# From the Desk of Captain Ana Murillo-Quigley

Welcome to the Broward Sheriff's Office Oakland Park District's 2025 Annual Report.

As our Mission Statement reads, "To provide the highest level of professional public safety services to our community," we are honored to serve Oakland Park. The sworn and civilian staff of the Oakland Park District are committed to providing law enforcement services with integrity, courage, excellence, and respect for our community.

In 2025, the City saw an overall -8.4% decrease in Part-One Crimes, compared with 2024. Several incident types that had decreased in 2024 over their 2023 levels continued to decrease, including Motor Vehicle Thefts (a further -37% decrease, 74 fewer incidents), and Commercial (Business) Burglaries (-28.1% decrease, 9 fewer incidents). These decreases are due in large part to pro-active operations, directed patrols to suppress current crime trends, and investigative prowess, leading to arrests that closed multiple cases and took repeat offenders off our streets.

The Broward Sheriff's Office Oakland Park District is dedicated to our continuation of service and public safety for the citizens and visitors to the City of Oakland Park. We strive to maintain open lines of communication and foster an atmosphere of transparency, while working collaboratively to meet the needs of our community. Our deputies interact with the residents of Oakland Park through the Park Walk and Talk (PWT) initiative, by attending Homeowner Association and business-owner meetings, and through the many community events.

I encourage and invite you—our community—to participate in the numerous community-related programs and safety events hosted by the Oakland Park District and the Broward Sheriff's Office. ## 2025 Oakland Park District Mission, Objectives, and Attainments

**MISSION:** *Deliver exceptional and professional public safety services to the Oakland Park community. Provide the highest level of protection, responding swiftly to emergencies, and promoting a safe and secure environment for all residents and visitors. Through transparency, trust, and collaboration, we seek to strengthen our partnership with the community and will work collectively toward a vision of a thriving Oakland Park.*

### OBJECTIVES:

1. **CRIME REDUCTION:** The Oakland Park District prioritizes the reduction of serious crimes, including burglary, robbery, and auto-related offenses. Our goal is to create a safer community by combining intelligence-led policing, community partnerships, and proactive crime prevention strategies.

#### Key Initiatives:

- Community Education: Deliver targeted education and training for residents and business owners on crime prevention strategies, emerging trends, and life-saving techniques. Expand engagement through homeowner association meetings, and daily interactions to empower the community to take proactive measures.
- Enhanced Communication: We recognize the importance of community engagement and will seek opportunities to foster open dialogue with business owners, faith-based organizations, and residents. By fostering a collaborative relationship with the community, we can work together towards achieving our shared goal of reducing crime.
- Targeted Operations: Continuously evaluate, improve, and tailor intelligence-led operations to enhance suspect identification, apprehensions, and crime prevention strategies. Monitor and adjust resource responses to effectively address areas of concern.
- Technology Integration: Evaluate and integrate new technology to optimize our crime prevention strategies and support successful criminal prosecutions. Stay ahead of emerging trends and respond more effectively to criminal activity. By implementing these strategies, we are committed to reducing crime and creating a safer, more secure community for all.

### Attainments

- ✓ Neighborhood Response Team (NRT) deputies conducted security surveys and crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED) evaluations on properties.
- ✓ NRT deputies conducted Active Killer presentations to various businesses to heighten awareness and provide safety details.
- ✓ Distributed Pamphlets encouraging businesses to partner with the Real Time Crime Center (RTCC) through the Live Surveillance program.
- ✓ Held stakeholder meetings with businesses to better address retail thefts and other safety concerns.
- ✓ Conducted multiple Directed Patrols and pro-active operations to address current crime trends.

**ROADWAY AND RAILWAY SAFETY: The Oakland Park District is committed to addressing safety concerns regarding roadways, sidewalks, and rail corridors to ensure the protection of residents and visitors.**

**Key Initiatives:**

- Education and Outreach: Partner with rail service providers and local stakeholders to promote safe practices and educate the public on traffic and railway safety.
- Enforcement: Conduct targeted campaigns to address violations and improve compliance.
- Infrastructure Improvements: Collaborate with municipal, county, and state agencies to enhance signage, pathways, and roadways, ensuring safer travel conditions.
- Regional Collaboration: Coordinate with neighboring jurisdictions to address traffic concerns and share resources for enforcement and public education.

**Attainments**

- ✓ Coordinated with Rail service providers during crashes and other railway incidents to manage responses and identify areas that need further enforcement.
- ✓ The Oakland Park District Traffic Unit added a second Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Deputy to further improve roadway safety.
- ✓ Participated in "See Tracks? Think Train" national campaign initiative.
- ✓ Obtained a half-year FY25 FDOT Occupant Protection Traffic Grant dedicated to seat belt and speeding safety. Enforcement parameters included flyers handed out during traffic stops, written citations, multiple child safety seat checks and child passenger safety classes, and multiple educational/community outreach activities.

**EMPLOYEE DEVELOPMENT AND CAREER PATHING: The Oakland Park District actively supports the development of Broward Sheriff's Office employees by fostering career growth opportunities.**

**Key Initiatives:**

- Succession Planning: With a talented team of skilled professionals, the District aims to cultivate and retain experienced personnel while preparing newer deputies for future leadership roles, evaluating each employee's career aspirations in alignment with the agency's objectives.
- Career Development Programs: To support employee development, the District will provide both formal and informal training programs aimed at empowering individuals to chart their personal career trajectories.
- Mentorships: Supervisors will mentor and coach employees, identifying strengths and potential areas for skill enhancement to improve service delivery.
- Retention Strategies: Proactively develop employees in anticipation of attrition and retirement to ensure seamless continuity of operations.

**Attainments**

- ✓ The District had 2 deputies take the Sergeant's promotional exam. Both passed and have been promoted; one has been transferred to another district, while the other is current Sergeant of the Oakland Park Criminal Investigations Division.
- ✓ One Deputy applied for and attended the Quick Response Force (QRF) school.
- ✓ One Deputy applied for and attended the Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) school.
- ✓ The District will continue to develop employees to ensure the continuity of operations in anticipation of employee attrition and retirement.

**YOUTH ENGAGEMENT AND GUIDANCE: The Oakland Park District remains committed to engaging youth and reducing juvenile crime through proactive, positive, and non-confrontational interactions.**

**Key Initiatives:**

- Youth Programs: Expand initiatives like the Explorer Post program that provides youth interested in a law enforcement career with a comprehensive program of character development, physical training, competition, service, and practical experiences.
- Proactive Engagement: Empower School Resource Officers and Neighborhood Support Team Deputies to reduce juvenile recidivism by inspiring youth to become positive and productive citizens.
- Partnerships: Continued partnerships with the Broward County school Board, Juvenile Justice, Juvenile SOA, Juvenile Probation, Juvenile Judges, and BSO Juvenile Services, which are all fundamental to ensuring successful compliance and program outcomes.
- Diversion Programs: Emphasize diversion over prosecution where appropriate, steering youth away from the criminal justice system and toward positive outcomes.

**Attainments**

- ✓ School Resource Deputies (SRDs) have been recognized by the citizens and school officials for their mentorship of our youth.
- ✓ The Oakland Park Police Explorers assisted in the City’s Youth Day and other events throughout the year.
- ✓ Participated in several community events for the youth and families.

**TECHNOLOGY ADVANCEMENT: The Oakland Park District recognizes the vital role technology plays in enhancing public safety and will leverage innovative solutions to improve community security.**

**Key Initiatives:**

- Surveillance Expansion: Leveraging modern technology, license plate readers (LPRs) will be installed at carefully selected, high-impact locations throughout the city to maximize coverage and effectiveness. This initiative is designed to support law enforcement efforts by enabling the real-time identification of stolen vehicles, wanted suspects, and vehicles associated with criminal activity. All deployments will adhere to applicable privacy laws and policies, ensuring responsible use of technology while maintaining community trust. Overall, this investment reflects Oakland Park’s commitment to utilizing innovative tools to enhance safety, strengthen crime-fighting capabilities, and improve quality of life for residents and visitors.
- Data-Driven Policing: Leverage analytics to identify crime trends and deploy resources efficiently for prevention and response.
- Training: Train deputies to explore and utilize emerging technology ensuring optimal integration into daily operations and community engagement efforts.

**Attainments**

- ✓ The District has Ring Camera capability and continues to encourage the community to share Ring Camera footage of possible crimes with us.
- ✓ By utilizing mobile license plate recognition (LPR) technology, deputies have been able to identify stolen and wanted vehicles in real time, leading directly to the apprehension of violent suspects.

# UCR to NIBRS Transition

**UCR (Uniform Crime – Summary – Reporting)**, a state and national program, collects crime data from law enforcement agencies, and provides statistical data on those offenses to the FDLE (Florida Department of Law Enforcement), who would then report the total numbers from Florida to the FBI. UCR data was submitted to the FDLE on a bi-annual basis. This information would then be available to the public, for an overview of high-crime vs low-crime areas.

The FBI has required all states to transition to **NIBRS (National Incident-Based Reporting)**, which includes more data on each incident, and more data elements (incident date, type of weapon/force used, etc.), and the data is submitted monthly, rather than bi-annually.

NIBRS collects more data than Summary Reporting.

- Summary counted only the highest offense (hierarchy rule) of each incident. Example: If someone committed a rape and homicide during the same incident, only the homicide was reported.
- NIBRS will capture up to 10 offenses for each incident (no hierarchy rule). This means that if someone commits a rape and homicide during the same incident, both offenses will be included in the reported data.
- NIBRS captures more information on the victims and offenders.
- NIBRS captures more information on drugs, property, and weapons.
- NIBRS provides a clearer picture of crime in an area and allows for better analysis.

BSO is still in the process of transitioning from UCR to FIBRS/NIBRS.

The change from UCR to NIBRS may create a perceived increase in crime; however, this may not be the case. In the earlier example of an incident that includes rape and homicide, while under UCR, only the homicide offense was reported, under NIBRS/FIBRS, both offenses are reported for this one incident, creating a perceived increase of crime within both categories (homicide and sex crimes).

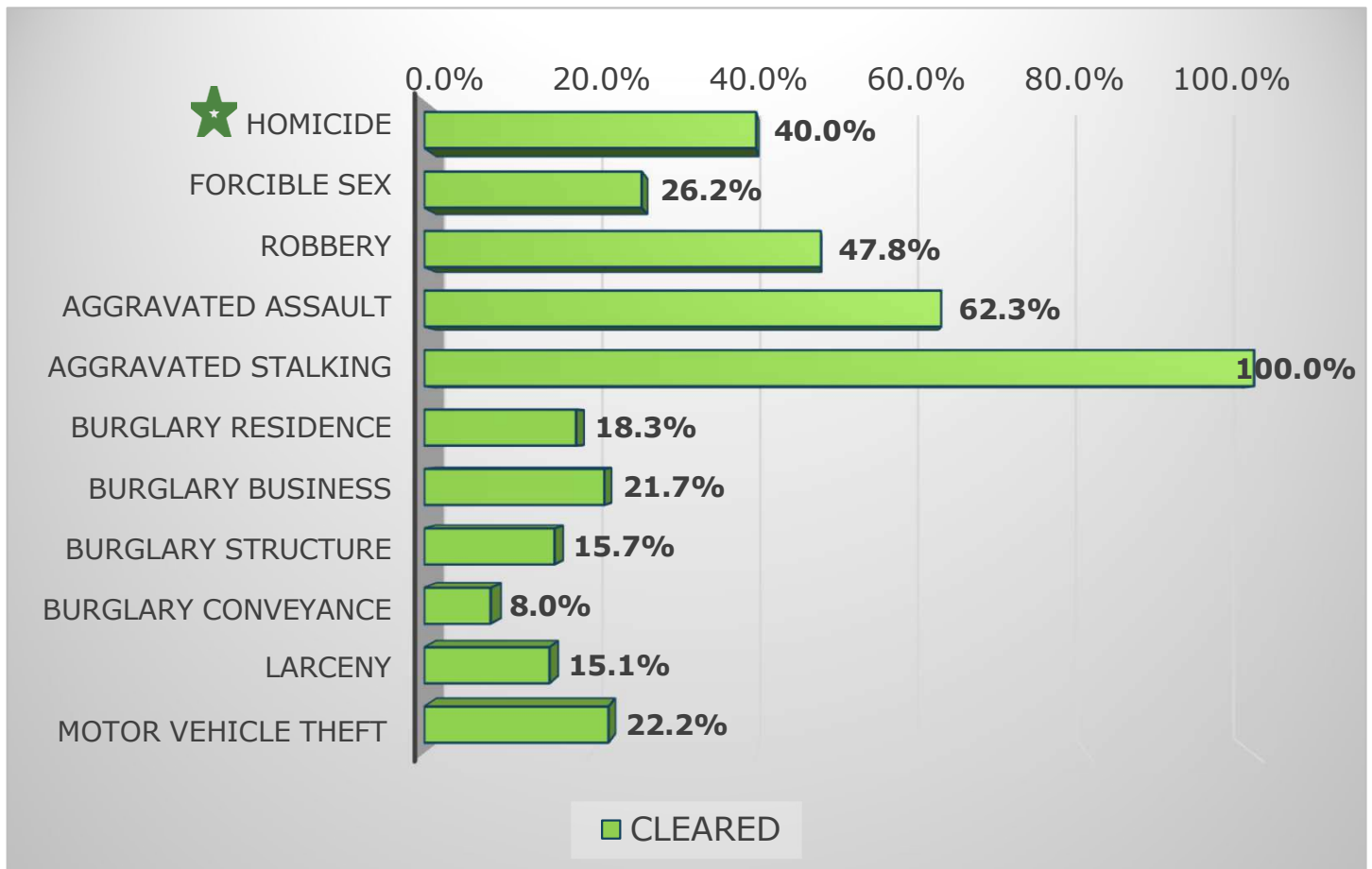

There were a total of 1,776 reported Part One Crimes in 2025. Of those, 49 (2.76%) were closed as Unfounded (not actual crimes), and therefore not part of the final clearance stats. Of the remaining 1,727 reported Part One Crimes, a total of 373 cases (21.60%) were cleared either by Arrest or by Exception, which often means that either the victim refused to cooperate or declined to prosecute.

This clearance rate is -1.01% lower than that of 2024, when 1,964 Part One Crimes were reported, 39 were closed as Unfounded, and of the remaining 1,925 Part One Crimes reported, 420 (21.82%) were cleared either by Arrest or by Exception.

★ There were 2 Homicide clearances (both CBA) in 2025.

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# ***Employees of the Month - 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter 2025***

## **January – Deputy Brandon DeChiara**

On January 31st, Deputy Brandon DeChiara responded to a shooting in a residential neighborhood. Upon arrival, he located a male victim on the ground, bleeding from three gunshot wounds. Acting swiftly, Deputy DeChiara administered first aid, applying multiple chest seals and a tourniquet. When the victim's condition deteriorated, he initiated CPR, providing lifesaving assistance until further help arrived.

His quick thinking and heroic actions earned him the title of Employee of the Month for January 2025.

## **February – Deputy Humberto Tapia**

On February 3rd, Deputy Tapia displayed outstanding vigilance by identifying a male riding a bicycle who was wanted on multiple felony warrants. Working with zone deputies, he coordinated a successful stop and arrest.

The suspect was wanted for:

- Burglary of an Occupied Dwelling
- Grand Theft Auto
- Possession of Methamphetamine

Deputy Tapia's sharp instincts and proactive policing earned him the honor of Employee of the Month for February 2025.

## **March – Deputies Khirye Allen and Manuel Smith**

On March 26th, Deputies Allen and Smith responded to an emergency involving a suicidal female on the Brightline railroad tracks. Despite the imminent danger of an approaching train, both deputies courageously entered the tracks and pulled the woman to safety. Moments later, the train passed—narrowly missing all three. Their selfless and heroic actions exemplify true bravery.

They are both recognized as Employees of the Month for March 2025.

# ***Employees of the Month – 2nd Quarter 2025***

## **April – Deputies Bryan Goodin and Malachi Jacobs**

On April 5, 2025, deputies responded to a report of a one-year-old girl choking. Deputies Bryan Goodin and Malachi Jacobs were the first to arrive on scene. Deputy Goodin advised child was conscious but did not appear to have a clear airway. The mother advised her child had picked up a piece of confetti from a party earlier and was choking on it. Deputy Goodin immediately administered several back thrusts. When the child's airway appeared to still not be clear, Deputy Jacobs administered another couple of back thrusts, which successfully caused the child to throw up the piece of confetti and clear her airway and begin breathing again.

The quick actions of these deputies were nothing short of heroic, as they acted immediately and without hesitation to save the life of this child, ensuring her life was saved. As such, they exemplify the core values of the Broward Sheriff's Office, earning them the title of Employees of the Month for April 2025.

## **May – Detectives Hans Gonzalez and Morris McCool**

On May 22, 2025, Detectives Morris McCool and Hans Gonzalez were conducting proactive patrols in the area of NW 31<sup>st</sup> Avenue and NW 28<sup>th</sup> Street, seeking to identify a suspect tied to several ongoing package theft investigations in Oakland Park. While in the vicinity of 28230 Somerset Drive, they observed a black male matching the suspect description. He was seen removing items from a white package near a commercial trash bin and placing them into a black duffle bag. He then discarded the packaging and began walking away suspiciously.

When Detective Gonzalez identified himself as a Deputy Sheriff and attempted a consensual encounter, the subject fled on foot, tossing the duffle bag into nearby bushes. After a short foot pursuit, they apprehended the suspect in the adjacent parking lot. Detective McCool recovered the discarded bag, which contained ten SHIEN-branded bags of clothing, jewelry, a purse, sandals, and other items. The discarded bag was addressed to 2400 NW 31<sup>st</sup> Av, Fort Lauderdale. Detective Gonzalez and Detective McCool contacted the intended recipient of the package at that address. She reviewed her Ring camera footage and confirmed the theft, which occurred moments prior. She submitted the footage into evidence, verifying the suspect's involvement. The suspect was apprehended and subsequently booked into the BSO Main Jail.

This incident showcases Detectives McCool and Gonzalez's commitment to proactive policing, strong observational skills, and quick action under pressure. Their work directly resulted in the apprehension of a repeat offender and the recovery of stolen property, bringing resolution to multiple victims across the City of Oakland Park. As such, Detectives McCool and Gonzalez are Employees of the Month for May 2025.

## **June – Deputy Vinson Anthony**

On May 6, 2025, Deputy Anthony Vinson was conducting area checks near 2121 W Oakland Park Blvd, and made contact with an individual who was wanted in connection with an open investigation. A warrants check confirmed the subject also had 2 active felony warrants. At this point, the subject fled on foot, initiated a foot pursuit. Deputy Vinson and his backup, Deputy Todd Jennings gave chase, maintaining a visual of the suspect's direction of travel. The suspect jumped a fence into a gated community, causing deputies to lose sight of him due to the wall barrier.

A perimeter was immediately established around the area. K-9 Unit deputies were nearby and located the suspect in a canal. The suspect refused multiple commands given by K-9, which led to K-9 Moose's deployment. The suspect attempted to drown K-9 Moose by pulling him into the water. The suspect was successfully apprehended, sustaining minor injuries. Deputy Vinson transported the suspect to the hospital for medical clearance. A total of 8 felony cases were closed based on the subject's arrest and Post-Miranda admission.

Deputy Anthony Vinson's swift actions contributed to removing a wanted individual with violent tendencies from the Oakland Park Community. His actions are commendable, as such, he has earned Employee of the Month for June 2025.

# ***Employees of the Month – 3rd Quarter 2025***

## **July – Deputies Aleem Sunanon and Anthony Ewers**

On July 25, 2025, while Deputies Aleem Sunanon and Anthony Ewers were investigating the presence of a detained subject who matched the description of a suspect who had been pulling on car door handles in the area of Lake Pointe Dr. The subject fled from Deputy Ewers on foot and entered the school grounds of Boyd Anderson High School. Deputies Sunanon and Ewers pursued on foot and Deputy Sunanon apprehended the subject, who was then searched, and a ski mask, gloves, and a window punch were found in his possession. An investigation into previous cases is ongoing, as the subject matched the description in previous burglary investigations.

Due to their initiative, determination, and relentlessness during the foot pursuit of the suspect, Deputies Sunanon and Ewers safely apprehended the suspect without further incident and prevented more possible burglaries from occurring in the same area. Therefore, they are selected as Employees of the Month for July 2025.

## **August – Deputy Giancarlo Melo-Dutschmann**

On August 31, 2025, Deputies Giancarlo Melo-Dutschmann, Malachi Jacobs, and Fabiola Romano were conducting a crash investigation when they were approached by a frantic mother whose 2-year-old son was unconscious and not breathing. The deputies immediately sprang into action. Deputy Jacobs took the child from the mother and, alongside Deputy Romano, began assessing the situation. Deputy Melo quickly joined them, administering the Heimlich maneuver after noting the child's eyes were rolled back. Their coordinated and decisive efforts, including CPR and airway clearing, allowed the child to regain consciousness and breathe again before paramedics arrived.

Their swift response and life-saving measures not only saved the child's life but provided hope to all those witnessing the event. The actions of Deputies Melo, Jacobs, and Romano are nothing short of heroic and exemplify the highest standards of public service. For their dedication and teamwork, they are selected as Employees of the Month for August 2025.

## **September – Deputy Yves Louissant-Smith & Detective Christopher Krickovich**

Deputy Yves Louissant-Smith's attention to detail, thorough investigative documentation, and diligent follow-up efforts led to the identification of a suspect vehicle involved in an arson incident within our city. Upon learning of this information, Detective Christopher Krickovich located a vehicle matching the description, conducted a traffic stop, and subsequently arrested the occupants for multiple narcotics offenses. During post-arrest interviews, the suspects confessed to their involvement in the arson and were charged accordingly. Detective Krickovich's keen eye and exemplary interview skills directly contributed to the arrest of the offenders and the successful resolution of this case.

For these reasons and more, Deputy Louissant-Smith and Detective Krickovich are the Oakland Park Employees of the Month for September 2025.

# ***Employees of the Month – 4th Quarter 2025***

## **October – Deputy Zaida Rojas-Bello**

On October 27, 2025, Deputy Rojas-Bello responded to a theft in progress at the Publix Liquor Store on E Commercial Blvd. Through her quick response and strong investigative work, she located and detained the suspect, recovered the stolen merchandise, and confirmed his identity through a witness show-up. In addition to the theft, a teletype check revealed that the suspect had multiple prior theft convictions and 3 active warrants. Deputy Rojas-Bello's attentiveness, sound judgment, and thorough case handling led to the recovery of stolen property and the apprehension of a repeat offender, exemplifying the professionalism and dedication of the Oakland Park District.

In addition to her outstanding daily performance, the district recently received a commendation email from a local resident addressed to the Sheriff, praising Deputy Rojas-Bello's professionalism, compassion, and positive community engagement. The resident specifically noted her consistent presence around 950 E. Commercial Blvd and highlighted how her calm demeanor, respectful interactions, and commitment to service have made a noticeable difference in the area. This unsolicited recognition reinforces her dedication to both the residents of Oakland Park and the values of the Broward Sheriff's Office.

## **November – Deputy Bryan Goodin**

Between November 21 and November 29, 2025, Deputy Goodin conducted multiple thorough investigations that led to the identification and arrest of a repeat burglary offender. His attention to detail, evidence collection, and proactive follow-up directly resulted in the recovery of stolen property and a confession from the suspect.

Deputy Goodin's professionalism, persistence, and commitment to community safety exemplify the highest standards of the Broward Sheriff's Office.

## **December – Deputies Kareem Petit-Frere & Kristina Licari**

While responding to a limited-information domestic violence call, both deputies quickly recognized an escalating and life-threatening situation. Upon observing the suspect arm himself with weapons and retreat toward a rear room, they immediately entered the residence, where they encountered a critically injured victim, a severely bleeding and suicidal suspect, and multiple children inside the home.

Under extreme and rapidly evolving conditions, Deputies Petit-Frere and Licari maintained composure, disarmed and secured the suspect, initiated lifesaving measures, and simultaneously directed the safe removal of the children from the scene. Their decisive actions preserved the safety of surviving family members, ensured the suspect's apprehension, and allowed the investigation to proceed safely and effectively. Their courage, judgment, and leadership in a traumatic, high-risk incident reflect the highest standards of this agency.
