitoring Portal.
- The School Resource Officers are tasked to focus on juvenile offenders who are believed to be capable of turning around their criminal behavior and getting back on the right track to becoming positive and productive citizens. Partnerships with the Broward County School Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SAO, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges and BSO Juvenile Services are all fundamentals to ensuring successful compliance and program outcomes.
- The Crime Suppression Team is assigned to monitor those juveniles and adults who have committed multiple criminal offenses, and due to their past and present criminal behavior

have been placed on conditional release/probation or house arrest and must be closely monitored to assure compliance with court-mandated sanctions. If not, it is our belief that they will reoffend. These deputies meet routinely with the juveniles and their parents to discuss the juveniles' curfews, conditional release and probation. Partnerships with the Juvenile SAO and Juvenile Probation are all fundamental to ensuring successful compliance and program outcomes.

- The Criminal Investigative Unit is responsible those individuals both juvenile and adults who have been identified through intelligence as committing burglaries and other felonious activity within the City. These individuals must be tied to criminal activity and brought into the criminal justice system for successful prosecution.
- Closely work together with the City of Oakland Park, Broward County School Board, community leaders and the faith-based community through the numerous public programs, activities and presentations that target youth to improve their quality of life in their neighborhoods, community and schools.
- Summer break from school is an opportunity for the City's youth to enjoy time away from school and spend summer vacation with their families and in the community. Many youths enroll in a summer recreation program with the City's Parks and Leisure Department. Deputies will engage the children attending these summer programs as co-participants in a non-police environment.
